POLITICAL PALAVER.

In just two weeks from to-day, the arroyo will be over. When a laboring man sells his labor, he is not called upon to throw in his vote as good measure. Jas. S. Durcan is in the fight to win, that means he will roll up a majority of 1,000 for a seat in the council. Captain J. W. Barney writes to friends here that if McKinley is elected he stands in a position to get the fat office of United States pension agent. The republicans have established their headquarters on the plaza near the office of Col. M. Brunswick, and the union headquarters are directly over the Kaufmann second hand store on Bridge street. In one small precinct not five miles from Las Vegas, forty men who had opposed the union party two years ago, have declared openly for that ticket this year, and came to town to make the fact known, yesterday. An interesting interview with F. A. Manzanera appears in the New Mexican of yesterday. Mr. Manzanera clearly shows that the low price of wool is due more to the stagnation of business caused by the contraction of the currency, than it is to the tariff law in force. It has been suggested that the different printers about town who will have the printing of the election tickets in hand, get together and agree upon a definite arrangement of names and offices so that it will conform to the poll book. In this way the counting of the vote will be greatly facilitated. The populists feel that they have been snubbed by both parties and are going to put a straight ticket in the field for county offices. Hon. H. B. Ferguson will be their unanimous choice for delegate to congress, just the same as he is for most every other man in the county, who is not a hide-bound partizan. Grand Officers, K. of P. Nearly all the offices were filled by new men, it being but fair that the honors should be distributed.

It is reported that the Atkinson has recently made a survey of the section north of Silver City, to determine the feasibility of turning the flood waters from the mountains and diverting the floods into the gulch east of town. It is claimed that this could be done at an expenditure of less than \$10,000. The railroad company and the city could well afford to spend this amount of money. It would save them twenty-five to fifty per cent of that sum every year. Report reaches this office just as THE OPTIC goes to press, that Miss Ella Bloom had died at 2:30 o'clock this afternoon.
