ORDINANCE NO. 308

An ordinance relating to the tax levy for the fiscal year ending on the 31st day of March, A. D. 1913.

Be it ordained by the city council of the city of Las Vegas, N. M. Section 1. That a tax levy for the year, year ending on the 31st day of March, A. D. 1913, is hereby made as follows:

Special: For interest on general refunding bonds . . . . . 902.50 General: For fire hydrant rental . . . . . 0002.99 For maintenance of public parks . . . . . 000.50 For maintenance of public library . . . . . 000.50 For general purposes . . . . . 907.90

A grand total for all purposes . . . . . 913.99 And the above and foregoing taxes are hereby levied against all property of every description subject to taxation within and by the city of Las Vegas, aforesaid.

Section 2. The city clerk is hereby directed to certify to the probate clerk of the county of San Miguel, state of New Mexico, a copy of this ordinance with the request that the said taxes be carried on the tax list as required by law.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication as required by law.
