TELEGRAPHIC.

The Proposition to Steal N. Y. Being Seriously Considered by Democrats.

The Way the Republicans Defrauded in Indiana Shown Up.

A Murderer Surrenders Himself to the Authorities At Chicago.

The Silver Bill to be Early Reported—Excursionists Strike Omaha.

Counting out New York.

Washington, D. C., November 10.—The Star this evening publishes this highly interesting dispatch from its New York special correspondent, which though seemingly somewhat sensational is known here to have been written by a person not addicted to sensation. He says while up to this time the very suggestion of going behind the New York returns and declaring this state for Hancock has been classed as part of the machinery for letting the democrats down easy it has been discovered that the democrats are very serious about the matter and working to that end with vigor and unknown during the canvass. After an industrious search for information leading to the democratic intention in this matter your correspondent with the inside secrets, finds:

1st.—That this statement comes from localities out side of the state, principally from southern states and mainly from Kentucky, and Richmond, that dispatches and letters and democratic newspapers have worked with great effect upon the democratic committee here who feared the effect of the opposition the business here would give to any further election talk.

2nd.—That the disputed question of the support of the solid south is settled in this matter as the committee here would not go on with this project, that Irving Hall and Tammany Hall and state have been at work, and claim to have made discoveries that astound those engaged in the prosecution of the inquiries into the various kinds of alleged frauds. Among other things they have found a technical violation of the law which is a penal offense under the statute. In a portion of the tickets the intent of the voter is not denied but the law makes certain kinds of tickets only valid and opens the penitentiary to those implicated in preparing them otherwise.

3rd.—The Democratic National Committee has not yet taken hold of the matter, but its executive committee meets here Friday. At this meeting the reports from three other committees, now working the subject, will produce forthwith affidavits to prove fraud involving over 20,000 votes.

4th.—These committees will request the National Committee, to insist upon the appointment of a congressional committee for investigation in the New York election. That they are serious in the matter there is no doubt. The republicans have done nothing, believing up to this time as Gen. Hancock. He is utterly opposed to any scheme of the kind, and says that nothing would come of the talk; but now they propose to be ready to demand that the same class of investigation shall proceed under their auspices in certain southern states, and here, also, to prove democratic fraud. Three or four democratic senators have already been heard from; Senator Davis of West Virginia, says he will not be a party to it but will oppose any attempt to open the affair, and the others say they will not think of giving it countenance. A nervous feeling is obvious here and nothing but some public declaration from enough democratic congressmen to settle the matter will avert the unsteadiness in business that is threatening to happen and to last till the votes are counted in January.

Ridiculous.
Cincinnati, O., November 10.—The Commercial's Indianapolis special shows what a ridiculous figure is cut

by the Democratic politicians who are trying to prove the frauds in the October elections. The only thing they have so far attained is to add to their own confusion and to reveal to U. S. Commissioner Lewis Jordan a Democrat in some very peculiar proceedings. One case has already been given in which Mr. Jordan persuaded a man to make an affidavit to what he did not believe. And now come two other instances: John F. Ehardt of Wabash was arraigned for swearing in an illegal vote in Pleasant Township. The prosecuting witness testified that he knew nothing personally about the voter whatever, whether he was a legal voter or not but a number of persons in Wabash county insisted that he should make affidavit against Ehardt and that on top of this he received a telegram from Indianapolis signed Hunter asking him to come here and make the affidavit and saying that he would receive his expenses. He did come and make the affidavit and was paid his expenses. The names of those interested were extracted from the witness and suits for their arrest and prosecution are likely to follow. The second case is that of Elder A. B. Chase, pastor of the Christian church at Wabash arrested for not acquiring a residence in the State. Chase agreed on the 31st of March with the official board of the Christian church to preach for them and began his ministry on the third of May. The interim was spent by him in preparing to move from Peoria, Illinois, his old home. It is claimed the intention to make Indiana his home was fixed in March which made him a legal voter. The affidavit for his arrest was made by a man who is said to be one of the most worthless men in Wabash and the arrest caused much excitement there. Mr. Chase was discharged upon his own statement. It should be remembered that these swift prosecutors, McDonald and Scott have not seen fit to take up any cases submitted to them by the Republicans.

