## WHEAT DROPS A NOTCH

Special Telegram to the Optic.  
DENVER, Colorado, October 21.—  
The republican national committee,  
to-day issued a manifesto, which is  
said to be from the pen of Mark Han-  
na himself, in which he denies that it  
is the policy of the republican leaders  
to advocate the coercion of the em-  
ployees by employers who are sound  
money men. The republican man-  
agers look upon the charge as serious  
and offer to unite with the democratic  
national committee in any movement  
looking to the end of doing away with  
coercion if the same does exist any-  
where in the United States.

**Safe Crackers at Work.**  
KANSAS CITY, Missouri, October 21.—  
It is reported that the safe in the bank  
at Casville, Mo., was blown open by  
robbers last night, and that a consid-  
erable sum of money was secured. The  
bank officials decline to give any par-  
ticulars.

**Taken Suddenly Insane.**  
DENVER, Colorado, October 21.—  
Edward Heston, of San Francisco, who  
arrived here from California to-day,  
was taken suddenly insane, on the  
streets, this morning. It took five of-  
ficers to overpower him. He was  
taken to an institute.

**The Natural Consequences.**  
FREDERICKSBURG, Va., October 21.—  
W. T. Rumbush, the absconding  
banker from Wisconsin, killed himself  
here last night. Rumbush came here  
a week ago and registered at the hotel,  
as C. T. Anderson. He shot himself  
in the National cemetery.

**Steamer "Alesia" Disabled.**  
NEW YORK, N. Y., October 21.—  
The French steamer "Alesia" which  
sailed from this port October 15th, for  
Naples, has returned. She broke her  
piston rod and put back for repairs.  
The "Alesia" had 150 passengers on  
board who will be forwarded by  
another line.

**A Strong Market.**  
WALL STREET, N. Y., October 21.—  
The market opened strong and higher  
this morning. There was a rush to  
buy sugar, western railway issues and  
L. & N., and prices advanced from 1/4  
to 1/2 per cent. Sugar led the rise with  
sales up to 111 1/4. The report delayed  
by wire trouble.

**Force Watson's Name On.**  
TOPEKA, Kansas, October 21.—  
The mandamus proceedings against  
Secretary of State Edwards, to compel  
him to insert Watson's name on the  
ballot, was argued in the Kansas su-  
preme court, to-day. The judges took  
the cases under advisement and will  
give a decision to-morrow morning.

**Canton the Mecca.**  
CANTON, Ohio, October 21.—Major  
McKinley will have 10,000 visitors to-  
day. Special trains have been arriv-  
ing since 5 o'clock this morning. The  
great majority came from Illinois. The  
Garfield club, of Ohio, from the dis-  
trict represented by the late General  
Garfield, is here 3,000 strong. Hon.  
S. A. Northway is to be the spokesman  
for the Garfield club. As all the Chi-  
cago and Illinois visitors do not reach  
Canton till 2 o'clock, the parade will  
not be held until the middle of the af-  
ternoon.

**The American University.**  
WASHINGTON, D. C., October 21.—  
The corner stone of the history building,  
the first of the buildings to comprise  
the American university, was laid this  
afternoon in the presence of a large  
crowd of spectators with interesting ex-  
ercises. The ceremonies were con-  
ducted by the venerable senior bishop  
of the Methodist church, Thomas Bow-  
man, assisted by the district grand  
lodge of masons John E. Andrews,  
of New York, president of the board  
of trustees, was the presiding officer.

**Harrison Honored.**  
BORDEN, Indiana, October 12.—Gen.  
Harrison's special train entered New  
Albany at 9 o'clock this morning, from  
Evansville, amid a tremendous tooting  
of whistles and firing of cannon. The  
street leading from the depot to Scrib-  
ner's park, where the meeting was  
held, was packed with people. The  
crowd at the park was estimated at  
from 25,000 to 30,000 people. General  
Harrison was given a great ovation  
when he appeared on the stand. He  
addressed himself first to the work-  
men of whom the crowd was largely  
composed.

**Want the Castle's Address.**  
LONDON, England, October 21.—  
Solicitor Abraham, of the United  
States embassy, was besieged this  
morning, by the reporters endeavoring  
to obtain the address of Mr. and Mrs.  
Castle, of San Francisco, who were  
committed for trial, yesterday, charged  
with shop-lifting. The solicitor re-  
fused to disclose their whereabouts,  
though he admitted that the Castles  
were in London. Solicitor Abraham  
said that Mr. Castle is absolutely in-  
nocent, and that justice required his re-  
lease. Mrs. Castle, he said, was  
much broken down by her ordeal. Her  
defense, Abraham intimated, would be  
mental irresponsibility, owing to suf-  
ferings peculiar to females. He did  
not appear, however, over confident of  
the success of the defense in securing  
Mrs. Castle's acquittal.

## HIGH IN CATHOLACY.

A Meeting of Moment to the Catholic Church  
in America.

WASHINGTON, D. C., October 21.—  
Events and policies of great moment to  
the Catholic church are expected to be  
discussed and as far as practicable  
settled, to-day and to-morrow, at the  
Catholic university of America, in this  
city. Successors to the presidency of  
the university which was made vacant  
by the resignation of Bishop Keane, is  
one of the matters to be taken up, the  
order is as to what agreement can be  
reached by the council and arch-  
bishops as to the schools from which  
congress last year, withdrew its sup-  
port. Most of the prelates have ar-  
rived in the city. The directors met at  
10 o'clock this morning and will prob-  
ably remain in session until 4 p. m.  
At the meeting this afternoon, the  
directors of the Catholic university will  
be presented with a paper of \$600,000  
subscribed by members of the Ancient  
Order of Hibernians, for the endow-  
ment of a Celtic chair in the institution.  
According to the programme President  
O'Connor will make the presentation,  
recounted by Bishop Foley, national  
chaplain of the Hibernians, and re-  
sponse will be made by Cardinal Gio-  
vanni, who is chancellor of the board of  
directors.

