The Republicans now Claim 222 Votes in the Electoral College.

New York Gives 25,000 Majority and Pennsylvania about 30,000.

California and Nevada go to the Democrats.—Tennessee State Ticket Doubtful.

Iowa, Kansas and Other Western States Give Immense Majorities.

Hancock retired to bed, having given directions that he should not be awakened on account of any news that might be received.

New York, November 3.—To-night the appended message was sent to General Garfield: "The Republicans of New York City assembled in mass meeting at Choke-ring Hall send their most hearty congratulations to the President elect and assure him of a handsome majority in the state, over 40,000. Dow goes 329." From this time the President elect felt more free to express himself. He said: "after one of the most favorable speeches: 'Gentlemen, this result means three things, first, that the American people believe in the Nationality of the Government, second, that they believe in a good, honest and healthy financial policy, and third, they are determined not to disgrace the sphere of American politics by endorsing a campaign of personal abuses.'"

New York, November 3.—A special from Mentz, Ohio, says: Garfield received the news of his election in company with a few friends without any excitement and was as first indifferent when reports were circulating in New York. After reading the bulletin from the Times Garfield expressed his opinion in the first time as follows: "Gentlemen: If we have got New York's indications on, we can give them the entire Pacific coast, New Jersey, Connecticut and the solid South and thus beat them." Even so he said this time was no particular excitement in his manner and he was as one of his neighbors said "the cool man in Ohio."

New York, November 3.—Your special correspondent tonight requests your readers to contrast the foreboding of the presidential election with the now ascertained result and determine for themselves whether his predictions were not more judicious and reliable than the language prepared telegrams with which Chairman Bauman flooded the country. NEW YORK.

New York, Nov. 3.—Latest returns from New York city on mayoralty: Grace, democrat, 98,051; Dowd, republican, 96,748.

New York, November 3.—The total vote gives Grace 2940 majority for mayor and Daeharty for register 8,100.

New York City, Nov. 3.—Presidential vote complete: Hancock 123,192; Garfield 81,726. The Times says that the republicans have carried the state by 25,000 majority, and publishes a table of all the counties, showing Garfield's majorities 85,181, Hancock's 89,946, a republican gain of over 56,000, stated at 58,143. The Times also gives a list of members elected to the 47th congress as ascertained and divides them politically as follows: Republicans 156, Democrats 132, Greenback 5.

The democrats claim that it is utterly impossible for the party to gain general success in the north with a solid south vote hanging to their necks.

New York, November 3.—A newspaper extra insists that Dowd is probably elected mayor of New York but this is still doubtful.

New York, November 3.—The Star says general condemnation was expressed by the democrats and liberal republicans in the seventh assembly district yesterday when the fact became known that Maj. Gen. McDowell had registered falsely and consequently had no right as inspector of the registration of district Seventh. The Star states the McDowell was challenged and he swore his wife in, and registered as from No. 12 West 9th street, a house now occupied by Mr. B. Lewis, who stated that McDowell had not lived there for 180 years. He owned and rents the house to Gould The Brewer register shows that he stopped at the Brevard House with his wife on Oct. 25.

New York, November 3.—The apparent republican defeat in New Jersey is attributed to the Pennsylvania Railroad which threw its great power against them because Pull, the Republican candidate for governor identified himself with the Central railroad.

New York, November 3.—The republican majority in the state is about 25,000.

COLORADO.

Kokomo, Col., Nov. 3.—Official majorities of Robinson camp are as follows: Hancock electoral ticket 118; Morrison, for congress, 121; Hough, for governor, 117; Robinson for Lieut. governor, 173; Unfeg, for secretary of state, 115; Hall, for treasurer, 115; Brey, for auditor, 114; Stalup, for attorney general, 113; Crook, for superintendent of instruction, 103; Mann, for district judge, 124.

Central City, Colo., Nov. 3.—The following is the official returns of Central City, Gelpin county: Total vote cast, 825. Republican electors 297 majority; Belford, republican candidate for congress, 244 majority; Pitkin, for governor, 297 majority; Robinson, for secretary of state, 302 majority. The balance of the state ticket received 302 republican majority.

Trinidad, Col., November 3.—This town and precinct gives Hancock a majority of seventy-four; Morrison over Belford sixty-nine; Hough over Pitkin, eighty-two; the rest of the state ticket about the same as the local. For state senator Salberry received two hundred and fourteen and Borch three hundred and eighty one. Indications are that the whole democratic ticket was elected in the county by a majority of from five to seven hundred votes. These figures have been perpetuated in many predictions, in another place about sixty republicans who had registered found yesterday that their names were not on the book. These predictions in truth should be discarded, and no doubt there will be steps taken in that direction. (Gaulther, Va., November 3, Rub, a coal-fighter, was elected to Congress over Allen, the regular democrat in the 7th district by 1000 majority.

