THE POLITICAL POT
Simmering Merrily Away, with Reports from North Carolina, Denver and Elsewhere.

Secretary Olney has Washington Guessing, as to His Recent Whereabouts.

CORBETT IS CHALLENGED
DENVER, Colo., June 25.—In response to a call issued by I. N. Stevens, member for this state of the national committee of the silver party, several hundred delegates assembled at 11 o'clock this morning for the purpose of selecting seventy delegates to the national convention to be held at St. Louis, July 22.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., June 25.—After a recess of over five months the investigating committee of the state senate convened in the city hall this afternoon for the purpose of continuing its investigations. The attorneys of the committee have been busy during the recess gathering testimony relative to paving, street cleaning and electric-light contracts, the mutual automatic scandal and the civil service, water and gas bureaus; and say that they have accumulated sufficient evidence to keep the committee busy for several months. It is probable that meetings will be held three days a week throughout the summer, in order that a report and recommendations may be made to the next legislature.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 25.—Secretary Olney returned to Washington, last night, after a mysterious absence of several days. It has been reported that he was in the city of Boston, where he conferred with the Spanish minister, in Boston, nobody at the state department will admit it. This morning Olney received a number of foreign ministers, Thursday being their reception day. Sir Julian Paucotofe was one of the callers and it is understood that he presented a request from his government, that Olney would use his good offices to bring about a friendly settlement of the trouble over the arrest of Harrison, the British surveyor, by the Venezuelan police.

Catholic Matters of Moment.
ROME, June 23.—It is reported that ten cardinals will be created at the consistory which will be convened at the Vatican late to-day. Contrary to all expectation, Cardinal Satolli, papal delegate to the United States, will not receive his hat upon the present occasion. His reason for not making the journey to Rome is said to be the fact that he does not desire to leave the United States until his successor has been selected by the pope. It has been rumored that Mgr. Falconio would succeed Satolli, but this rumor has been denied, and it is now thought that Mgr. Lorenzelli, the present interuncio at Hagu, Holland, will succeed Satolli at Washington.

Georgia Democrats for Silver.
MACON, Ga., June 25.—Chairman S. W. Gray, of the democratic state committee, called to the Georgia convention to be held here to-day. Besides sending a delegate to Chicago, instructed for silver, the convention will take action upon the question of selecting a United States senator. This is in response to the expressed desire of Congressman Crisp—who, by the way, will be the choice of the convention for the upper house in congress—in accordance with whose wishes delegates to today's gathering have been instructed by their constituents upon this point.

Henry M. Stanley III.
LONDON, England, June 25.—Henry M. Stanley, M. P., the African explorer, is ill in London with inflammation of the stomach. He has been unable to take food for several days and his condition is very serious.

Back from St. Louis.
Hon. M. A. Otero, a prominent republican politician of San Miguel county, came in from the north, this morning, and registered at Sturges' European. Mr. Otero attended the St. Louis convention and reached Las Vegas, Monday night, accompanied by Delegate John F. Clark. He states that Hon. Thomas B. Catron and Delegate A. L. Morrison were passengers on their return to Santa Fe, this morning. He also informs the Optic that Hon. Pedro Peres, after getting through his committee duties at St. Louis, went on to Philadelphia, Pa., and will return to Bernadillo in a few days, accompanied by his son, who was attending school there.—Albuquerque Optic.

LYMAN TRUMBULL DEAD
MADRID, Spain, June 25.—The senate, last evening, by a vote of 85 to 44, rejected the proposal of Professor Comares, that the protocol of 1877 with the United States be abrogated.

CHICAGO, Ill., June 25.—Ex United States Senator Lyman Trumbull, one of the foremost citizens of Chicago and an esteemed jurist, died at his home, this morning, after a long illness. He was eighty-three years of age.

CANTON, Ohio, June 25.—Major McKinley will have a day of comparative quiet. But two visitors are expected, Judge Upson, formerly of the supreme court of Ohio, and Captain Frieberg, of West Point. These calls have no political significance. Major McKinley hopes to devote most of the day to correspondence. His first telegram, to-day, from West Bay City, Mich., said: "We launch the fine ship 'Lagonda,' at noon, floating the McKinley banner at the masthead, and at that hour we drink your very good health." Another telegram announced the organization of a big McKinley club at Spokane, Wash. It also contained liberal assurances that the republicans would carry that state in November next.

Washington Meeting in New York.
New York, N. Y., June 25.—Carriage hall will be the scene to-night of an immense ratification mass-meeting in recognition of McKinley's nomination at St. Louis, a week since. The event takes on a special significance in view of the fact that the action of the national gathering in selecting McKinley was in a measure a rebuke to the state machines. The gathering will be held under the auspices of the republican club, which is the organized director of clean and honest republicanism in this city, as opposed to the methods which have prevailed in the party for so many years past. Among the speakers will be United States Senator Thurston, of Nebraska; Chauncey M. Depew, Mayor William M. Strong and General Horace Porter.

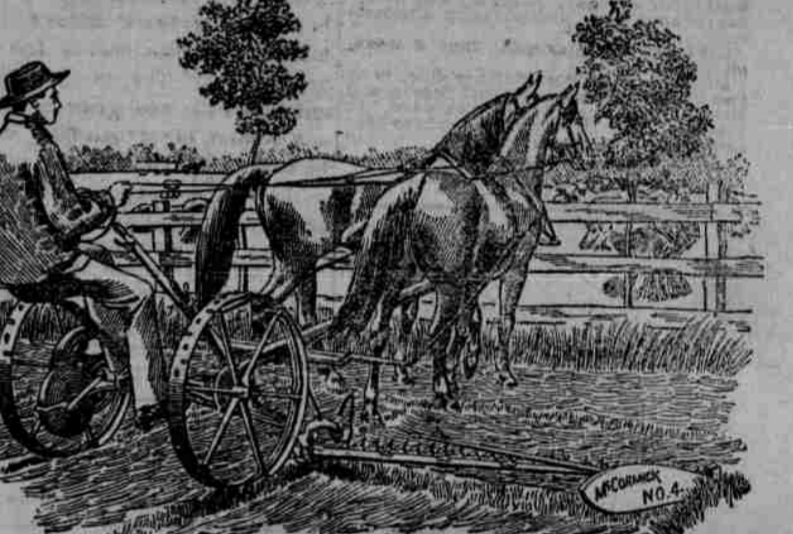
