DOWN TO BUSINESS

The National Prohibition Convention Called to Order in Pittsburg to-day.

TALK OF THE PLATFORM

Family Troubles Result in a Most Bloody Tragedy at Campbell, Cal.

WOMEN'S CLUBS CONVENE

PITTSBURG, Pa., May 27.—The opening session of the national prohibition convention to-day was an experience meeting. The convention shows a disposition to do its work well and to deal carefully and deliberately with the matters to be disposed of, though the proceedings were not so colorless as a political expert could fail to discern here and there an indication of the struggles to come.

The convention was called to order at 11 o'clock, but long before that hour the big hall began to fill up with the delegates while in the gallery were seated hosts of valiant adherents of the temperance cause, both men and women. There was room for everybody. The decorations of the convention hall were tasteful and appropriate. The delegates had been well attended to, so nobody had cause for getting out of temper.

The convention was called to order at 11 o'clock, but long before that hour the big hall began to fill up with the delegates while in the gallery were seated hosts of valiant adherents of the temperance cause, both men and women. There was room for everybody. The decorations of the convention hall were tasteful and appropriate.

Chairman Dickie's bearing was conciliatory as he called the convention to order and disposed of the preliminaries necessary to every national gathering. The delegates were cordially welcomed by H. L. Castle, of Pittsburg, to whose address response was made by Chairman Dickie. Next came the opening address of the temporary chairman, which was several times interrupted by the applause which greeted the arrival of some well known delegate. In the groupings of the states all the old-time leaders were to be found who have been prominent in prohibition conventions for years past, but there were also noticeable a large number of new faces, showing that the much needed new blood is being infused into the ranks.

During the several hours the convention was devoting to the transaction of routine matters, little significance could be attached to any of the incidents, yet the enthusiastic applause that greeted Joshua Leveing, of Maryland; C. E. Bentley, of Nebraska; George W. Bain, of Kentucky; W. H. Thompson, of Ohio, and Ex-Gov. Metcalf, of Rhode Island, made it plain that all these gentlemen are considered in the light of presidential candidates. The demonstrations that greeted John G. Woolley, of Illinois, and Ex-Governor St. John, of Kansas, showed easily these two enjoyed immense popularity among cold water advocates, though the welcome of the last named seemed to be more in the galleries than in the ranks of the delegates. After the roll-call, the usual committees on credentials, rules and platform were appointed, a motion to adjourn until tomorrow morning was made and carried without dissent.

PITTSBURG, Pa., May 27.—The work of constituting the platform of the national prohibition convention has been turned over to a half-dozen sub-committees, which are to meet and begin their labors, late this afternoon. It may be predicted that if a currency plank is inserted in the platform a bitter struggle will ensue, for one-half the delegates are opposed to taking up the financial question at all, while the other half is hopelessly in between gold and silver. The western delegates, led by ex-Governor St. John, declare that if a plank that can be construed in favor of the gold standard, be adopted, they will no longer remain in the party. On the other hand, the opposing forces, under the leadership of National Chairman Dickie, Isaac E. Funk, of Brooklyn, and William G. Wardwell, treasurer of the Standard Oil company, will not in case the convention declares for free silver. The sub-committee on tariff will probably recommend for adoption the same tariff plank embodied in the platform of the national convention of 1892.

PITTSBURG, Pa., May 27.—Through the last twenty-four hours has seen a spirited campaign on the part of a half dozen or more handbills, and rumors of deals have been floating in abundance, all predictions as to the practical nomination are still premature. The Marylanders are claiming for Leveing the votes of nine-tenths of the eastern delegates, but this is in variance with the facts as they appear

on the surface and a careful canvass of all the delegates, both of which point to a division of the New England strength between Leveing, Metcalf and Wardwell, while a part, at least, of the New York delegates, is expected to support Henry Clay Bascom, of Troy. The silver men, since the caucus of last night, appear to present a more solid front, and will give Chase E. Bentley, the Nebraska committee-man, their almost unanimous support on the first ballot. For the second place on the ticket no one is yet mentioned with any degree of prominence, the delegates preferring to have the presidential candidacy disposed of first, after which a candidate for vice president will be chosen from the opposite section of the country.

