EIGHT YEARS SERVICE

Postmaster Johnson, R. L. Carrier, Edgar Floersheim completed their eighth year with the federal government last Sunday. Mr. Johnson was appointed Postmaster May 1st, 1914 and Edgar Floersheim Assistant Postmaster but later took the Civil Service and transferred to carrier at which work he has spent the past 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ years. Mr. Johnson's term will expire in February 1924 and should he complete his term it will give him 10 years service. He has seen the office grow from a Fourth Class Office to a large Third Class and bordering on a Second Class Office. Up to the time he took over the office only 17,000 money order had been written and today nearly 60,000 have been written and instead of receiving two or three pouches and sacks daily as in 1914, now from 30 to 50 are received daily. When he first took over the office the mail was carried on the back of the rail road agent; later a cart was ordered, then a wagon, and now two and three trips are made daily by a large auto truck to carry the mail from the train to the post-office.

The office is now served by two Rural Routes and two Star Routes and on July 1st another Star Route to Kephart will be started and probably another 62 mile rural route. When this service is established Roy will probably have the best mail service of any small town in the state. Mr. Johnson and Mr. Floersheim are to be congratulated on the long service with the government.

ST. GEORGE SCHOOL CLOSES

St. George's school was obliged to close Friday, before the date set for the exercises.

The Commencement, which was to have taken place Monday Evening, May 8th had to be cancelled, because of illness among the children, and the imprudence shown by some of the people.

The second scholastic year has been completed, and with great success, altho laboring many times under great difficulties.

The attendance has been very good up to the last, and all have worked faithfully for the school's success. Each year brings better results, and the coming year appears very promising.

The members of the sixth, and seventh grades gave a farewell luncheon, last Wednesday, for the graduating class, in the children's refectory of the Sisters' Convent. Blue and Gold, the class colors were carried out in the decorations and tiny baskets of blue and gold filled with candies graced each member's place.

Rev. Father Vachon, who has labored so faithfully, among his parishioners, and for the success of the school is much in need of a rest, which should be assured him, that he might regain his health after his years work.

PABLO QUINTANA DIES FROM DIPHTHERIA

Sophia Biapendo, wife of Moises Biapendo formerly of Mosquero but who has been living in Roy the past few weeks died in the east part of town May 3rd, from tuberculosis. BAPTIST CHURCH RESOLUTIONS

Whereas, the modern dance, pool and card playing is recognized by all spiritually minded people as wielding a fateful influence on the cause of christianity; and: Whereas, the evil has spread like some deadly contagion since the beginning of the great world war, and: Whereas, this great evil is threatening to engulf many of our children and young people and impair their usefulness as christians: Therefore be it resolved, that we show our disapproval as a church by refusing to permit any person who attends, or even sanctions the dance, pool or card playing, to teach or hold office in any auxiliary recognized as being a part of the church to sing solos, or to hold any place of trust or leadership to which they may be elected.

With the glory of God and the honor of Christ and the progress of the redeemers kingdom in view, and with a desire to show brotherly kindness and love and to be perfectly just to all members of the church, we therefore further resolve; That in the future beginning with Saturday May 6th, 1922 should any member of the Baptist Church of Roy engage in the modern dance where there is a participation of both sexes, or engage in pool or card playing that by such act such member automatically severs membership with this church unless said member appears before the church within 30 days after the transgression and makes satisfactory acknowledgment and promises to refrain from such conduct in the future: Be it further resolved, that these resolutions be spread upon our minutes and that they become a part of our constitution and by-laws. Positive guilt of the accused member must be established before the name shall be removed from the church roll. The charge may be made by any member or may come through a discipline committee.
