BRYAN FOR SENATOR

The State of Washington May Conclude to Send Him to the Senate.

Mrs. Castle's Condition is Worse and a Pardon Will Probably be Granted.

FARMERS IN CONGRESS

SEATTLE, Wash., November 9.—A boom has been started here for Bryan, for United States senator from this state. The silver fanatics will control the senatorship. The constitution of the state of Washington provides that to be eligible to the office of senator the candidate shall be merely an "inhabitant" of the state at the time of his election so that the fusion majority could elect Mr. Bryan without any trouble. Richard Windsor, Jr., the populist leader in Washington and James Hamilton Lewis, democratic fusionist and member elect of congress are rival candidates for the senatorship and Mr. Bryan has been suggested as a compromise.

These formalities having been observed the home secretary will advise the queen that pardon should be granted. This procedure is absolutely necessary before the royal pardon setting Mrs. Castle at liberty can be issued.

A FARMERS CONGRESS

Meets in the Hooper Capitol To-day to Discuss Fourteen Cent Corn and Eight Cent Oats.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., November 9.—Delegates are arriving in large numbers in advance of the sixteenth annual meeting of the Farmers' National Congress, which opens to-morrow at the state house for a four days' session. Speaking of the purpose of the congress, Hon. John M. Stahl, one of its founders, said this morning: "It is a successful effort to bring into annual assemblage representatives of all farmers' organizations and also of that great body of farmers who are unaffiliated. The congress is not antagonistic to any other agricultural body and is strictly non-partisan. It has neither dues nor salaries. Delegates pay their own expenses and the officers get no pay for their work. "The present congress comes at an opportune moment. The times are indeed hard, but in what way can the farmers do more to make times better, in what way can they do more to raise the price of fourteen-cent corn and eight-cent oats, than by meeting the national congress to decide what measures and movements are best for their interests, and to present them to legislative bodies and the people backed by the tremendous force of all the farmers of the country?"

EVENT OF THE SEASON.

The National Horse Show of New York Brings Out All the New Tricks.

NEW YORK, N. Y., November 9.—The annual exhibit of the national horse show association opens in Madison square garden this evening, and the private view this afternoon was largely attended. This annual event sets the season's fashions in feminine apparel. The show is to be one of the largest and best ever held, while the prizes aggregate the liberal total of \$33,000, to be awarded in premiums to all classes. Large delegations of society folk are here from Chicago, Philadelphia, Boston and other cities. A feature of the show is two imported thoroughbred Hackneys exhibited for the first time in this country by Eben D. Jordan, of Boston, who also shows his famous Maximilian, which has twice taken the prize at the national exhibit.

LORD MAYOR'S DAY.

Alderman Geo. F. Phillips Takes the Responsibilities of That Great Office To-day.

LONDON, England, November 9.—The celebration to-day of Lord Mayor's day was attended by the usual eclat. The vicinity of Guildhall, Chesapeake, Leadenhall street, High Holborn, the Thames Embankment and the other thoroughfares over which the procession passed were thronged with spectators. The parade was on a scale of grandeur commensurate with former years, and the floats and tableaux were unusually elaborate. The weather was bright and the crowd enormous. The procession was more of the nature of a military parade than usual, contingents, regulars, volunteers, cavalry and artillery being included in it. Entire show was of the most gorgeous character. The usual exercises were followed in the inauguration of the new Lord Mayor, Alderman George F. Phillips, and who promises to be a popular incumbent of the civic chair.

WANTS TO KILL MAYOR SWIFT, OF CHICAGO, AND PRESIDENT-ELECT MCKINLEY.

CHICAGO, Illinois, November 9.—Joseph Maruska walked into the city hall, this afternoon, intent upon killing Mayor Swift. Maruska asked in an excited manner to be directed to the mayor's office. An officer took him to the detective headquarters. Maruska declared that the mayor was a menace to society and reached for his hip pocket. He succeeded in drawing a bulldog revolver, but was disarmed by the officers at hand. Maruska swore he would kill Mayor Swift and then go to Canton and despatch President-elect McKinley, both of whom, he said, must die before the country could prosper. He was handcuffed after a hard struggle and locked up.

Mrs. Castle to be Pardoned.