Denver, November 3.—The News' special reporter says the returns are not varied in but the democratic majority in the country will be about 400.

Denver, Colorado, November 3.—George Logan was elected chief of the city fire department and William Robertson, foreman of book company No. 2 was elected assistant chief.

Colorado Springs, Nov. 3.—This county as far as heard from gives Pitkin a majority of 509 and the electoral ticket 554 and Helm 438. Full returns will give Pitkin 650; Garfield 600, and Helm 500. Helm was scratched because of some local rivalry. He received at least 75 democratic votes in this city, and had good faith been kept his majority would have been over 700.

Pueblo, November 3.—The democratic electoral and state ticket has 45 majority in this county, with the exception of Hough, who has but five. The entire democratic county ticket is elected by an average of 100 votes.

Returns from 77 cities and towns and precincts over half the state and including Denver and Leadville, nearly complete give Garfield 3,011 majority and Pitkin for governor 3,918; Belfast for congress is 600 or 700 ahead of Garfield. All the strong democratic counties have been heard from except one which may perhaps decrease the above figures more than the other portion. Denver gives Pitkin over 900 majority and Garfield 500; the legislature is three-fourths republican.

IOWA.

Des Moines, Ia., Nov. 3.—The contest in the 8th district has been persistent by the greenback party. Their candidate for president threw his whole weight into the scales and made three visits and numerous speeches in the district. De La Motte of Indiana, went twice into and over the district. The principal republican speakers were employed elsewhere and Kansas was obliged to conduct all campaigns with great parsimony. The result is a victory over the greenbackers by over 5000. Iowa casts a solid republican delegation.

The republican state committee and the State Register gave additional returns from a good number of counties. These fully sustain the estimate of less than 70,000 majority for Garfield over Hancock. All the congressional districts in the state except the 5th give large majorities for the republican candidates.

Des Moines, Iowa, November 3.—Garfield's plurality in Iowa is about 83,392.

Des Moines, Iowa.—Returns received from Iowa by State Republican committee and State Register newspaper up to tonight raise the majority of Garfield over Hancock and indicate that it will

be 83,500. The Republicans carry all the congressional districts, retaining the 6th by 690 majority for Culis and the 7th by 3,550 for Kasson.

MISSOURI.

St. Louis, Nov. 3.—Almost complete returns of the city give Hancock a plurality of 433; Crittenden, Democratic candidate for governor, has a plurality of 514, and the remainder of the tickets pluralities range from 28 to 780, except for the secretary of state, Bradwell, republican candidate for that office, received a plurality of 63. The city part of the first congressional district give Fletcher, republican, about 1800. The five counties outside of the city, belonging to this city, will probably give Clardy, democrat, a majority which will elect him by perhaps 2500. The 2d district give Thomas Allen, democrat, between 2600 and 3000 majority. The 3d district is very close and will probably take the official returns to settle it.

St. Louis, Nov. 3.—The 12th congressional district gives Hatch, Dem., 1,500 or 2,000 majority; the 13th district gives Clardy by 2,500 majority. 2d district, Allen, Dem., 2,000 majority. 3d district very close.

St. Louis, November 3.—The republicans claim Van Horn in the 8th district where two democrats were running. The republicans have gained considerably in the vote.

Delaware.

San Francisco, Nov. 3.—Returns of the state continue to come in rapidly, but are of such a nature as to render it extremely difficult to forecast any result definitely. Fourteen precincts in this city give Hancock electors 1875 majority, and 1715 majority for Roseman for congress, and the republican self-declared majority are not likely to materially alter the result in case of this it seems almost a foregone conclusion that the state has gone democratic by a small majority, though at the republican headquarters they still figure out a republican majority of between 3000 and 4000. It may require the official vote to decide. It is impossible to make reliable estimates from the fact that the republican gains are found to a considerable extent in democratic strongholds and vice versa. In the third congressional district Berry, democrat, is probably re-elected. In the fourth district the race between Pacheco and Leech is so close that the outcome cannot at present be stated. Pacheco is re-elected in the second district, which proves that California will choose democratic electors and two or three democratic congressmen. The result may be fairly attributed to the influence of the Morey letter, at least that is the general belief expressed. The republicans claim they will at any rate get one elector, as Judge Terry, on the democrat ticket, is believed to be very badly scratched.

San Francisco, November 3.—A fire at Buencia last night destroyed two brick buildings containing construction department machinery and a boiler press belonging to the U. S. Arsenal. The loss is estimated at \$200,000.

Since Monday 56 cases of small pox have been discovered in the city and taken to the pest house. The health officer has been granted extraordinary power.

ILLINOIS.

