

The Woman's Corner

Many of the home-made dainties are as welcome at holidays as those bought from the candy shop. Indeed many may serve not only as sweet, but dessert, or for offering in the afternoons at informal gatherings, says an exchange. The girl who can make tempting "goodies" will always be popular. Here are some of the easy to make kind.

Chocolate Delights—Two squares unsweetened chocolate, one-half cupful melted butter, three eggs, one cupful sugar, three-quarters cupful flour, one-half teaspoonful each of baking powder and salt, one teaspoonful vanilla, one cupful chopped walnut meats. Melt the chocolate, add butter; beat the eggs, add sugar gradually, then flour; add this to the chocolate mixture, with the vanilla and walnuts. Spread on a shallow pan and bake twelve minutes.

Maple Puffs—One pound maple sugar, one cupful brown sugar, one cupful water, twelve marshmallows, whites of two eggs, one cupful chopped walnuts, one-half cupful candied cherries cut fine, one-half cupful candied pineapple. Place sugar in enamel saucepan add water and boil without stirring until the "firmball" stage. Cut marshmallows into pieces, remove saucepan from fire, add marshmallows, cover and let stand five minutes. Stir the syrup and pour slowly over the whipped egg whites, beating all the time. When the mixture begins to harden and hold its shape add nuts and fruit. Form into small cakes on paraffin paper, place a whole cherry on each and let them stand.

Fruit Paste—One cupful dates (stoned), one cupful figs, one cupful seeded raisins, one cupful candied cherries, two tablespoonfuls orange juice, one tablespoonful brown sugar. Put through chopper twice. Add sugar and orange juice; mix thoroughly. Dust breadboard with powdered sugar, form paste into roll about one-quarter inch thick. Dip each slice in powdered sugar. Serve in pretty glass dish.

Cocunut Cones—Grated small cocunut, sugar, flour, whipped white of egg. Grate the cocunut and add half its weight in sugar; stir in a very small quantity of flour and the whipped egg white and bake in a moderate oven for twenty minutes on paraffin paper.

Pumpkin Custard—Line a baking dish with a thin sheet of biscuit dough. Have ready one pint of cooked, washed squash or pumpkin. It should be quite dry. Add one tablespoonful of melted butter, one-half level teaspoonful of salt, one-half cupful of sugar and three eggs beaten with one and one-half cupful of milk; add one-half level teaspoonful of cinnamon and the same of ginger. Mix this well; pour into the dish. Bake in a good oven until set—about forty-five minutes.—Exchange.

Baked Cabbage—Crisp the cabbage in cold water. Cut in small sections, season with salt, lay two or three strips of bacon on top, and add a small amount of water. Cover casserole and put in oven to bake. It will require from thirty-five minutes to one hour, according to the amount of cabbage to be cooked and the temperature of the oven.—Exchange.

Names Fifty-three For National Security League Congress.

Snow early today; ice later; west winds.

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


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
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
