



AT LAST THE HOOPER AND HUCKLEBERRY STATES VOTE.

The Most Quiet Election and Largest Vote Known for Years.

The Republicans Gain '1' in 3,150 Votes in Greene County.

Democrats Concede Ohio to Have Gone Republican by 10,000 Majority.

The Academy of Music at Chicago Completely Destroyed by Fire.

Ottawa, Canada, Oct. 12.—Pastors of Catholic churches in this city are forbidding their members to send their children to model school on pain of deprivation of sacrament.

New York, Oct. 12.—Arrived ship Labrador from Havre, Herden, Hamburg and Wyoming from Liverpool, and Holland from London.

Chicago, Ill., Oct. 12.—The beautiful West side Theatre Academy building was gutted by fire this forenoon. Five firemen on the roof during the fire fell through and were injured.

Columbus, O., Oct. 12.—The election day opened cloudy and chilly, but cleared into a beautiful day.

Columbus, Oct. 12.—We have returns from seventy-three towns and precincts giving a net republican gain of eighty-eight.

Columbus, Oct. 12.—One hundred and three precincts give a republican gain of fifty-five.

Columbus, Oct. 12.—Forty-one precincts give a net republican gain of 642.

Columbus, Oct. 12.—The gains and losses given are on the whole for the year as compared with the year 1876.

Columbus, Oct. 12.—There are 1,859 precincts in the State and it is expected that three-fourths of them will be heard from by 7 a. m.

Baltimore, Oct. 12.—The celebration of the settlement of Baltimore was continued to-day.

Cincinnati, Oct. 12.—The vote began very early and by noon the number of ballots in many precincts exceeded the total vote of last year.

Columbus, Oct. 12.—The reports from all over the State up to three o'clock say the weather is fine and the full strength of both parties are coming out.

Columbus, Oct. 12.—The vote of the entire manufacturing establishments in Adams county, Republican.

Indianapolis, Oct. 12.—The indications are that the Republicans have gone Republican by a large majority.

Cincinnati, 7:20 p. m., Oct. 12.—The Lincoln club people say the Republican ticket in the election of the entire county ticket by 3,000, and both congressmen. The Democrats concede it by 2,500.

Indianapolis, October 12.—The Republicans claim the city by an increased vote in all the wards, and increased majorities in the Republican wards and a reduction of the Democratic majorities in the Democratic wards.

Columbus, October 12.—Twenty-nine precincts give a net democratic gain of twenty.

Indianapolis, October 12.—The Republicans gain sixteen in Pleasant township. They claim Porter has carried Marion county by about 2,200.

The Greenbacker's vote will not be considered in his campaign. There are 1,857 precincts in the State. The first return was heard from Green Camp, township, Marion county, which gives McIlvane 177; Fallett 164; Republican gain of 13.

Cincinnati, Oct. 12.—The vote polled to-day is 20 per cent. larger than ever polled before. Militia was called out by Mayor Jacob in anticipation of trouble and was kept all day in the armory and discharged when the polls closed.

Washington, Oct. 12.—The Secretary of the Interior has decided that claims for any mineral on any other land upon the Erie reservation, which is based upon the settlement as to the occupation previous to the formal opening of that reservation.

Columbus, O., Oct. 12.—One hundred and fifty-nine townships show a net republican gain of 52.

Indianapolis, Oct. 12.—Returns come in very slowly. Republicans are sanguine. Voting places in the State 1,836. Will get nothing decisive to-night.

Columbus, Ohio, Oct. 12, 9:15 p. m.—25 townships and precincts show net republican gain of 1068. The indications are that the Republicans gain in republican counties and that the Democrats gain in democratic counties, consequently no definite estimate can be made of the result yet.

Indianapolis, Ind., Oct. 12.—Democrats conceded loss of 600 at Fort Wayne. Republican majority in Howard county is 1,200, 175 gain over 1875.

Columbus, Oct. 12.—25 townships heard from give a net republican of 1275.

