SOUTHERNERS IN PHILADELPHIA

speeches Delivered Before the Delegates to the Industrial Convention - The South Has Everything Except Population and Capital-Statistics to Prove

Philadelphia, Penn.—Delegates to the Southern Industrial Convention were welcomed by Governor W. A. Stone, of Pennsylvania, Mayor Ashbridge, of Philadelphia, and represen-tatives of various trade bodies. Governor Stone said that Pennsylvania representatives of the Southern States.

"Every one recognizes," he said, "that the South to-day is the greatest "that the South to-day is the greatest missionary field for commerce in the world. We recognize that the South produces two-thirds of all the cotton of the world and makes into finished product very little of it. This should not be continued. The South's manufacturing capacity should be developed, and she would then make cotton goods for the world."

Mayor Ashbridge assured the delegates to the city that Philadelphia had much which they could use, and that to increase the commerce between this city and the South would be mutually beneficial.

President H. H. Hargrove, of the

President H. H. Hargrove, of the Southern Industrial Association, responding, said the South's capacity to produce raw material was almost beyond measurement. He added:

"The Southern States contain one-fourth of the area of the Union, and have practically as much in agricultural products as all the rest of the country combined. This section has thirty-three per cent, of the population of the United States, raises all of its cotton and cottonseed, and American rice and eighty per cent, of its tobacco, contains thirty-five per cent, of its coal area, twenty per cent, of its coal production, produces seventeen and a half per cent, of its iron and furnishes eighty per cent of American pig iron and coal in the world, is the third largest cane sugar producing section of the world, producing section of the world, producing as section of the world, producing a section of the world, producing a sugar; contains more coast and river frontage than all the other States, and has thirty per cent, of its railroad mileage, and affords the cheepest lum.

"To achieve the fullest wealth which

coal and oil and living in the United States.

"To achieve the fullest wealth which the Southern States are capable of producing, I estimate that within five years there will be needed 5,000,000 additional population and \$500,000,000 additional capital for manufacturing, mineral, agricultural and forest development and railroad building."

In an address on "Popular Education, the Power of Industrial Progress," Robert C. Ogden, President of the Southern Educational Conference, said: "Intelligence has a cost value, and the intimate relation between business and education places the question of universal Southern education within the power of Southern business men. It is clear that practical knowledge increases production, creates more wealth, increases consumption and creates more wants. Encourage private beneficence to supplement the action of the State. The South has an educational mission. Will it rise to the opportunity?"

"His Smith spoke on "The Resources of the South," He said that the successful cultivation of one crop would not bring success to a region. To produce raw materials alone is not sufficient. It is necessary to prepare them for manufacturers use as well as to produce them. The South offers, he said, opportunity of every variety of cultivation—corn, wheat, rye, potatoes, tobacco, rice and fruits of all kinds. He said, it was not a fact that the South had sent a challenge to the cotton spinners of New England that had been a notice to them that they cannot continue to accumulate millions by shipping Southern lint cotton 1600 miles and manufacturing it into cotton to be shipped South again. He did not believe the destiny of the South lay in manufacturing cotton cloth in competition with New England. He opposed struggles between different parts of the country. The challenge of the South was to the world that she would manufacture her own cotton cloth and ship it to all parts of the world.

He spoke of the establishment of cchools both for manual and mental training and said that the Government could very easily supply half of the \$12,.000,000 Irregularly collected from the Scuth for a great technological college. He added:

"I wish the South to grew financially, that schools, colleges and churches may be opened to every child, that the great mass of people may be strengthened and blessed. I wish the South to do its full part, commercially, in the Union, that our nation may be more powerful in the family of nations, not for more splendor and glory, but that we as a nation may the more readily reach our great destiny, the upbuilding of the human race; that the Stars and Stripes may float upon every sea, carrying freedom and happiness to those it may visit—the symbol of a prosperous people, actuated by a brotherly love."

Big Sea Fighter Makes a Record of 17.31

Roston, Mass.—When the battleship Hilmois is turned over to the United States there will be added to the list of heavy fighting ships in the Navy the fastest craft of her class in the world. The big warship, over the Cape Ann course, had her official trial and her average speed for the four hours of steady steaming under forced draught was 17.31 knots per hour. This breaks the record of 17.01 established by her sister ship, the Alabama, and again it cellipses the most recent record of 17.12 raade by the Wisconsin, on the Pacific, a vessel of the same type, design and dimensions.

Not only did the Hilmois demonstrate that she was faster than any warship of her class, but she proved her ability to turn upon an enemy with extraordinary quickness by describing a complete circle within 300 yards, or little more than twice her length, in three minutes and ten seconds while ploughing through the sea at full speed.

Washington, D. C.—Preliminary reports of the spring wheat acreage indicates a reduction of about 1,200,000 acres, or 6.4 per cent. Of the twenty States reporting 10,000 acres or upward in spring wheat, eight give an increase aggregating about 34,000 acres and twelve a decrease amounting to about 1,235,000.

The average condition of spring wheat on June 1 was 92.0, as compared with 87.3, at the corresponding date last year and 91.4 on June 1, 1890.

The average condition of winter wheat declined in May 6.3 points, the condition on June 1 being 87.8, as against 94.1 on May 1. On June 1, 1900, the condition was \$2.7 and on the corresponding date in 1899, 67.3.

Ottawa, Out.—The aggregate trade of Canada for the eleven months ended on May 31 shows an increase of \$20,804,687, as compared with the previous year, the figures being \$329,352,721 for the present year, against \$308,-548,034 for the last fiscal year. This is on a basis of imports for consumption, and exports, exclusive of coin and bullion.
