

WINDY SCHOOL WILL BE HELD.

Report of a Special Committee on the Arrangement of Classes for the Coming Year.

EAST LAS VEGAS, N. M., August 18th, To the Board of Education.

GENTLEMEN—Your committee appointed to examine the public school buildings of this city, and to recommend the occupancy thereof by the different grades of pupils and their respective teachers of the public schools of East Las Vegas, N. M., beg to submit the following report and recommend its adoption, namely:

That the Academy and the other public school buildings are now undergoing all necessary repairs preparatory to the opening of the public schools on the 7th day of September next, and they recommend that the said public school buildings be occupied as follows:

PUBLIC SCHOOL BUILDING ON DOUGLAS AVENUE.

First primary, B class, Miss Minnie Holman; first primary, A class, Miss Eda M. Bloom; second primary, Miss Belle Rogers; third primary, Mrs. Mattie Garlio, principal in charge.

ACADEMY BUILDING.

Fourth primary, Mrs. Sallie O. Douglas; D grammar, 5th year, Miss Josie O'Keefe; C grammar, 6th year, Miss Flora Beschle; B grammar, 7th year, Miss Lucy Stone, principal in charge.

CITY HALL BUILDING.

A grammar, 8th year, Miss Maggie Bucher; high school, Prof. J. A. Wood, principal; high school, Miss Mary E. Henry, assistant principal.

SHOOTING AT BLOSSBURG.

Constable Holland Shoots One Cowan With Fatal Results.

Word reached this city early this morning of a killing last night in Blossburg, says yesterday's Trinidad Advertiser.

One Cowan, a miner, became intoxicated and started in to do up the town, firing a number of shots. Between 10 and 11 o'clock he entered a saloon and drew his gun on Constable Holland, but the latter was too quick for him and shot him in the left side of the neck, the ball ranging upward and emerging a short distance below the base of the brain. Cowan lived until 11:40, when he succumbed to his wound.

People who witnessed the shooting are inclined to believe that Holland was justified in his action. Cowan was a miner, about fifty-five years of age and a widower. He has four or five sons and three daughters, all grown. The little city of Blossburg was greatly excited over the affair.

Call for a Republican Territorial Convention.

The various county committees are hereby instructed to make all proper arrangements for the holding of county conventions and the selection of delegates.

Under the existing rules, alternates are not allowed, nor proxies unless the same are held by a resident of the same county as the delegate for whom the holder of the proxy acts.

The county conventions will be composed of delegates chosen at precinct mass meetings, which will be arranged for and called by the county committees, naming the exact time and place for such meetings.

Where there is no county committee, the members of the Territorial central committee will perform the duties of the county committee, and will call precinct mass meetings.

County conventions must be held not later than the 21st day of September, 1896. The chairman and secretary of the precinct meetings will certify a list of the delegates elected to the county convention to the chairman of the various county committees.

The chairman and secretary of county conventions will certify a list of the delegates elected to the territorial convention, and mail the same to the secretary of this committee, at Santa Fe, on or before the 22nd day of September, 1896.

A most distressing accident occurred at Starkville, Monday afternoon, resulting in the almost instantaneous death of J. F. Hawley, a well-known Atchison brake-

man. Engine 229 doing duty on the Starkville coal run, was doing some switching in the Starkville yards, and was running "light" up the back track in the rear of the coke ovens after a string of empties. Mr. Hawley was standing on the foot board on the pilot of the engine, his being on the right side. When nearing the cars, Hawley started to cross to the left side of the engine; just as he swung himself around the bumper on the front of the engine, the hand railing came loose at the left end, precipitating him under the engine wheels. He fell with his head outside the rail. The engine passed over his body at the lower part of his chest, virtually cutting the body in two, it being held together only by shreds of flesh. About forty-five yards from where the accident happened was found the bolt holding the hand railing; it had become loosened and dropped out.

The funeral of Brakeman Hawley, who was killed at Starkville, by engine 23, on the 17th, will take place at Trinidad, to-morrow at 2 o'clock p. m.
