

An Ordinance

An Ordinance to Regulate Automobiles or Motor Buses Commonly Called Jitneys.

Be it ordained by the Township Committee of the Township of Upper Penns Neck, County of Salem and State of New Jersey:

1.—No autobus or automobile for hire, commonly called jitney, heretofore licensed to operate in the township of Upper Penns Neck, County of Salem, State of New Jersey, shall operate on the streets or roads of the township of Upper Penns Neck unless within thirty days after the adoption of this ordinance the owner or owners thereof shall file with the township clerk an insurance policy of a company duly licensed to transact business under the insurance laws of the State of New Jersey, in the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5000.00) against loss from the liability imposed by law upon the auto bus owner for damages on account of bodily injury or death suffered by any person or persons as a result of an accident occurring by reason of the ownership, maintenance or use of such autobus upon the public streets or roads of the said township; such insurance policy shall provide for the payment of any final judgment recovered by any person on account of the ownership, maintenance and use of such autobus or any fault in respect thereto, and shall be for the benefit of every person suffering loss damage or injury as aforesaid; and provide further that a power of attorney shall be executed and delivered to such fiscal officer as his true and lawful attorney for the purpose of acknowledging service of any process out of a court of competent jurisdiction to be served against the insured by virtue of the indemnity granted under the insurance policy filed.

2.—No new license to operate a jitney in the Township of Upper Penns Neck, County of Salem, State of New Jersey, shall be granted until an insurance policy as provided for in paragraph No. 1 hereof shall be first filed with the Township Clerk.

3.—Any person now holding a license for the operating of a jitney in the Township of Upper Penns Neck who shall continue to operate after thirty days have elapsed after the adoption of this ordinance, who fails or refuses to file the bond as herein prescribed, or any other person who shall operate a jitney without having first obtained a license of the Township of Upper Penns Neck, or has failed to file the said bond, shall forfeit and pay for such neglect or refusal the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for each offense to be recoverable by action in the name of the Township of Upper Penns Neck in any court of competent jurisdiction, and when collected paid into the Township treasury.

All ordinances and parts thereof inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its final adoption. Introduced and passed first reading June 2, 1921.

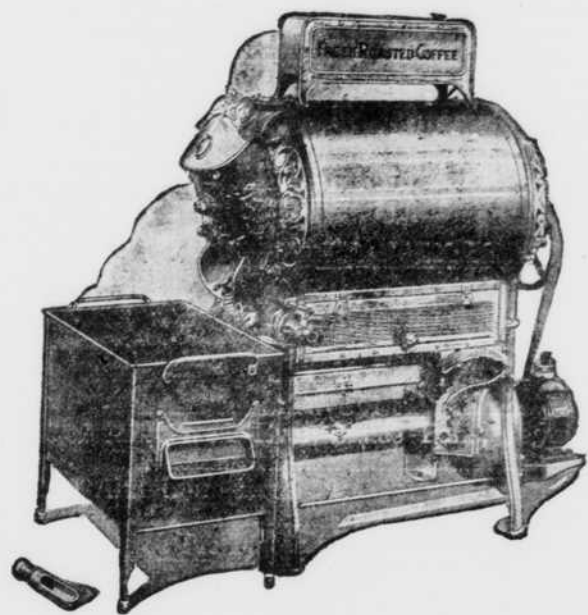