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16 precincts show republican gain of 2417.

Indianapolis, Oct. 12.—Returns from 410 precincts, townships and wards comprising over one third of the State, show a net republican gain of 2,550 over vote of 1875, when the Republicans carried the State by 17,000 majority.

Columbus, Oct. 12.—228 townships, wards and precincts give net republican gain of 3230. Later, Returns show more democratic gains.

Indianapolis, Oct. 12.—85 precincts give republican gain of 360.

Columbus, Oct. 12.—Returns from 255 precincts, wards and townships, being one fourth of the State, show a republican gain of 2366.

Indianapolis, Oct. 12.—Sixteen precincts show a democratic gain of 22.

Indianapolis, Oct. 12, 11:40 p. m.—Vote so far as heard from equals 4112 per cent. of the State, and gives the republican gain at 414. At same ratio for the balance of the State will give republican majority for Governor of ten thousand.

Columbus, O., October 12.—Republicans claim the election of thirteen Congressmen out of twenty; but no definite figures yet.

Columbus, Oct. 12.—Five hundred and eight precincts, show a net republican gain of 5478.

Indianapolis, Oct. 12, 1:15 a. m.—One hundred and five precincts, show a net republican gain of 628.

Indianapolis, Oct. 12.—One hundred and fifty-five precincts show democratic increase of 509; republican gain of 1487. Net republican gain of 978.

Indianapolis, Oct. 12.—One hundred and forty-five precincts show a democratic gain of 459; republican gain of 1,317; net republican gain 858.

Toledo, O., Oct. 12.—The election in this city brought out the full party strength. The national and prohibition vote is insignificant. The complete returns indicate that the Republicans have carried the city, and the chairman of the republican committee claims 700 majority in Lucas county, republican gain of 708. The district is probably republican by 600 majority.

Chicago, October 12.—The Tribune New York special says the greatest interest has manifested during the day in the result of the elections in Indiana and Ohio. Crowds of people were gathered about the newspaper offices securing meager unsatisfactory reports that came during the afternoon towards evening the crowd increased and thousands of people swarmed the streets in front of the editorial board. Elaborate preparations had been made for displaying the news and as fast as the returns came in they were posted up where they could be seen by all on fifth avenue. The hotels were thronged and all the streets outside filled. There was very little betting going on. When the returns made it apparent that Ohio had gone republican by a large majority and that probably triumphed in Indiana a grand shout went up from the crowd in front of the Times and Tribune office, while the democrats gathered in front of the Sun and World offices disappeared.

Indianapolis, October 12.—The indications are that the Republicans elected governor by 10,000 majority; the democrats do not concede Lander but say the vote will be close, and claim the balance of the State ticket.

One thousand precincts heard from show a democratic gain of 281, and a republican gain of 908; net republican gain of 628.

Columbus, October 12.—Chairman Nash has just received a telegram stating the Rishman was elected in the Tenth district.

Wheeling, October 12.—The returns for the State come in slowly and there is nothing as yet which indicate any change from 1875. Returns from several precincts of this city and county indicate that the Republicans have made decided gains, and all indications point to a largely increased vote throughout the State.

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Columbus, O., Oct. 12, 9:45.—Two hundred townships give a net republican gain of 1,415.

Indianapolis, Oct. 12, 9:50 p. m.—Twenty-five precincts show a democratic gain of 39.

Columbus, Oct. 12.—Returns from 270 townships, wards and precincts, show a net republican gain of 160 over 1875. This includes something from nearly every county in the State.

Chicago, Oct. 12.—Hiram H. Seedy, of Dupage county, was nominated to-day by the democrats of the first district for Congress.

Chicago, Oct. 12.—Dispatches from Columbus, Cincinnati, Cleveland, Hamilton, Springfield and Toledo, in Ohio, and Indianapolis, Ft. Wayne, Covington, Shelbyville, Terre Haute, Evansville, La Porte and South Bend, in Indiana, say that the day has been beautiful throughout both States, and the vote has been unprecedentedly large in all localities.

