District Official of Rotary Is Guest at Club Meet Today

Dr. Archie McCannell, governor of the ninth district of Rotary International, made the governor's annual official visit here this noon. In his address he discussed the Rotary program for the year, emphasizing Rotary education, business methods, and extension and community service.

Speaking of business methods, he said that businesses and professions have undergone a distinct upward trend in the last generation and in that upward trend the service clubs have had an important part. Under the heading of community service, he stated that boys' work is the biggest activity of the clubs of the ninth district. The Rotary plan, he said, is for each member to form a personal contact with an individual boy. He stressed the rural-urban acquaintance movement as of especial importance in this section and spoke
