STOCK MARKET

HAS REVERSAL

Profit Taking and Bear Selling Follow Early Outburst of Strength

New York, July 14 (AP)—Stock prices displayed a complete reversal of form in today's market, an early outburst of strength during which more than a score of issues mounted to new high levels for the year being followed in the early afternoon by a wave of profit taking and bear selling. Trading showed a further increase in volume, total sales crossing one and one-quarter million shares before the end of the third hour.

The reaction was not associated with anything in the day's news, but was widely regarded as a correction of a weakened technical position resulting from the almost perpendicular advance of the last eight weeks or more. It started prices of the motor shares, several of which were under pool manipulation, but eventually spread to practically all sections of the list.

The weekly steel trade reviews reported good July business to date, although weakness in the basic pig iron market brought the price level down to the lowest since last September. However, heavy melting steel scrap was advanced 50 cents a ton in Pittsburgh. Oil shares failed to respond to reports of a small decrease in crude oil production last week. Another sharp run up in General Motors was again the feature of the motor group, but this issue quickly sold down 2 points from its early high when weakness developed in other sections of the list.

Trading in the rails quieted down, with a rather general disposition on the part of professional operators to wait further developments on the revised Nickel Plate merger plan before extending their commitments. The closing was steady. The check to the rise in General Motors, United States Steel and other pivotal issues induced renewed selling elsewhere, with some of the rail shares falling badly. After falling slightly below yesterday's closing prices, however, the two leading industrial stocks met a better support and again headed up. The closing was 1/2 point higher, a number of specialties. Total sales approximated 1,000,000 shares.

WHEAT SHOWS FRESH UPTURNS

Fluctuations Are Rapid, But Commission Houses Buy Heavy on Breaks

Chicago, July 14 (AP)—Although heavy profit taking sales acted at times as a drag on the wheat market today, fresh upturns in prices were the rule. Fluctuations were extremely rapid, but commission house buying on breaks was much in evidence. Crop comments on spring wheat conditions were generally construed as bullish, especially as to possible black rust development in Canada. Wheat closed unsettled, 1/2 to 1 1/2 cents higher, corn at 12 1/2 to 13 1/2 cents, oats unchanged to 1/4 cent, and provisions showing a rise of 7 to 22 cents.

Corn and oats were unsettled. For the most part, both feed grains reflected the action of wheat, corn firming up sharply toward the last.

Minneapolis, July 14 (AP)—Wheat futures met further short covering today after bearish operators had failed in an effort to force recessions, and prices broke through to fresh high records for the year on all deliveries.

Net gains for the day were 1/2 to 1 1/2 cents. Rye futures were in very good demand throughout the session closing 1 1/2 cents higher. Oats were comparatively quiet, closing unchanged to 1/4 cent lower, while barley closed unchanged to 1/4 cent higher. Flaxseed closed with net gains for the day of 2 1/2 to 3 1/2 cents. Cash wheat was narrow and unsettled. Low protein quality was easy and unchanged, and the high protein variety was firm to strong. Durum continued unchanged. Winter was a shade easier. Corn was steady. Oats were quiet with prices steady. Rye was a little slower on top 25 cent stuff. Barley was narrow and firm with prices unchanged. Flaxseed was steady.
