EN ROUTE FOR HOME

The Indianapolis Nominees, Their Followers and the Delegates Board Outgoing Trains.

HEADQUARTERS TO OPEN

The First National Bank of Helena, Montana, Falls for a Very Large Amount.

BRYAN - M'KINLEY NEWS

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., September 4.—Both of the nominees of the "sound money" democratic convention left town, this morning, and nearly all the delegates and others who were in attendance, departed during the day.

BUCKNER REACHES HOME, LOUISVILLE, Ky., September 4.—General Buckner, national democratic nominee for vice-president, arrived in Louisville at 11:59 o'clock, this morning, with a special train which brought the Kentucky, Georgia, Tennessee Alabama and Florida delegations.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., September 4.—Chairman Bryan, of the national convention of the "sound money" party, announced, this morning, that headquarters would be located in Chicago, with a branch in New York.

MARKETS STRONG AND HIGH. WALL STREET, N. Y., September 4.—The railway and miscellaneous stock market opened strong and higher.

A Steamer Sunk. LONDON, England, September 4.—The British steamer "Ravenclough," from Alexandria for Hull, came into collision, off Finisterre, yesterday, with the steamer "Fastyan," from Antwerp for Leghorn, sinking the latter almost immediately. No lives were lost.

WASHINGTON, D. C., September 4.—The First National Bank, of Helena, Mont., failed, to-day; liabilities, \$3,450,000.

TOPEKA, Kas., September 4.—The J. B. Watkins land and mortgage company, of Lawrence, Kansas, has failed; liabilities, \$4,500,000.

PARIS, France, September 4.—In response to inquiries provoked by a report that Captain Albert Dreyfus, now undergoing confinement in French Guiana, under conviction of having sold government secrets to a foreign government, had made his escape, the colonial office has received a cablegram from the governor of French Guiana saying: "No change in the position of Dreyfus."

LONDON, England, September 4.—So strong has been the criticism of the radical papers upon the alleged luxurious surroundings of Dr. Jameson and his fellow raiders, since their sentence was so modified as to make them first-class misdemeanants, that the governor of Holloway prison, Lieutenant-Colonel Everard S. Milman, has found it necessary to issue a statement of the conditions by which the prisoners are governed.

LONDON, England, September 4.—Great interest is manifested in theatrical circles over the forthcoming production, at the St. James theater, of Miss Grace Hawthorne's stage version of "The Pilgrim's Progress," and it is heightened by the announcement that Miss Hawthorne will play "Christian" in black tights and doublet. The book of the play has been approved by the censor attached to the lord chamberlain's office, and it is consequently to be assumed that it contains nothing likely to shock the sensibilities of the admirers of John Bunyan's eternal allegory.

WASHINGTON, D. C., September 4.—After breakfast, this morning, Li Hung Chang announced that he did not feel like hanging around his superb apartments all morning, receiving officials, as had been mapped out in the program, but he would like to see the capitol, if he had time, before keeping his appointment at the Chinese legation.

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THE NEW COMMANDER

Major Thaddeus Clarkson, of Nebraska, Now at the Head of the Grand Army.

SOME NECK-STRETCHING

Populist Ticket Will Probably be Adopted by the Nebraska Democrats To-day.

AN OKLAHOMA POPULIST

ST. PAUL, Minn., September 4.—The closing sessions of the national encampment of the grand army are being held to-day. A favorable report was made upon the suggestion of a retiring commander-in-chief that the office of the adjutant-general and quarter-master-general be consolidated, and that hereafter all supplies should be issued under the direction of the adjutant-general by the custodian of records, J. Henry Hoicomb, who has offices in Independence hall, Philadelphia.

MAY CUT A FIGURE

The Release of Dr. Gallagher May Re-Open the Dr. Cronin Case.

NEW YORK, N. Y., September 4.—The release from Portland prison of Dr. Thomas Gallagher, the Irish political prisoner, is likely to again re-open that phase of the Irish controversy that is connected with the assassination in Chicago of Dr. P. H. Cronin. Dr. Gallagher was one of the Irish-Americans sent to England by the Clan-na-Gael in 1882 and whose identity was disclosed to the British police, almost immediately on their arrival, with the result that they were under surveillance until they committed some overt act, or the police could capture them with dynamite in their possession.

FILLED CHEESE

WASHINGTON, D. C., September 4.—The law passed at the last session of congress, at the instance of the national dairy union, which is aimed against the manufacturer of filled cheese, goes into effect to-day. Under its provisions, the retail dealer must pay an annual fee of \$3 for the privilege of selling it, and the manufacturer a tax of one cent a pound for the privilege of making it. Moreover, the cheese must be stamped on the top and on the bottom and around the outside. Not only this, but the retailers must display outside or inside of their stores a sign in letters six inches in height: "Filled cheese sold here." Disregard of the law is punishable with a fine of \$50 and confiscation of the cheese for each offense.

MESSAGES OF CONGRATULATION

CANTON, Ohio, September 4.—Major McKinley is receiving many messages of congratulation on the result of the Indianapolis convention. His friends are all of the opinion that the nomination of a "sound money" democratic ticket makes Illinois certain for McKinley.

NOTICE TO BICYCLISTS

The City Ordinance, Made and Provided, Will Be Strictly Enforced by the Marshal.

SECTION 3. Every person, firm or corporation using any bicycle, tricycle or velocipede, within the limits of the city of East Las Vegas, shall pay an annual license for such use of one dollar and fifty cents, for vehicles and no vehicle mentioned in this section shall be run or used, on any sidewalk of said city, and all such vehicles in this section mentioned, shall carry a lamp at night-time, sufficient in capacity to fully notify people of the approach of such vehicles, and persons using such vehicles on the streets of said city, shall carry some sufficient instrument to give alarm, and shall in all cases when approaching persons on the streets, give ample and sufficient alarm indicating such approach.

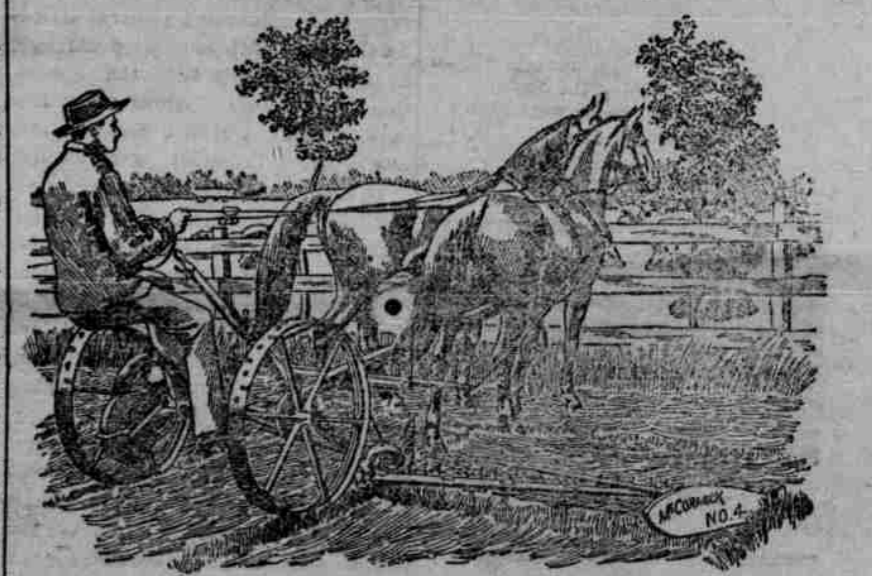