Convention of Women's Clubs. LOUISVILLE, Ky., May 27.—Delegates representing twenty state federations, comprising more than 500 clubs, were present this morning at the opening of the biennial convention of the national federation of Women's clubs, which will be in session here for the next three days. This is the third convention of the organization which was brought into existence in 1892.

Another important communication with one of the various women's clubs throughout the world, that they may compare methods of work and become mutually helpful. Three foreign clubs are members of the federation—the Woman's Club, of Bombay; the Educational Club, of Ceylon and the Pioneer Club, of London. The convention was called to order at 10 o'clock by Mrs. Ellen M. Hendrict, president of the federation. The session was devoted to routine business, the officers submitting their annual reports which show a gratifying increase in membership since the last convention, in Philadelphia, two years ago. To-night the delegates will be entertained at a reception given by the women's clubs, of Louisville.

Coronation Festivities. MOSCOW, May 27.—Though the great spectacular event of the coronation feasts has come and gone, the festivities continue without any noticeable abatement in intensity or enthusiasm. As yet the multitude of visitors in the ancient capital show no inclination to take their departure, and it is probable the great majority will remain another week for the court balls, receptions, theatrical presentations with which the month of glory, pomp and splendor will be brought to a close. Their majesties received further congratulations from the foreign ambassadors and deputies this morning, when they drove through the streets, being greeted everywhere with an indescribable display of enthusiasm. Elaborate preparations are being made to-day for the imperial reception, which will be held in the Kremlin palace to-morrow night. The reception will be attended by several Americans, including Ambassador Breckenridge and wife, Gen. McCook and wife and Mr. and Mrs. Potter-Palmer, of Chicago.

Railway Accounting Officers. PITTSBURG, Pa., May 27.—The association of American railway accounting officers began its eighth annual meeting at the Monongahela house, to-day, with a large attendance of members, representing the leading railway systems of the United States and Canada. In his annual address, President H. W. Booth, general auditor of the Baltimore & Ohio, stated that the association had more than maintained its record for efficiency during the past year, and that it now deserved to be placed at the head of all similar organizations of railway officials. The convention will be in session until Saturday and concludes with the usual association banquet at the Monongahela house.

Wholesale Killing. SAN JOSE, Cal., May 27.—Col. P. McGillicy, his wife, daughter and Mrs. James Durham, James Wells and son, Mrs. McGillicy, Minnie Wheeler, a hired girl, and James Briscoe, a hired man, were killed at Campbell, Santa Clara county, this morning, by James Durham, a son-in-law of McGillicy's, who escaped. They are prominent people, and the cause of the bloody tragedy is supposed to be family troubles.

Rounding Up Red Devils. GREAT FALLS, Mont., May 27.—Two troops of cavalry from Fort Custer are in the field rounding up Croes for banishment to Canada. The Indians say they fear punishment from Canadian for participation in the Bell rebellion and prefer taking refuge in the mountains to returning. It is feared there will be rebellion among bad Indians and cause trouble in these parts.

Cruelty to Dumb Animals. It does seem that somebody ought to raise a voice in behalf of our dumb animals. Cruelties that are a shame, a disgrace and sin against God, are being practiced every day in our midst. The writer saw a horse fall in the harness, the other day, for no other reason than that he was so old and poor and weak that his strength was gone. And yet that horse was compelled to his feet, put again in the harness, and is every day lashed and forced, clear beyond his strength, into work.

A Mexican passed along the street, to-day, with a kid having all four feet tied closely together and cruelly suspended up to his ears. The kid, helpless animal had to suffer rude cruelty, perhaps, for hours.

These are only two examples of what may be seen of a similar character, almost every day. It ought to be frowned upon and prevented. Meats killed after such cruelty, are declared to be unhealthy and unsafe. To treat such a noble animal as a horse, a steed, indicated, is surely the abandonment of mercy. It would be a good thing to have organized in Las Vegas a society for the prevention of cruelty to animals as many other towns and cities have.
