TRACK AND TRAIN.

Engine 25 went down to take her old run on the Santa Fe branch.

W. Littleford, attorney, and Gay L. Humphrey, of the coal department, were passengers on No. 1 last evening.

Mechanic Walter C. A. Ridington, of Nickerson, Kan., has been transferred to Raton, and left for that place, Sunday evening.

Engineer William J. Igoe has returned to Nickerson from the New Mexico division, where he had been helping out during the stock rush.

A bridge carpenter by the name of Ebbs had his leg injured yesterday while at work east of Raton, and was brought to the hospital here last evening.

Dr. Gibson and daughter and D. E. Palmer, all of the Atchison at Topoka, arrived in this city last evening and will spend some time at the springs.

Harry Jones, at one time round-house foreman at this place, who has been spending a few days here among friends, left to-day for the Hopewell mining camp, on a prospecting tour.

All of the land belonging to the Northern Pacific railroad company in the state of Washington has been sold at foreclosure. It comprises 12,000 sections, and was purchased by representatives of the reorganization committee for \$1,735,200.

Net earnings of the Atchison, Topoka & Santa Fe for the month of June increased \$305,261, or nearly half the amount of increase in net earnings for the entire year, which amounted to only \$741,081. The total gross earnings of the Santa Fe for the year ending June 30th, 1906, amounted to \$38,966,397, and the operating expenses to \$32,922,907. There was a decrease in operating expenses for the year, of \$291,447. For the month of June alone operating expenses decreased \$244,590.

The Atchison eating house at Kinsley, Kan., is again in operation. The destruction by fire of the company hotel building ten days ago interfered but slightly with the catering facilities at that place. The company immediately secured a commodious structure just across the tracks from the site of the old building and had it renovated and arranged for an eating house and hotel. It is believed that the eating house will be maintained at Kinsley and that the company will rebuild the hotel in the course of a few months.

The fine conditions of the crops throughout the west suggested to the Burlington management that the best way the farm lands and the crops of 1906 could be brought to the attention of the world was to organize a party of fifty or sixty land and immigration agents from the states of Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, Wisconsin and Ohio, and move the party in a special train three or four days among the growing crops. The greater part of the country will be traveled over by daylight. All the expenses are borne by the Burlington.

DONATED \$30,000.

The Atchison Railway company, through the executive committee, has donated \$30,000 toward the cost of the new Atchison hospital in Topoka. This amount will be paid to the Santa Fe hospital association and will be used by the executive board in meeting outstanding accounts resulting from the construction of the new building.

At the time of the reorganization of the Santa Fe Hospital association an agreement was made with the railroad company to the effect that the railroad company should purchase all hospital buildings then in use, but that they should be maintained exclusively by the association. This was done, the company paying on an average \$30,000 for each building.

Although the Topoka hospital was built as the property of the association, the surplus funds in the association treasury to be used in its construction, the total cost far exceeded the amount first expected. On this account the attention of the railway company was called to the old agreement, and the company asked to donate an amount equal to that paid for the other buildings. This the executive committee decided to do.
