## Riparian Rights

(Continued from page 1)

Capt. Wilson is willing to deed back to the borough the solid end of the wharf next to the shore with the space each side the width of the street. That means the extension of the streets. When the dashing waves washes the solid wharf away the Borough may repair it from public taxes, while the Pier Company does so now.

A boy was given a small bank to put his savings in. After it became full and valuable, he was offered a larger and more valuable bank empty, in exchange to be filled.

Will it be wise for the people of Penns Grove to let their representative give away the only river front they own?

A year ago the duPont engineers drove stake for a cottage at the end of Maple Avenue at the Cove to block the way to river. Josiah Sumner showed old deeds that the end of Maple Avenue had been used for a public landing for over a hundred years. The road from the river at the Cove to Biddle's Tavern, where Willard Layton lived, was laid out over 125 years ago. As the people own these rights they should not be surrendered to a corporation for the asking, and nothing given the people in return. Future generations will curse and dam the men who do it.

When W. A. Sack asked the council to accept Beach Avenue he expressly wrote in the grant that he retained the riparian right at the end of Beach Avenue. That has been the objection of the Council for not accepting the street in past years.

The State Court of Appeal on Wednesday set aside a riparian grant made in 1889, to the Lehigh Valley Railroad company for land in Jersey City.

The Railroad Company purchased the Morris Canal and shut it up to hinder competition. The "Big Basin" at the mouth of the canal has been recovered by the State.

This riparian right was granted to the Morris Canal Co. a public utility corporation. The highest Court has decided that the Canal Co. had no right to sell that riparian right to a railroad corporation which kept it from public use.

The extension of the Penns Grove wharf is most desirable. It would be a great accommodation to have the Wilson line boats to stop to and from Philadelphia, but insurance to the people of public rights heretofore enjoyed should be made secure.

Why should not Penns Grove people receive as much for the use of the riparian right at the end of Main Street as they receive for the granting of a liquor license; that is a public waiting room and a public toilet.

Now is the time to hold onto what the Penns Grove people own and not require future generations to fight for a public right and property of much value that may be given away now.

We call upon the citizens to help the Record guard against wharf rats devouring the Council and eating up the privileges our ancestors had, the privileges we now have and which we should transmit unimpaired to our children.