LONDON, England, November 9.—Solicitors acting in the behalf of Mrs. W. Castle, of San Francisco, who was sentenced to three months imprisonment here last week, say that they have reason to hope that an order for her release is to be issued by the home office this afternoon. Mr. Castle will visit his wife at Wormwood Scrubs prison, this afternoon. At the prison Mrs. Castle is dressed in the regulation prison garb but owing to the shortness of the sentence her hair has not been cut.

LONDON, England, November 9.—

Mr. Castle said this afternoon that he would not attempt to see his wife to-day. He had a long interview with her in the hospital at Wormwood Scrubs prison, yesterday, and found her in a highly hysterical condition and in a much worse state than when she entered prison. Mr. Castle said that the officials of the home office had been exceedingly courteous to him, but informed him that the physicians con-

A MAN O' WAR SUNK

The United States Battleship "Texas" Touches Bottom in Brooklyn Navy Yard.

A. R. U. MEN PARDONED

A Crank Wants to Kill Mayor Swift and President-Elect McKinley.

ATCHISON'S RECEIVERSHIP

NEW YORK, N. Y., November 9.—The battleship "Texas" met with an accident, this morning, while lying in dock in the Brooklyn navy yard awaiting repairs. A "sea-cook" blew out in a mysterious manner, causing a rush of water into the ship's hold. The "Texas" settled considerably in the water and listed to starboard. The water is being pumped out of the ship and divers are at work investigating the damage done. The ship is in an easy position and no apprehension is felt for her safety.

NEW YORK, N. Y., November 9.—

The "Texas" is now resting easily on the mud bottom at Cob dock. There was only two feet of water under her when the accident happened. It now appears that the water did not reach the hold, but filled the engine compartment. Steam-pumps are now pumping the water out. Captain Glass is in personal control of the work and says the rules of the department forbid him talking about the matter. Commandant Sicard, of the navy yard, says the exact cause of the accident is not known, and will not be until the divers have finished. He expects the ship to be all right within twenty-four hours.

NEW YORK, N. Y., November 9.—

The divers came up after a thorough inspection of the battleship at noon. They report the accident due to the breaking of the yoke which holds in place the bonnet of the main injection valve, situated in the engine room. Engineer Higgins was in the engine room when the accident occurred and had a narrow escape. He sounded the alarm immediately and in less than three minutes every compartment in the ship closed, thus preventing water from flooding the entire man-of-war. The ship had a narrow escape, had she been in deep water she would have certainly gone clear to the bottom and possibly every soul on board would have been lost. All the water has been pumped out of her, out and the work of putting in the new yoke on the broken valve will be an easy matter.

WASHINGTON, D. C., November 9.—

This afternoon Secretary Herbert ordered the court of inquiry to investigate the sinking of the "Texas" and fix the responsibility for the accident. The court will meet at the New York navy yard Wednesday next.

LONDON, England, November 9.—

A despatch from Seville, Spain, says that two steamers have been wrecked by a collision at the entrance of the Guadalquivir river. One steamer was sunk and twenty passengers were drowned. Most of those lost, were wealthy and prominent persons.

A. R. U. Men, Pardoned.

WASHINGTON, D. C., November 9.—The president has pardoned W. H. Clune, Isaac Ross and Philip Stanwood, of California, who were sentenced December 16th, 1894, to pay a fine of one dollar and to be confined in the Los Angeles county jail eighteen months for conspiracy, the offense being committed in the railway riots at that time so general throughout the country. The men did not begin serving the time until after the sentences were affirmed by the supreme court of the United States. They had served more than nine months imprisonment to date.

ATCHISON RECEIVERSHIP.

Matters Take a Different Turn—The Case to Come Before the United States Court.

OKALOOSA, Kansas, November 9.—The proceedings against the Santa Fe railway company, wherein it was sought to throw its property, located in Kansas, in the hands of a receiver, took an unexpected and interesting turn to-day. The case was taken out of the Jefferson county court and transferred to the United States court, to be heard by Judge Foster, on the ground that as all provisions, ordered by the United States court in the former receivership matter, had not yet been complied with and the master in chancery discharged, the road is yet in the hands of the United States court and hence no suit against it, could be brought in any district court. The case was also taken out of the hands of County Attorney Phynney, of Jefferson county, who brought the suit, by Governor Morrill who issued an order instructing the attorney to take charge of the case. The governor's action makes a controversy now, between the state exclusively, and the road. If, as is rumored, there is any scheme back of the case, the governor's action nips it in the bud.
