**ROTHSCHILD'S OF THE EAST**

Mitsui Family of Japan is Famous for  
Unsuited Honor of Their  
Name.

The Mitsui family of Japan have  
been called the Rothschilds of the  
East; but while the fame of the lat-  
ter has gone abroad over the world,  
says the Atlantic Monthly, the Mit-  
suis have remained practically un-  
known except to a few western mer-  
chants who have had extensive deal-  
ings with the Orient.

The European family owes its great  
repute to the fact that for a century  
there has been no slightest stain up-  
on its commercial honor. But its ca-  
reer, it should be remembered, has  
been passed in a world where busi-  
ness itself has been held in honor;  
while the Mitsuis, engaged in a pur-  
suit utterly condemned by public sen-  
timent, for three centuries, in spite of  
the demoralizing influence of the so-  
cial ban, have been trusted by govern-  
ment and people alike and have kept  
the honor of their name unstained.  
Now, thanks to the new spirit animat-  
ing the nation, they no longer stand  
so conspicuously alone.

Other great commercial families are  
being ranged with this one, their mem-  
bers not only enrolled among the  
peers of the realm, but ranking with  
the merchant princes of the west as  
exponents of all that is honorable in  
the conduct of mercantile affairs. To  
their number are yearly being added  
many of the Sumirat, or slightly chiv-  
alry of old, who once scorned all con-  
tact with trade, but who are now re-  
turning to bring to the rescue of their  
country the fine sense of honor in  
which they were educated under the  
ancient regime. That they will eventu-  
ally succeed in their task, backed  
as they are by the instinct of common  
honesty pervading the rank and file,  
there can be no manner of doubt.

How the Kind-Hearted and Gifted  
Rosa Bonheur Helped a  
Young Wife.

"We are not brothers for nothing,"  
Rosa Bonheur once wrote in jesting  
affection to her brother Isidore; and  
in truth the wonderful, quaint, boyish  
little woman, with her bright eyes,  
crooked curis and breezy ways, was  
almost more a brotherly chum than a  
sister to the "Dodore" whom she so  
dearly loved. Much of the time on  
her country estate, in her studio and  
among her animals, wild and tame,  
she wore the masculine costume  
which her manner of life required, to  
wear which she had—with one other  
woman, a famous explorer and arche-  
ologist—received express permission  
from the French government. Yet  
this very mannish little person was  
far from unwomanly in her sym-  
pathies; and her latest biography re-  
cords a pretty incident related by her  
friend, Joseph Verdier, the landscape  
painter.

"One evening she was dining with  
me and some friends. Among the  
friends was a young lady recently mar-  
ried, who gave us an account of the

**EFFECTS OF DRINKING TEA**

Consumer of High Quality Tea Runs  
Least Risk of Digestive Dis-  
turbance.

The Lancet publishes a concluding  
article upon tea which sums up the  
results of an investigation into the sub-  
ject under the title of "The Chem-  
istry, Physiology and Esthetics of a  
Cup of Tea."

The suggestion that an infusion of  
good tea consists chiefly of caffeine  
tannate is confirmed. It is pointed out  
that when caffeine and tannin are in a  
state of combination, neither being in  
the free state, the harmful astringent  
qualities of the tannin disappear and  
the bitter taste of free caffeine is not  
perceptible.

The teas of high quality yield as a  
rule a simple infusion of caffeine tan-  
nate, not of caffeine or of tannin. Such  
teas must be regarded as the most de-  
sirable from a physiological point of  
view. It is interesting to find that as  
a rule the expert taster picks out  
these teas as teas of high quality.

Good teas, in short, according to this  
inquiry, are those which on a five min-  
ute infusion yield only caffeine in the  
form of caffeine tannate to the in-  
fusion and had or indifferent teas are  
those which yield on infusion a tea  
containing, in addition to caffeine tan-  
nate, either caffeine or tannin, but es-  
pecially tannin, in excess. A good  
tea may be made a bad tea, but a bad  
tea can not be made a good tea ex-  
cept perhaps by very skillful blending.  
Excessive infusion will spoil a good  
tea, but even a short infusion of a  
bad tea may be as objectionable as  
an excessive infusion of a good tea.

On physiological grounds, therefore,  
the consumer of high quality teas runs  
less risk of digestive disturbance pro-  
vided the tea is made properly.
