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IMPORTANCE OF N. M. ELECTION RECOGNIZED IN EAST

The significance of the election of Senator Bursum is more far-reaching than the people of the state of New Mexico realize. The campaign in this state has been watched with interest by the people of prominence in the east. Had this statement been made prior to the election it would have been considered pure political buncombe, but now that the people have spoken by their ballot and declared in favor of Senator Bursum, we are giving below an article given under the heading, "Editorial Comment," in the Baltimore, (Md.) News, which shows what significance was placed on the return of Holm O. Bursum to the Senate:

NEW MEXICO REPUBLICAN
 (From the New York Herald)
 Democratic disappointment over the election of Bursum, the Republican candidate for United States Senator from New Mexico, is more bitter than it was over the loss of the state to Harding last year. In the election of 1920, partisanship was swept away everywhere except

in the solidest part of the south by the transcendent issue of saving the country from perilous adventures abroad and ruinous mismanagement at home.

In that national election there seemed to be little thought and even less talk of Republicanism and democracy when the vast majority of the nation was bent upon getting the country out of the national and international mess into which it had been thrust, not as the democratic party's policy but as the imperious will and inflexible program of a single man.

But the veterans of public life have taken it for granted that with the great restoration of American principles by that election of 1920 democratic states would again gravitate toward the democratic party as naturally as water seeks its level. New Mexico, in its brief period of statehood had shown itself to be a democratic state until Mr. Wilson's administration threw it over to the Harding column by a plurality of 11,000. That the state is still turned away from the democratic party after the Wilson issue has been disposed of for good and all, is the staggering blow to those democratic leaders who are now trying to explain that the vote was very "light."

 "We are making another reduction in the prices of Ford cars and the Ford truck, effective today. The new prices average \$70.00 under former prices, and are the lowest at which Ford cars and trucks have ever been sold. List prices, F. O. B. Detroit are now as follows:

"This is the third price cut during the past twelve months. On September 22, 1920, the price of the Ford Touring Car was reduced from \$575 to \$440; June 7th to \$415, and now to \$355, making total reductions in this type of \$220, or 38 per cent. The same proportionate reductions have been made in all other types. One year ago the price of the Ford Sedan was \$975; today it lists at \$660 with the same equipment.
