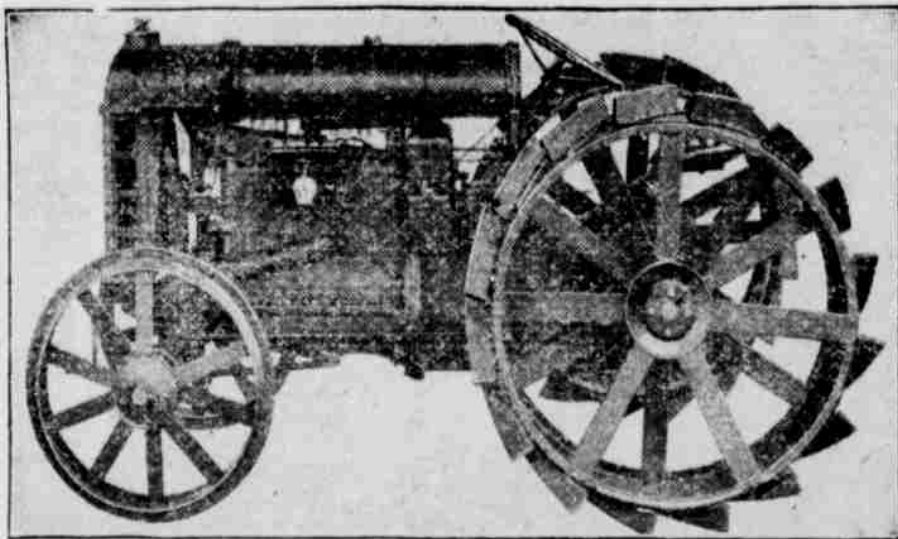

SLAYER OF HAMLET JITNEY DRIVER IS ADJUDGED INSANE

Alienists Find Parsons, Who Killed Driver of Monroe Man's Car, Was Probably Crazy When He Committed Deed.

Rockingham, Oct. 10.—Fester Parsons, white and aged 23, was declared insane late today by a group of alienists called here from several large cities to investigate the case.

Parsons is charged with the slaying of two negro jitney drivers while driving out of Hamlet last July. Trial has been postponed pending the result of the alienists' investigations. The probe has been on since Monday. Among the specialists was Dr. J. E. S. Davidson of Charlotte who was summoned by the superior court to Rockingham and who testified that the defendant was sane, said that some of the alienists had cross-examined Parsons on such questions as "baptism," the "resurrection," the "hereafter," and similar abstract subjects.

"One of the prisoner's answers was exceedingly interesting," according to Dr. Davidson.

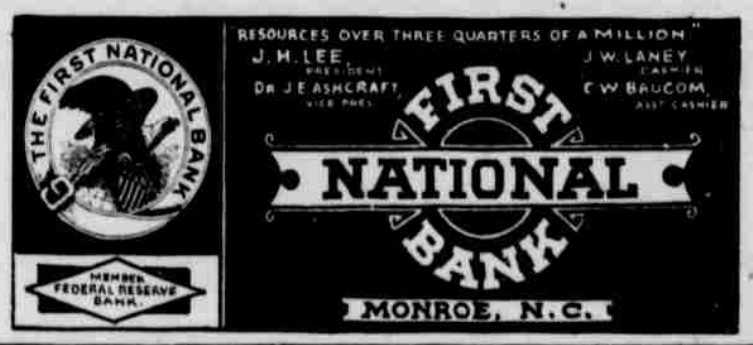