## TONS OF LITERATURE.

Almost An Arsenal for Every Voter in the  
United States.

CHICAGO, Ill., October 21.—The  
literary bureau of the republican  
national executive committee closed  
down to-day, the managers having  
reached the conclusion that the people  
have all the literature they want to en-  
able them to make up their mind what  
way they shall vote in the coming elec-  
tion. Since getting into working order,  
the bureau has prepared and issued  
tens of millions of documents covering  
financial, tariff and other issues.

**Rough statistics show that from the  
headquarters here there have been is-  
sued 60,000,000 copies of leaflets and  
pamphlets, while the congressional  
committee at Washington has gotten  
rid of 40,000,000 additional. In addi-  
tion the American sound money league  
has scattered broadcast 10,000 copies.  
Apart from these the republican com-  
mittee has purchased of authors and  
contributors some 10,000 copies, while  
it is estimated that the donations filed  
of cost reach 5,000,000 copies.**

**Bears Rule in Wheat.**  
CHICAGO, Illinois, October 21.—  
A flurry in which the bulls came out  
second best took place at the opening  
of the wheat market to-day. The ex-  
cited attendant upon the trade ran  
quite high. When the market opened  
up, rapid selling was inaugurated and  
December wheat, the option dropping to  
76 1/2. The decline was clearly the  
result of foreign indifference. Liver-  
pool was two cents higher, but that ad-  
vance was not in keeping with the  
anxiety that is said to exist abroad.  
Imports were also attached to the ap-  
parent lukewarmness of San Francisco,  
where the boom appeared to have been  
first checked. At the end of the first  
half hour of the session, a further  
weakness assailed the prices and Decem-  
ber fell off to 76 1/2 where it rested,  
at 3/4, under yesterday's close.

**Chicago, Illinois, October 21.—**  
Rapidly vanishing profits very soon  
forced the selling and for the time it  
appeared as though the break would be  
disastrous, but it finally became strong  
and a partial rally took place. Decem-  
ber holding in the neighborhood of  
78 cents, 2 1/2 under yesterday.

**The Tangle With Watson.**  
CHICAGO, Illinois, October 21.—  
No definite understanding has yet been  
reached between Washburn of the peo-  
ple's party respecting Vice Presi-  
dential Candidate Wa on and Chairman  
Jones of the democratic national com-  
mittee. The conference last night was  
followed this morning by another con-  
sultation. Washburn was advised by  
wife of the result of Washburn's in-  
terviews with Jones. It is not prob-  
able that any arrangement whereby  
Watson will give his full support to  
the democratic ticket, without stultify-  
ing himself, can be effected before  
this evening, if at all.

## MURDEROUS ROBBERS

A Desperate and Fruitless Rob-  
bery That Left a Bloody  
Murder in Its Train.

## THE CLEVELANDS VISITING

Bryan Reaches Indiana to Make  
the Great Fight of His Life  
Among Hoosiers.

## THE EPISCOPAL BISHOPS

FREMONT, Ohio, October 21.—Two  
masked men entered the home of Wm.  
Bitke, west of Fremont, last night, and  
with drawn revolvers, demanded mon-  
ey. Without giving Bitke time to com-  
ply, the robbers opened fire and shot  
him through the breast, killing him in-  
stantly. Mrs. Bitke attempted to de-  
fend her husband and was shot in the  
right arm, when she tried to escape,  
she was beaten on the head with re-  
volvers in the hands of the murderers,  
and is now in a precarious condition.  
The house was then ransacked from  
top to bottom, but the robbers secured  
only an old silver watch, falling to find  
the large sum of money which was in  
the house. A posse is now in pursuit,  
and if the murderers are caught, short  
work will be made of them.

**The Cleveland's Go Visiting.**  
WASHINGTON, D. C., October 21.—  
President and Mrs. Cleveland leave  
here this afternoon on the Pennsylvania  
railroad for Princeton where they will  
review the college in the coming after-  
noon. They are expected back  
in Washington to-morrow night.

**Protestant Episcopal Bishops.**  
NEW YORK, N. Y., October 21.—  
The house of bishops of the Protestant  
Episcopal church convened at 10  
o'clock, this morning, and the nomina-  
tion reported by the committee of  
three names, not divulged, for the new  
bishopric of Duluth. After commen-  
tal service, the bishops proceeded to  
vote.

**New York, N. Y., October 21.—**  
The house passed resolutions of sym-  
pathy with the wife of Bishop Winfield,  
of northern California, whose mind has  
become unbalanced.

**Bryan Among the Hoosiers.**  
RICHMOND, Ind., October 21.—Mr.  
Bryan reached Richmond at 10 o'clock  
this morning, and began his Indiana  
campaign there. He spoke at 10 o'clock  
this morning to a very large and en-  
thusiastic crowd at Tiffin, Ohio, and at  
9:30 a. m. was awakened by a brass  
band and a lot of enthusiasts at Tip-  
ton. Bryan's special train lay until  
7:40 o'clock in the railroad yards at  
Urbans.

**The first stop after leaving, was at  
Bradford Junction, Ohio, which was  
reached at 8 o'clock, but Mr. Bryan  
was so much fatigued from his day and  
the harder night of campaigning that  
he was not awakened to meet the peo-  
ple there. At Greenville, where the  
Ohio campaign ended, Mr. Bryan  
spoke for fifteen minutes to about  
4,000 people.**
