The Vote in San Miguel County.

There was a heavy vote polled in  
this county for delegate and county  
officers.

West Las Vegas, or Old Las Vegas,  
has been divided into two precincts  
since last election, precincts Nos. 5,  
and 26.

Number 29 constitutes the new town.  
As was naturally expected Mr. Otero  
ran much ahead of the county ticket  
in all these precincts. The vote for  
delegate however was very pronounced  
and favorable to the cause of Mr.  
Luna.

In precinct No. 5, according to the  
official count, Luna received 282 votes  
and Otero 59, a majority for the former  
of 223.

Number 26, the court house pre-  
cinct gave Luna 52 majority.

East Las Vegas gave Otero 166 ma-  
jority out of a total vote of 303.

Upper Las Vegas gave Otero 47  
majority against 171 majority for Be-  
nito Baca two years ago.

La Cuesta gave Luna 47 majority,  
a republican loss of six over two years  
ago.

San Miguel gives Otero a majority  
of twenty-five, a democratic loss.

Los Mulas gives Luna 23 majority,  
a republican gain of 31.

Las Vailes gives Luna 44 majority,  
a republican gain of 21.

Chaparral gives Luna 30 majority,  
a republican gain of 51.

Sapello gives Otero 37 majority.

Manuelitas gives Otero 59 majority,  
a democratic loss of 27.

San Gerónimo gives Luna 150 ma-  
jority, a gain for the republicans of  
117.

Teolote, Otero gets 25 majority, a  
democratic loss of 88.

Rincon, Otero gets 37 majority, a  
democratic majority gain of 15.

Los Alamos gives 50 majority to  
Luna, a republican gain of 38.

Joya Larga gives Luna 22 ma-  
jority.

officially. Luna's majorities in these  
amount to 667. Otero's majorities  
amount to 396.
