

GUAYMAS.

An Interesting Letter—The Hottest Part of all the World—No Good Place in the Summer Time.

[Special Correspondence of the Gazette.] EDITOR GAZETTE:—Before leaving Las Vegas many promises were exacted from me to write all about the country when I got here, to see for ourselves, that the truth might be known as near as possible about the terminus of the new railroad.

We reached here the middle of August when the heat was intense, ninety-eight in the shade in the day time—and the same at night. It seemed to me as hot as Yuma is reported to be.

The town is built on a sandy strip lying along the bay, surrounded, hemmed in, shut up by cliffs are quite barren, so the sun's rays are reflected upon the sandy streets and bare walls with double force till the eyes are pained to look out.

There is an erroneous idea that people don't sweat in Mexico, but where do they sweat more? I have seen men come in from work, driving for instance, with sweat dripping from chin, nose and ears and clothes saturated.

There is little new in customs, houses and people. The same flat adobe houses, but the windows are large iron grates opening reaching to the floor for the double purpose of keeping out thieves and letting in air.

The road is progressing finely. It begins with a wharf on one of the small islands, runs along its side, crossing a bridge to the main land, turns north-east into the hills towards Hermosilla, leaving the present Guaymas to the west a mile or so.

Las Vegas, October, 17.—Gentlemen: You were very kind to me when I was a free man, and that is the reason I write this letter asking you to do an act of charity, and send me something to protect me from the cold, if it is nothing but a pair of socks.

The track of the Rio Grande, Mexico and Pacific is now laid seventeen miles south of San Marcial. The track layers are progressing at the rate of one mile and a half or two miles a day, and it is now estimated that communication will be made with the Southern Pacific at El Paso by the first of January.
