If passed by the house, the senate is certain to agree.

CHICAGO, Illinois, April 9.—The Schwartz block, on Madison street, lost three of the upper floors by fire, this morning. The loss is \$100,000.

Senator Morgan Ill.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 9.—Senator Morgan, of Alabama, is very ill with congestion of the liver, though his condition is not considered critical, this afternoon.

Probably Not So.

LONDON, England, April 9.—It is rumored here to-day that Cecil Rhodes, who has been suffering with fever to Matabeleland, is dead. The rumor is disbelieved in official circles.

Died Together.

SALER, Mass., April 9.—Josephine Manning, dress-maker, and James Flynn, her lover, were found dead in a burning house, this morning, both having been shot through the head.

Wholesale Killing.

OGDEN, Utah, April 9.—Five men were killed by an explosion of dynamite in Ogden canon, last night. The explosion was premature. It is rumored that others are buried in the debris.

Incendiarist About.

SAVANNAH, Georgia, April 9.—Two bold attempts were made, last night, to burn valuable property in different parts of this city. The indications are that a gang of firebugs are operating here. Public feeling is aroused.

The Maybrick Case.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 9.—The house committee on foreign affairs will report a resolution asking the state department for all papers in the case of Mrs. Florence Maybrick, who is imprisoned in England for the alleged murder of her husband.

The El Paso Dam.

EL PASO, Texas, April 9.—Minister Fernando Esqui, of the national board of public works, arrived here this afternoon, from the City of Mexico, to confer with the international boundary commission now here on the proposed dam in the Rio Grande at this point.

A Nuptial Knot Tied.

NEW YORK, N. Y., April 9.—Another international love affair culminated to-day with the marriage of Miss Grace R. White, one of the leading belles of Gotham society, to Mr. J. Piercy Mitchell, of London, England. The wedding was solemnized in Grace church and was one of the most brilliant events of the season.

A Third-Term.

YORK, N. B., April 9.—The republican congressional convention of the fourth Nebraska district to-day re-nominated Representative Eugene I. Hinder, of Aurora, for a third term. At the same time, the convention administered a "rubb" to the congressman for his advocacy of Senator Henderson as against McKinley, by instructing the delegates to St. Louis to support the Ohio man.

The Illinois Millers.

CHICAGO, Illinois, April 9.—The Illinois millers' association is holding a special meeting here, to-day, to protest against the attitude of the railroads to regard to their shipments of the northwest. They allege discrimination in favor of the Minneapolis millers, and unless the railroads make a change of front the millers declare they will take the matter before the interstate commerce commission.

The Captured Presidency.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 9.—According to a delegate to the annual convention of the national republican college league, recently held in Chicago, the capture of the presidency by James M. Perkins, of Harvard, in spite of the fact that a majority of the votes had been pledged to E. J. H. King, of Wisconsin, was due to a feeling of indignation on the part of some of the western delegates with the cavalier treatment accorded the convention by the machine republicans of Chicago.

A ROYAL RECEPTION

Cardinal Satolli is Being Grandly Entertained in St. Louis, To-day.

SENATOR TILLMAN'S TOUR

The Ohio Legislature Provides for Death by Electrocutation After July 1st.

WRONG TRAIN HELD UP

ST. LOUIS, Mo., April 9.—The visit of Cardinal Satolli has made this a red letter day for the Catholics of St. Louis, and on the other hand, His Eminence has cause to long remember the royal entertainment accorded him in this city. At 10 o'clock, this morning, Cardinal Satolli celebrated pontifical high mass in the presence of a congregation that literally packed the old cathedral, in spite of the fact that admission could be had only by special invitation. Following the ceremony at the cathedral, Cardinal Satolli and Archbishop Kain were driven to the Kenrick seminary, where an elaborate dinner was served. Two hundred guests were present, including all of the local Roman Catholic clergy and many laymen of prominence.

The public reception in honor of His Eminence, for which preparations have been in progress for nearly three months, will be held at the Marquette club, this evening, and it is expected the function will surpass in magnitude and brilliancy anything of the kind ever seen in the west.

To Be Electrocutated.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, April 9.—Both branches of the state legislature have passed a law that capital punishment by electricity shall be substituted for hanging, after July 1st.

Tillman's Tour.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 9.—Senator Tillman, of South Carolina, starts on his western tour, to-night. He expects to reach Denver on Tuesday next, where extensive arrangements are being made to welcome him.

The Wrong Train.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., April 9.—An unsuccessful attempt was made, last night, to hold up the south-bound Iron Mountain train at God's Hill by five masked robbers, who turned the switch and side-tracked an extra, and rode away cursing. A posse of men are in pursuit.

The Ohio Miners.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, April 9.—The annual convention of the Ohio Miners' association assembled here, to-day, with a full representation from all the mining sections of the state. In his annual address, President Ratchford reported that the association had made gratifying progress the last year, both numerically and financially; the year had been a quiet one so far as serious disputes between operators and employees was concerned, and the outlook for the miners during 1896 was exceedingly bright as a satisfactory scale of wages for the year had been already decided on.

A Benefit Performance.

NEW YORK, N. Y., April 9.—The Fifth Avenue theater was crowded, this afternoon, upon the occasion of a benefit performance to provide funds for the removal of the remains of the confederate dead interred in Mount Hope cemetery to the new lot upon which a monument is in course of erection. Joe J. Brown and a number of other well-known actors and actresses participated in the performance. The monument, which bears the inscription: "To the memory of the heroic dead of the confederate veterans of New York," will probably be dedicated on Decoration day. The ornaments will be imposing. Representative usages and confederate soldiers from all parts of the country are to be invited.

A Health-Seeker.

A health-seeker, who sought too late, died on No. 4, to-day, just as the train arrived in this city. He was en route from Phoenix to Chicago, in company with his sister. As the train was already late, his body was taken to Raton for embalming.
