WORLD'S LARGEST WIRELESS STATION STARTED BY PRES.

Port Jefferson, N. Y., Nov. 5.—By pressing a button in the white house President Harding Saturday afternoon started machinery that put in operation the largest and most powerful wireless station in the world.

The new station is the radio central located near here, seventy miles from New York. It was practically a world-wide range. Preliminary tests have been heard in Europe as well as Australia, South America and Japan. The plant was constructed under direction of the Radio Corporation of America.

PLAN TO HONOR WILSON THE ELEVENTH

Washington, Nov. 6.—Plans for a non-partisan demonstration Armistice day in honor of Woodrow Wilson are being made by admirers of the former president. The program now is to invite all who wish to participate to march to Mr. Wilson's home, immediately after the conclusion of the ceremonies at Arlington cemetery where the body of an unknown soldier is to be buried.

CHASE COYOTE IN JINNEY, CAPTURE HIM WITH HANDS

The prize coyote story comes from Greenville, N. M., where Lambert Thornton ran a coyote nearly to death with a car and then caught him alive with his bare hands, too wounded to fight. Thornton and some friends were out rounding up cows when they sighted the coyote and chased him in their car four or five miles across the open prairie. Mr. Thornton then stood on the running board of the car and scooped up the exhausted animal with his hands as the car reached and passed him. The captive was thrown into the car and taken to the home of one Cecil Smith where at last accounts it was not certain whether he would live or die.

MRS. SOUTHARD IS SENTENCED

Twin Falls, Idaho, Nov. 5.—Mrs. Lyda Southard today was sentenced to serve from ten years to life in the Idaho state prison for the murder of Edward F. Meyer, her fourth husband. She was convicted late Friday after a trial lasting several weeks. The court imposed the minimum penalty under the Idaho laws. Attorneys for Mrs. Southard are expected to appeal the case.

CAN TAX STOCK EXCHANGE MEMBERSHIP

Washington, Nov. 7.—States and municipalities can impose a property tax on membership in the New York stock exchange, the supreme court today held. The court affirmed decisions of lower Hamilton county, Ohio, can tax the membership of John M. Anderson, Cincinnati, on the New York stock exchange.

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A SAVING TO BURN COAL

Washington, Nov. 6.—Corn at 32 cents a bushel is equal in value to coal at \$16 a ton, Secretary Wallace said today, commenting on reports that some farmers were burning corn for fuel. At 20 cents a bushel, he said, corn would be equivalent to fuel coal at \$10 a ton.

"In districts where corn is very cheap now the coal is of a rather poor grade and is selling at high prices," he continued.

"Under such conditions it will pay both farmers and people in country towns to use corn instead of coal. Undoubtedly large quantities of corn will be burned on western farms this winter, unless the prices should materially advance."

New York, Nov. 6.—Fox-trotting to the altar to the tunes of a jazz band, Miss Myrilla Adelson and Leon A. Friedman were married at the Hotel Astor.

It was the idea of Ted Lewis, eccentric band leader, that jazzing is the way to a happy married life. So the couple was lassoed while tripping to a symphonized saxophone version of Mendelssohn's wedding march.
