There are few judges in this country who command more respect and admiration than does Judge Henry Groves Connor...

The Charlotte Observer's Raleigh correspondent tells of Judge Connor's refusal to become affiliated with the Ku Klux Klan.

"The Ku Klux Klan has been campaigning for memberships among some prominent North Carolinians, one of them being Federal Judge H. G. Connor...

"This organization was against the Catholics and the Jews, so I couldn't join in," Judge Connor said, adding that he did not believe an organization with such ideals would be the best for this country...

"I would not belong to an organization unless I can conform to its rules," he said, assigning that as his reason for disregarding the invitation to get into the robes and mask.

And Judge Connor is admired as much for his wisdom as for any of the other fine parts that go to make up a good and relatively great man.

THE ART OF FORGETTING

It is said that wanting things that we cannot have and which we could very well be without causes much of the disappointments of life.

It is a question which class of unhappy people is the largest, those who make themselves miserable by longing for things beyond their means or those who warp their lives by harboring the things that should be forgotten.

The person who harbours all the petty annoyances, the vexing irritations, the mean words, the unkind acts, the wrongs and the disappointments he has suffered is travelling a road that leads straight to permanent unhappiness if not to an insane asylum.

No superior person ever does this, for the one who does it cannot be superior. His faculties are too much warped, his vision is blurred.

You have often heard the expression, "I can forgive but I can't forget." But no one can do any such thing.

Passing by the annoyances or the irritations or the petty injustices and thinking of more important things in life is like leaving the brush and bushes and drift that clutter up a winding foot path and passing out into the broad and clean highway...

"Holding a high head" has a deeper meaning than is commonly supposed. The high head which comes of mere vanity and the attempt to be disdainful is nothing and is justly and quickly sized up as opera-bouffe.

THE PRACTICAL APPLICATION OF THE GOSPEL

The National Council of the Episcopal Church has adopted a declaration of social service principles which will be placed before the Episcopal Convention which assembled at Portland, Ore.

a practical application of christianity to social and industrial life on the basis of human fellowship instead of the old hair splitting doctrines which in no way touch the needs of the modern life.

"Christian social service means the application of the principles of the Gospel of Jesus Christ to all the relations into which men and women are brought, whether in government, industry, social or political life.

"It means definite obedience, by all who bear the Christian name and accept the Christian religion, to Christ's law of duty toward one's neighbor—a neighbor being every person, with whom one can establish the relationship of service.

"We understand the christian religion to have a larger meaning and field than has been commonly recognized and that its message concerns justice and righteousness, fairness and the application of the golden rule, to all men by all men, in whatever position or relation in life they might be.

"The church must serve all people, the unprivileged, and the privileged alike, and must continue to stand for mercy, charity and compassion toward those who are in trouble; but beyond that it must stand for social justice, remembering that Jesus Christ died for all and that one soul is in His sight, and should be in the sight of His disciples, as precious as another.

"Those who are in position in business, professions, or any calling in life, where they have the service of others, whether as wage earners or in any other relation, should recognize the right of the employed to full opportunity of self-development. The welfare of human life should be emphasized above the value of property.

"We understand that christian social service means following the example of the Master, who came not to be ministered unto but to minister, and to mean obedience to the law of God.

"A larger meaning and field than is commonly recognized." Christ never assaulted any of the institutional evils of his day in terms.

Such institutions as slavery and polygamy, so universal in his day, were not condemned by him. But no sensible man would to-day argue that they were right because he did not specifically condemn them.

The argument does not mean, of course, that outbreaking evils shall not be suppressed by force, but it does mean that unless society is operated on a basis of love the suppression of one evil will but be substituted by another one.
