LAWYER AND LITIGANT.

The next case reached on the docket will be that against Macario Gutierrez for an assault on Manuel Gonzalez, out at Olguin bill. In the absence of Judge Smith at Raton, to-day, Attorney J. D. W. Veeder has occupied the bench in the district court, with dignity and dispatch.

The U. S. grand jury, recently discharged, failed to find an indictment against A. Segura, accused of intimidating witnesses at court. The Staab-Gudorf case, from Santa Fe, litigation between unna and another, has been compromised by the parties themselves, by and with the consent of counsel, judge and jury.

In the case of the United States against Foina de Rangeli, the former sentence of thirty days in the county jail has been modified to that of the payment of \$81.74 and costs—in all, \$141.40, and upon doing so, she is released from custody. Ascension Arguello has been on trial in the district court, to-day, for a rape committed on the person of Valentina Muniz at Los Torres, October 17th, 1892. The court appointed W. B. Bunker to defend the accused, and he has been hammering away on the case all day.

Judge Louis Sulzbacher has filed a suit in the Mora county court against Wm. Naeglin, administrator, Henry, Annie, Charles, Frank and Edward Korte, heirs at law of the estate of the late Henry Korte, over there, for \$1,500, and asking that certain described property be subjected to the payment of the debt. The case of John Brennan against the Atlantic & Pacific and Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe railroads, to recover damages for the loss of a foot, was submitted to the jury in the district court, at Albuquerque, yesterday noon. They returned a verdict awarding damages in the sum of \$5,000 against the Atlantic & Pacific and railway of the Atchison on the ground that it was not shown that the Atchison company had any knowledge of the fact that persons were in the habit of crossing where the cars were switched.

Some days ago, E. L. Foster, receiver of the First national bank, at Deming, filed a bill of complaint in the district clerk's office against Moses E. Dane and wife, of Colfax county, Francis M. Dimmick and wife, of Los Angeles, Cal., Henry Chase and wife, of Lyndon, Vermont, Wm. S. Eno, of Pine Plains, N. Y., Israel King, of Deming, assignee of C. H. Dane and wife, of the San Miguel national bank, of East Las Vegas, the Scottish mortgage and loan investment company, parties defendant, claiming, that on November 25th, 1895, the said receiver obtained a judgment in the district court of Grant county for the sum of \$23,217.65 against the Vermeco company, a corporation organized under the laws of New Mexico for farming and cattle-raising; and that said judgment remains unsatisfied, though M. E. Dane and wife are still interested in several tracts of land, among others, the Horse Shoe ranch in Colfax county. It is asked that such property be declared to be held in trust for the Vermeco company and be applied to the satisfaction of the judgment heretofore granted E. L. Foster against the Vermeco company.

Davis, wages, \$10; Mrs. Lydick, wages as cook, \$7.25; total, \$233.65.

The meeting at C. A. Rythun's store, last evening, to consider the matter of a juster equalization of property appraisement, was presided over by W. A. Givens, and C. V. Hlecock was chosen secretary. It was the sense of those present that a resolution should be made in the aggregate value of real estate. The land lying between Trambley's on the north Mora road, on the east, National street on the south, and the corporate limits of East Las Vegas on the west, were particularly included in a plan of equalization to be applied. A committee, consisting of W. A. Givens, J. B. Allen and S. P. Patten, were appointed to carry out the wishes of the interested property owners present and report at a meeting to be held at the same place, to-morrow evening.

There will be an important meeting of the New Mexico cattle sanitary board at the office of Secretary La Rue, in Las Vegas, to-morrow. Besides Gov. Thornton, who is coming over from Santa Fe, there will probably be present Judge Boone, N. A. Bolich and J. P. Byron, of Deming, who will come prepared to refute the rumors in circulation recently to the effect that the cattle being imported from Mexico are infected—indeed, that there is no earthly reason why a quarantine should be maintained, down there.

TRACK AND TRAIN.

It is said that the new A. T. & S. F. train schedule will deprive every town in the Territory of a daylight mail service—New Mexico.

R. W. Thomas, superintendent of the Tampico branch of the Mexican Central, met in his resignation, which the company refused to accept.

Sam Towser left the City of Mexico for La Junta, Colo., to work in the Atchison shops at that place. Sam is a fine machinist; 'way up in G.

It is rumored that F. W. Johnston, long superintendent of motive power for the Mexican Central, will soon resign and accept a position with the Inter Oceanic.

D. M. Hayne, formerly master mechanic of the Tampico branch of the Mexican Central, at San Luis, is now general foreman of the Atchison shops at La Junta.

Jack Easley, formerly of the Atchison at El Paso, is doing good service for the Mexican Central company as trainmaster at San Luis Potosi and is deservedly popular.

Engineer William Milton, of the M. K. & T., who was not in the city at the time of the Pryor creek, I. T. robbery, several months ago, has been assigned a passenger run between Coffeyville and Parsons.

Wm. Tell, who so acceptably filled the position of assistant in the material department of the Mexican Central, at Juarez, some years ago, still holds down the position of storekeeper for the company in the City of Mexico.

When the new Atchison management decided to close the city ticket office in Wichita, in the interest of economy, the question of closing the city offices at Pueblo, Colorado Springs, Topeka, St. Joe, Lawrence, Lawrence and Atchison was also considered. The city offices at Lawrence and Atchison are to be abolished, probably May 1st, and it is now thought that since the closure of the Topeka office has been ordered, the city offices at the other considered points, with the possible exception of St. Joseph, will also be abolished.

THE ATCHISON HOSPITAL FUND.

The fund out of which the Topeka hospital was built was largely accumulations of the early days of the hospital association, when the expenses of its operation were practically nothing. On April 17th, 1884, the Atchison railway employes association was incorporated and the first step taken in the direction of the present hospital system. Three years later, the association was enlarged to take in the employes of all leased and operated lines of the Atchison, and was then named the Railway Employes association. In the spring of 1891, as the association had grown to such magnitude, it was thought advisable to establish separate associations for the leased and operated lines, thereby separating them from the Atchison system. The separation was accordingly made, and on May 30th, 1891, the present system was incorporated under the name of the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe Hospital association. A separation of the accumulated funds was also made at the same time, and it was then found that the portion belonging to the Atchison system proper was sufficient to build the present hospital building in Topeka.
