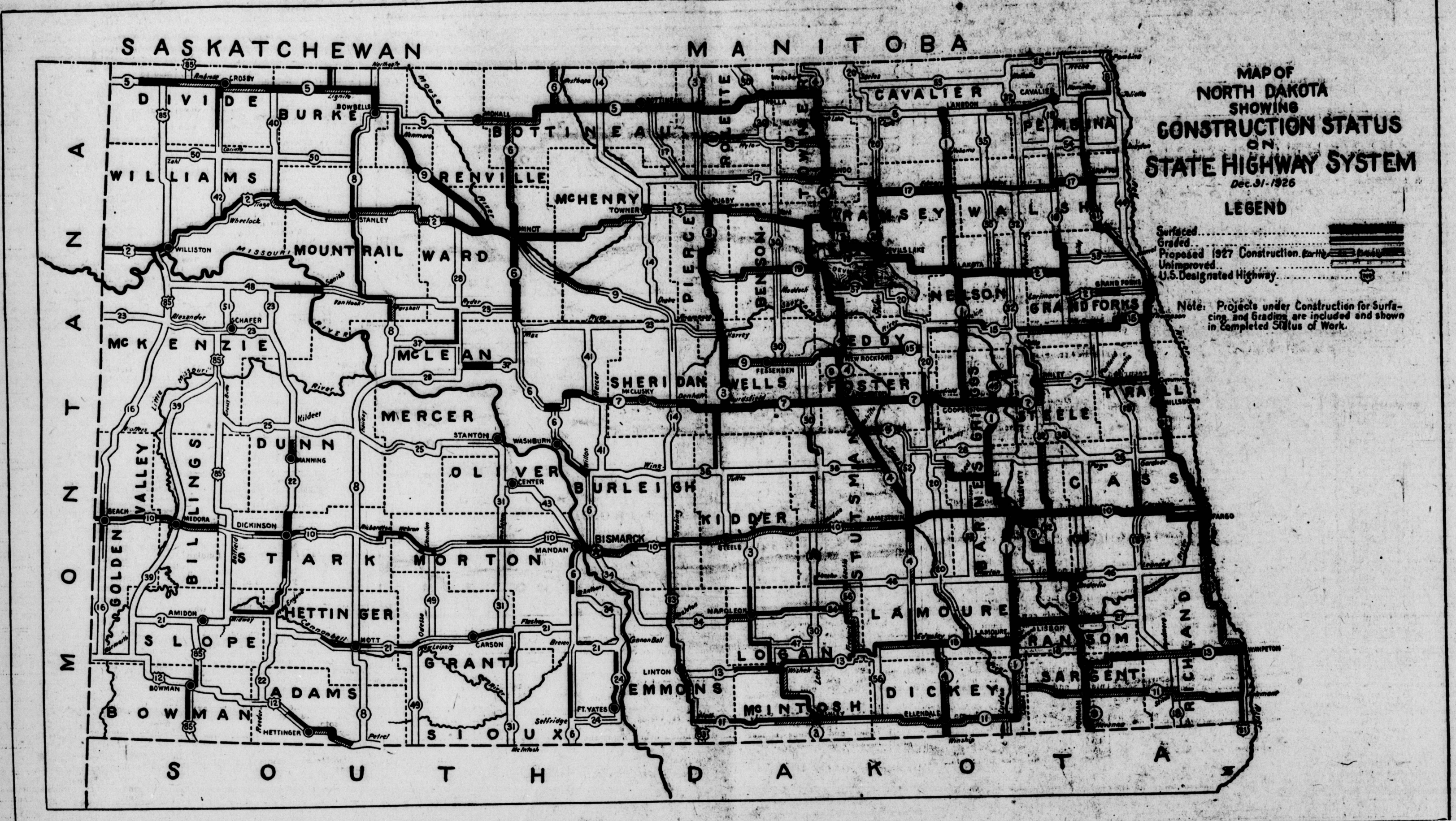


STATE HIGHWAY MAP WITH REVISED ROAD NUMBERS

A number of changes have been made in the road marking of the state highway system, due to the fact that there are five U. S. roads within its boundaries. The map above shows the changes in the numbering of the state highway system. The state highway numbers on U. S. roads will be either dropped from the system or changed to other state roads, where the number of such state roads conflicts with the numbers employed in marking the U. S. roads.

State Highway No. 2 will be dropped from the numbering system, State Highway No. 2 now becomes State Highway No. 39. State Highway No. 3, or the Red Trail, becomes U. S. Road No. 10 and the state road of a similar number will be marked as State Highway No. 3. The Meridian Highway, or State Highway No. 1, becomes U. S. Road No. 81, and State Highway No. 12 will receive the markers which are taken off of the Meridian Highway because the Yellowstone Trail, which was State Highway No. 16, becomes U. S. Road No. 12.

The reason for these changes is to prevent any confusion on the part of the traveling public which would result if the state highway numbering and the U. S. road numbering had two similar numbers.

New Marking to Be Done Soon

The new U. S. markers will be delivered to the department about the first of June and their erection will commence, as soon as weather conditions will permit, on U. S. Road No. 10, the first to be marked, by three marking crews. It is expected that the markings will be completed within three or four days thereafter. On the same day, two crews will remark State Highway No. 8 as U. S. Road No. 9 and should finish the job within ten days. The crews will next turn their attention to marking U. S. Road No. 81 and U. S. Road No. 16, and wind up the task of remarking the U. S. system with U. S. Roads No. 83 and No. 85. Later, the renumbered state highways will be changed in accordance with the new plan of marking, and the numerals on State Highways No. 12, No. 10, No. 2 and No. 24 removed and replaced with the new numerals. It is expected that the entire renumbered system will be completed by August of this year. Where new direction signs and new warning markers are to be erected, these will be in accordance with the standard marking system adopted by all states, and as the present markers of these types become worn or destroyed, the standard type will be employed to replace them and thus, gradually the entire state marking system brought to conform with the standard marking system.