Chicago, Nov. 3.—Returns from 333 towns and precincts in Illinois, outside of the city of Chicago, give a republican gain of 3029. This indicates that Garfield's plurality in the state will be 45,000. Standing debts has yet been received from close congressional districts. Some anxiety is felt for Davis in the 2d district, but the democrats concede his election. Farwell in 1st district, runs ahead of his ticket in Lake county, where he resides, with three towns to hear from. Garfield's majority is 128, Farwell's 1236.

Chicago, November 3.—The county gives Garfield 10,640 majority. The state gives him about 45,000. The 5 o'clock Journal and Daily News figure the electoral vote as follows: Garfield, Colorado, 3; Connecticut, 3; Illinois, 21; Indiana, 15; Iowa, 11; Kansas, 3; Maine, 7; Massachusetts, 10; Michigan, 12; Maine, 3; Nebraska, 3; New Hampshire, 3; New Jersey, 9; New York, 35; Ohio, 22; Oregon, 3; Pennsylvania, 29; Rhode Island, 4; Vermont, 3; Wisconsin, 10; Total 272. Hancock, the solid south, California and Nevada: Total 147.

Chicago, November 3.—scattering returns from Iowa show a net republican gain over the vote for governor in 1879 of about 15 per cent. The ratio holds good throughout the State. Garfield's plurality over Hancock is 83,327.

Chicago, Ill., October 3.—Returns from 337 towns and precincts outside of Chicago and Cook county give a net republican gain of 3228. Including Cook county the net republican gain in the state so far as heard from is over 4000, and which makes the majority in that section of the state which has been heard from and which is less than half the state 21,000. At this rate there will be in the neighborhood of 45,000 majority in the State and it may be considerably above that figure.

Springfield, Illinois, November 3.—The Republicans gain in the county, but Springer, a Democrat, is re-elected to Congress by 2000 majority.

Trouton, N. J., Nov. 3.—Returns are so incomplete that it is impossible to give Hancock's majority in this state, but it will undoubtedly exceed 5000.

Trouton, N. J., Nov. 3.—Senator Halbert, chairman of the New Jersey State republican committee, says he has positive information that Fair is elected governor by a majority of 300 but estimates that the democratic element have carried the vote by 5000 in the popular vote. The republican claim that the governorship will go to Fair with the democratic claim it will go to Fair.

Philadelphia, Pa., Nov. 3.—Returns from 117 precincts in this county give Hancock a majority of 30,000. Total vote in this city: Garfield 96,794; Hancock 75,067; Weaver 261; Dow 45; republican plurality 20,727.

INDIANA.

Indianapolis, Indiana, November 3.—The Indiana bulletin shows that 699 voting places which cast nearly 58 per cent of the vote in October show a net gain of 595.

Louisiana.

New Orleans, November 3.—Congressman Ackler arrived from the third congressional district this evening. He concedes the election of Darrell, republican, by from three to four thousand majority.

TENNESSEE.

Nashville, Tenn., November 3.—The city and county are carried for Hancock but the republicans carried the legislative ticket. The result over the state is still in doubt between Hawkins, the republican nominee for governor and Wright. The complexion of the general assembly is still doubtful as between the democrats and republicans, but the reputation delegation in the legislature will be insignificant.

CONNECTICUT.

Hartford, Connecticut, November 3.—P. T. Carson, republican, is defeated for state senator. The senate stands 16 republicans and 5 democrats.

Hartford, Conn., Nov. 3.—With five towns to hear from the state gives Hancock 65,716, Hancock 62,879, Weaver 336 and vote 12,237. Hancock's majority 2867.

For governor, Rippled republican, received 54,873; English 62,103.

NEBRASKA.

Omaha, November 3.—A great republican demonstration and political mass meet here to-night. A large band procession of nearly 1500 march and two bands of music paraded the streets. At 6 o'clock 4000 citizens in the academy of music about 500 were present.

GEORGIA.

Macon, November 3.—The vote is small. Blunt is elected to congress.

Kansas.

Topeka, Kansas, Nov. 3.—Garfield's majority is between 50,000 and 60,000. Republicans secure all the Congressmen.

KENTUCKY.

Louisville, Ky., Nov. 3.—Reports to be published that Judge Philaleas has been re-elected in the 10th district by a majority of 800 or 1000.

MISSISSIPPI.

Jackson, Miss., Nov. 3.—Returns from fifty counties, towns and precincts give Hancock 15,238, Garfield 6852. Returns from the 1st, 2nd, 4th and 5th congressional districts indicate the election of a democrat in each by a decided majority. Returns from the 6th district are meager and not sufficient to base an estimate on, but Chalmers leads as far as heard.

NEW HAMPSHIRE.

Greensboro, N. H., November 3.—Scotts has been re-elected to Congress.

MASSACHUSETTS.

Boston, Mass., Nov. 3.—The vote for governor, with twenty-eight towns to hear from, gives Long, republican, 150,516; Thompson, democrat, 104,934.

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
