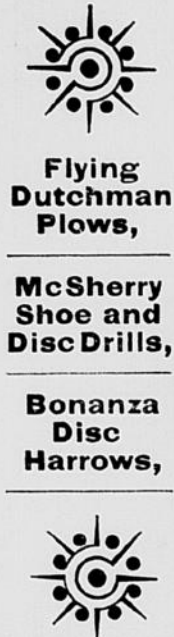


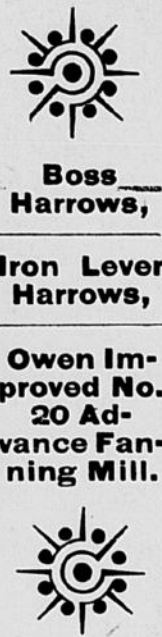
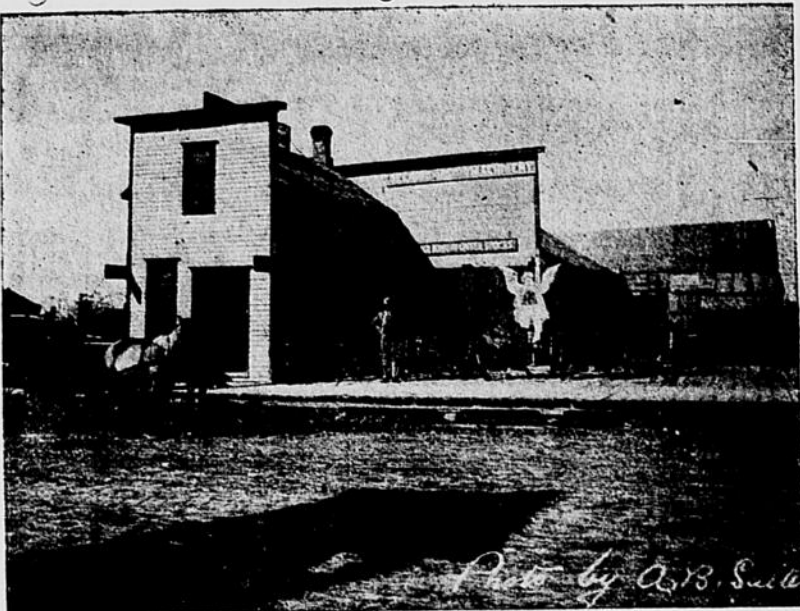

LEASE OF SCHOOL LANDS.

Vacant State and School Lands Will Be Leased May 7th.

A lease of state and school lands of Cavalier county will be held at the court house in this city on Wednesday, May 7, the day following the sale which Land Commissioner Laxdal has advertised for the state and school lands of this county. The list of lands to be leased is now on file in the office of Auditor Works and includes all lands that are not at present being held by lease. The land will be let in the usual manner, to the highest bidder and no bid will be entertained for less than 5 per cent of the appraised value of cultivated lands. It is also specified that in no case will a bid be entertained for any quarter section at less than \$4 per year. Lands appraised at \$10 or more per acre will be leased for one year only. All uncultivated lands appraised at less than \$10 an acre will be leased for a term of five years. The entire amount of the first year's rent together with the fee must be paid at the time of leasing, and deferred payments made on or before the first day of January each year. The leasing of the lands will begin at ten o'clock in the forenoon.

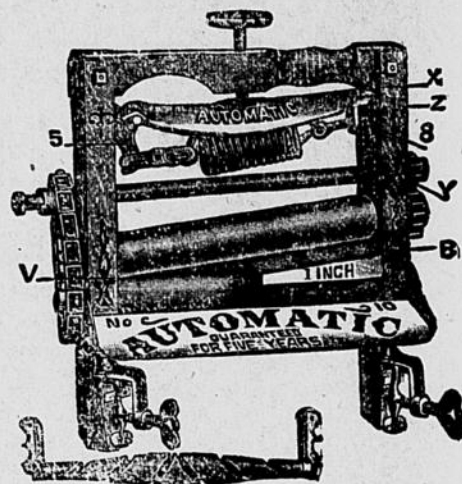

County Correspondence.

ROSEHILL.

There is plenty of wild duck shooting around the sloughs this spring.

One of the new comers, a Mr. Schanz, has lately moved into a new house, which he has built since spring opened.

H. Fast and Abraham Baker have gained local prominence in this locality through having completed one of the first horse trade around here this spring.

Frank Ballweg is recognized around here as the local veterinarian and may add to his notoriety by opening a butcher shop. Last week he was over at Isaac Kuukula's to dehorn several head of cattle.

Fred Willis, whose home heretofore has been down in the Valley, is here getting started with the spring's work on the farm he bought during the winter from Peter Martens.

John J. Baker has moved onto his homestead and started to run a batchelor hall. His shanty is likely to prove headquarters for the unmarried men of the settlement during the summer.

For over a week past all the people around here have been getting the spring's work started. The flax acreage this year will be bigger than ever in this section and much new land will be put under cultivation for the first time.

The biggest trade made around here for some time occurred last week when Henry Evert and Reinholt Klein traded farms. The two parties to the deal were busy the balance of the week moving the goods and chattels over from one place to the other.

Nearly all of the land around here which will be seeded to wheat has been put in and breaking plows are at it getting ready for flax. Much old land is also being plowed back this spring and will later be put into barley and oats.

The cranes gave Gordon township a short visit during the week. They sized up the sloughs and seemed to wonder at the strange way in which new buildings are fast dotting the prairie. They did not stay with us long but headed for the Canadian side of the line, where we hope they will fatten on grain raised by Manitoba farmers, returning in the fall to let us get a shot at them.

A MEDAL FOR ROSS.

Who With Six Other North Dakotans Faced Filipino Fire at Carbon River.

FOUGHT WITH YOUNG'S SCOUTS

Their Gallant Conduct Recommended by the Late Gen. Lawton for Medals of Honor—Senator Hansborough Asks Congress to Give the Medals They Have Earned.

There will be a medal of honor for Serg't Frank F. Ross, of this city, if Senator Hansborough is successful in an effort now being made at Washington to give the North Dakota volunteers the honors they merit. The senator has lately been investigating a seeming discrimination in the awarding of medals of honor and certificates of merit to the volunteers from this state who served with Young's scouts in the Philippines. The incident in which Serg't Ross and fifteen other men from this state figured as heroes of the war, was in the crossing and holding of a bridge on the Carbon river in the face of a fire from 600 Filipinos. The late General Lawton recommended they be awarded medals of honor for their bravery. The board at Manila, that considered these recommendations, presided over by General Bates, recommended that six of the fifteen, who crossed first, be given medals, and certificates awarded the other nine. Later the board at Washington, presided over by General McArthur, recommended a medal of honor for one man and certificates of merit to five others, including Ross, leaving the balance of the party, nine men without mention. The way in which the recommendations of the late General Lawton have been graded down and nine out of the fifteen men totally ignored shows that the carpet soldiery at Washington consider themselves better able to discriminate into whom recognition for bravery is due. Senator Hansborough cannot be engaged in better work on behalf of his constituents than righting the wrongs of the gallant boys from North Dakota, who fought in the Philippines. Serg't Ross and the handful of men, who with him held the bridge across the Carbon river in the face of the bullets of 600 Filipinos, should be awarded the medals. If the department of military affairs want to economize there are other leaks where drains on the coffers of the U. S. treasury can more fittingly be stopped.