Business men of both parties exhibited great activity and good order generally prevailed. Scratching was rather the exception than the rule. Comparisons in Indiana are made with the vote for Governor in 1876, and in Ohio with figures for Governor in 1875; Franklin county being omitted from the comparison.

Indianapolis, Oct. 12, 9:50 p. m.—Twenty-five precincts show a democratic gain of 392.

Columbus, Ohio, Oct. 12.—Returns from 270 townships, wards and precincts, show a net republican gain of 160 over 1875. This includes something from nearly every county in the State.

Indianapolis, Oct. 12.—Thirty-five precincts show a net republican gain of 76.

New York, Oct. 12.—The Herald says the vote is so close in both Ohio and Indiana that complete returns will not be attainable for a day or two, but the details at hand show such republican gains in both the States as to make a decisive democratic defeat in Ohio, Hamilton county, the democratic stronghold has gone republican; the Republicans claim a plurality of 22,000 on the State ticket, and a heavy majority in Congress. Indiana is in doubt, both claim it as we go to press, but it is apparent that even if the democrats carry it, it will be by no such majority as the 14,000 they had two years ago.

Columbus, O., Oct. 12.—Returns received up to 11 p. m. from 355 precincts show a net republican gain of 2,106.

Columbus, O., Oct. 12.—Three hundred and seventy-nine precincts show a net republican gain of 253.

Indianapolis, Ind., Oct. 12.—Fifty-five precincts show a republican gain 347.

Indianapolis, Ind., Oct. 12.—Sixty-five precincts give a republican gain of 327.

Omaha, Neb., Oct. 12.—About the 15th of last August an old German farmer named Wm. R. Osser, living in Barnes, was missed, and search being made, his body was found in a manner which indicates he had been poisoned by strychnine. An analysis of his stomach showed that he had been poisoned by strychnine. Frank D. White, who had been living with him, had appropriated some of his personal property and told contradictory stories. Indianapolis, Ind., Oct. 12.—Reports from 800 towns give a republican gain of 470. With the same rate of gain in the State to the Republicans they would have a plurality for Governor of 14,000.

Indianapolis, Ind., Oct. 12.—One hundred and fifteen precincts show a net republican gain of 677.

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Columbus, O., Oct. 12.—Returns are more favorable for the democrats. Five hundred and seven precincts give a net republican gain of 2,346. No definite returns have been received on congress men.

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Indianapolis, Ind., Oct. 12.—One hundred and twenty-five precincts show a net republican gain of 496.

Indianapolis, Ind., Oct. 12.—One hundred and thirty-five precincts show a net republican gain of 1,172.

Indianapolis, Ind., Oct. 12.—Returns from 623 precincts show a republican gain of 2,225. The net returns continue more favorable to the democrats.

Hamilton county, including Cincinnati, shows large democratic gains. Many of the heavy democratic counties have not been heard from. The democrats have not given up the hope of carrying the State, and it seems likely that later returns will somewhat diminish the heavy and unlooked for gains which the Republicans have made.

Columbus, O., Oct. 12.—Chairman Nash, of the republican committee, says that it is now likely that the republican majority on the State ticket will insure the election of thirteen and probably fifteen republican congressmen.

New York, Oct. 12.—The democrats of the sixth district nominated S. S. Cox for congress; ninth district, Fernando Wood; tenth district, Abrahm S. Hewitt; fifth district, Benj. Wood; and Nicholas Muller, of Irving Hall, who has the naming of the democratic candidates for congress, in the fifth district.

Newark, N. J., Oct. 12.—The city election to-day resulted in an average republican majority of 2,500. The Republicans elect 11 aldermen and the democrats 5. The common council will stand, 18 republicans, 12 democrats. The Republicans also gain four members of the Board of Freeholders. The German vote was strongly republican.
