

### WALDORF-ASTORIA IS TO BE REPLACED BY 50-STORY BUILDING

Famous New York Hotel Has Been Society Center for Two Generations

New York, Dec. 21.—(P)—The Waldorf-Astoria hotel, famous as a center of New York social life for two generations, has been doomed to the wrecking bar.

Announcement of the sale of the property and plans to erect a 50-story office building on its site at fifth avenue and 33rd street, was made by Lucius M. Boomer, president of the Waldorf-Astoria realty corporation. The Bethlehem engineering corporation is the purchaser. Demolition of the structure is to begin next summer.

The Waldorf-Astoria originally was two hotels which were welded into one. The original hotel, the Waldorf, was opened in 1893 on the site of the mansion of William Waldorf Astor, who erected it shortly before he went to make his home in England, and became Lord Astor of Cliveden four years later the home of John Jacob Astor, adjoining on the 34th street frontage, was replaced by the Astoria and the two hotels were joined under the hyphenated name.

At the time of its opening the most luxurious hotel in America, the Waldorf-Astoria soon became more than a mere hotel. It was an institution and its name a symbol for the ultra-fashionable in the social life of the Metropolis.

"Peacock Alley" a name given to one of the main floor corridors where fashionable women were wont to promenade and display their finery, became known throughout the country.

In addition to social leaders, the hotel became the meeting place of nationally known financiers and politicians so that the stories of many stupendous business deals and political coups, even baseball deals, are interwoven with its history.

### LARGEST COUNTRIES ON BOTH AMERICAN CONTINENTS JOINED

Herbert Hoover Brings Message of Good Will to People of Brazil

U. S. S. Utah en route to Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, Dec. 21.—(P)—Bearing messages of greetings from the people of the largest North American republic to those of the largest South American republic, President-elect Hoover came today to the grand finale of his Latin-American good-will tour, a visit to Rio de Janeiro where he will remain through Sunday.

Unusual honors will be paid Mr. Hoover by the Brazilian government. President Luis will have him and his party as guests at the presidential palace while congress and the supreme court will hold special sessions at which leaders of the nation will speak. Mr. Hoover will reply briefly to each address, reserving his principal declaration of friendship between Brazil and the United States for the response to President Luis tomorrow night at the official banquet.

As the Utah neared the beautiful Brazilian capital, situated on a mountain surrounded by an island-studded harbor, she found the cruzeira Bahia and Rio Grande, waiting as an escort. The Brazilian squadron was commanded by Captain Gomen Soro, who flies his flag on the Bahia. The cruisers flanked the Utah which had been ordered to fire a national salute upon arrival at Rio de Janeiro harbor around noon today.

During the three days the Utah is in the harbor, it will be thrown open to the public and many visitors are expected to examine the battleship. She also will be inspected by a party of Brazilian naval officials accompanied by some members of the American naval mission to Brazil.

### SUB-ZERO WEATHER TURNS TO MELTING

Temperature Will Rise in Bismarck and State During Night and Tomorrow

Six below yesterday and melting today. Though it was five degrees below zero during early morning in Bismarck, citizens took out their rubbers to keep their feet dry as a bright sun brought streams of water to the sidewalks from melting snow on the tops of buildings.

Bismarck and North Dakota will be generally fair tonight and Saturday with temperature rising. East and central portions of the state will have pronounced temperature rises tonight and tomorrow.

It was 12 degrees below zero at Devils Lake during the night and four degrees below at 7 a. m. today. It was 13 degrees below zero at 7 a. m. at Moorhead and Fargo, while 14 degrees above was recorded at Williston.
