RACE WON BY OXFORD

Contrary to Expectation, Oxford Won the Boat Race Over Cambridge, To-Day.

SEVERAL BAD FIRES OCCUR

Editor Acquitted of the Charge of Inciting Revolutions Against Mexico.

THE "IOWA" IS LAUNCHED

NEW YORK, N. Y., March 28.—A dispatch from London says: The fifty-second annual boat race between the picked crews of Oxford and Cambridge universities was short to-day of none of its usual excitement. There was an even larger entourage of spectators than in any previous year, while, in the matter of enthusiasm and general jollity, it might have been a Derby day. There were fewer royalties and members of the aristocracy on the banks than last year, but the wage-workers, shopkeepers and professional men turned out in their scores of thousands, and the banks of the Thames from Putney to Mortlake were black with people. Off shore, on both sides of the stream, there was a continuous line of gall decorated launches and tug boats occupied by the "upper ten," while here and there on shore were four-in-hands, tally-hos, dog-carts and other handsome equipages of the smart set, which aided in giving a picturesque color to the scene. Every body displayed a ribbon according to his or her predilection, the dark blue of the Oxonians appearing by all odds to be the most in favor. Largely due to the fact that the crews were regarded as being so well matched, there was less betting than usual, the odds, when any could be found, being a trifle in favor of the dark blues. The weather was fair, but there was a trifle of wind from the lee shore which tended to make the water somewhat choppy. The tide was full at 1:23. Nearly an hour earlier the Cambridge nine made their appearance from the Star and Garter Inn, at Putney, and took to their shells. The Oxonians followed fifteen minutes later. Both crews were greeted with enthusiastic cheers from the throng in the vicinity. At 1:17 the crack of the pistol came from the umpire's tug, and both boats shot forward, that of Cambridge having its nose in the lead. The light blues maintained their advantage up to Craven's Cottage, three-quarters of a mile, where the Oxonians put on a spurt and crossed their bow to the meadow's side, keeping well to the fore of the light blues and the lead mill. As Hamm-rath the dark blues were making thirty-six strokes to the minute, and their opponents about thirty-four. Encouraged by the cheers of an immense crowd of their friends at this point, the light blues bent to their oars and, plowing the water at a forty stroke, shot along like an electric current until they had reached and passed the Oxonians by nearly two lengths. The lead they maintained at Thornycroft's, the three-mile point; but the dark blues, moving their oars like clockwork, at a forty-one stroke, came abreast at the Devonshire meadows, and had a lead of a half-length at Barnes Bridge, three and one-half miles from the start. Each crew then bent for a supreme spurt over the remaining half-mile, and the oars flew at forty-two strokes. The Oxonians doggedly maintained their lead, crossing the line at the Ship Inn, at Mortlake, a quarter length in advance. Unofficial time was twenty minutes, thirty-five rounds; distance (official) four miles. Twenty-five thousand people awaited the finish at the Ship Inn, and the reception given the defeated crew, for its gallant struggle, was hardly a whit less enthusiastic than that accorded the victors. The latter, upon landing from their shells, were caught upon the shoulders of their friends and carried, bodily, to the club room of the Inn. This afternoon, in accordance with time-honored custom, the victors banqueted the vanquished.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 28.—The senate indulged in an acrimonious political debate, yesterday, which developed much personal and party feeling and brought on two sharp personal exchanges between Senators Hill and Elkins and between Senators Brice and Elkins. The controversy arose over Hill's motion to strike from the pending appropriation bill the proposed change of date of the assembling of the New Mexican legislature from December to May, claiming that it was a "political trick." Senator Cullom moved to lay on the table the motion of Hill, to strike out the New Mexico provision. The motion was defeated, 29 to 21. Cullom then stated that he would not further resist Hill's motion.

NEW MEXICO QUARANTINE. All Mexican Cattle Will Have to Enter at El Paso, Texas.

The Territorial sanitary live stock board of New Mexico has quarantined against cattle from Mexico, and in the future all Mexican cattle will have to pass through the El Paso port. The order of the New Mexico board placing a prohibitory embargo on Mexican cattle was sudden and unexpected, and from Captain Alexander Lobb, government inspector, the El Paso Times learns that the quarantine left 2,100 head of cattle on the line, thus entailing serious loss to the owners who had carried the cattle to the line for exportation into this country through New Mexico ports.

It is understood that the New Mexico board made no investigation, but are acting on willful rumors to the effect that large numbers of cattle brought out of Mexico died of Texas fever and that they were burned to prevent the proper authorities from discovering the presence of the disease. The officers are of the opinion that if any cattle have been killed and burned, they were smuggled stock and were destroyed by the smugglers to save themselves, and who then started the fever stories to cover up their crookedness.