Hunting Evidence.
Philadelphia, Nov. 10.—The Ledger's New York correspondent has learned from a perfectly reliable source that the Tammany committees are now at work obtaining what are called legal proofs of alleged illegal voting in no less than twenty-two assembly districts. These committees will submit their report to the board of state canvassers, which meets at Albany on the seventeenth. Affidavits, supported by additional testimony of illegal voting, which it is understood, will be furnished by the Democratic State Committee will declare Hancock electors duly chosen. This it is expected will at once bring the issue before congress.

Will be Paid.
Washington, D. C., Nov. 10.—The Secretary of the Treasury has notified the holders of the six per cent. bonds, issued February 8th, 1861, that they will be paid at the treasury department on December 31st, and that the interest thereon will cease on that day. These are not to be confused with the six per cent. bonds of 1861, which were issued in August, 1861, and March 1863. The department will be enabled to pay more promptly if the bonds for redemption are received early in the month. Bonds forwarded for redemption should be addressed to the secretary of the treasury.

Surrendered Himself.
Chicago, Illinois, November 10.—Yesterday a rather prepossessing young man with red mustaches and neatly dressed who said his name was John McMannus stepped into Chief McDonnell's office and said he was wanted in Philadelphia for the murder of Bernard Kelly in a political meeting about two years ago. After killing Kelly McMannus went to San Francisco and rambled about the west for several months, coming here in July. The Philadelphia authorities request the Chicago police to detain him, so there seems to be some ground for his self-accusation.

Meeting.
Paris, Nov. 10.—The Meeting of the Ministers and Under Secretaries lasted from 8 till midnight. The ministers finally determined, at the request of President Grevy, to defer their decision concerning resignations. There will be another Cabinet council this evening. The Journal Debates Republique Francaise, Syele and other Republican papers consider yesterday's vote due to the deplorable misunderstanding and express hopes that

the Ministers will retain their posts. Radical papers declare for new Cabinet or the dissolution of the Chambers.

Public Meeting.
San Francisco, Nov. 10.—A Victoria dispatch says that a large public meeting was held last night to consider the Canada default in the matter of the Island railway resolutions. It recites the losses that the province has sustained through the reservation. For several years the Island coast and agricultural lands express the belief that the province would be better off as a crown colony if the railroad obligations of the dominion are not fulfilled. The speeches were generally distinguished for their friendly tone toward Canada.

Earthquake.
London, Nov. 10.—Later particulars from Agraw in Creta, concerning the earthquake felt throughout south Austria on yesterday, state that 200 houses and two churches were damaged. Part of the Cathedral must be rebuilt also part of the palace and country seat of the the Cardinal Arch Bishop. The government school and a cigar manufactory were half destroyed. All buildings within a radius of fourteen miles were terribly damaged.

Excursionists.
Omaha, November 10.—The trains from Chicago to-day brought into Nebraska nearly two thousand excursionists from the eastern states. They come to view the state and purchase land from land granted to the railroads, who got up the excursion at about one cent a mile. Many of these visitors will not only buy lands but will also remove to Nebraska. Another equally as large number are expected to arrive to-morrow.

Silver Bill.
New York, November 10.—The Mail declares the recent election means the early report of the silver bill, which will go down with greenback currency. It believes the government will issue bonds for the greenbacks, or in other words fund them, and that this will be one of the first acts of the coming administration.

Refusal.
Chicago, November 10.—The state supreme court to-day made a public decision, refusing supercedas in the case of the Lake Shore & Michigan Southern vs Western Indiana railroad. This is a case involving the condemnation of certain land necessary to secure entrance into the city by the Western Indiana. It is a substantial victory of the latter road over the Lake Shore.

He has no Part.
Washington, D. C., Nov. 10.—The Star this evening says: Letters from Gen. Hancock were received here today by an officer who was on his staff. In the letter he says emphatically that he has no part in the agitation in regard to throwing out the new York vote. He is opposed to the agitation, and believes that Gen. Garfield was elected.

Outrage.
Jacksonville, Florida, Nov. 10.—The train from Madison court house, having on board five citizens in charge of the deputy U. S. Marshal, arrested for the violation of the election laws, was boarded on Tuesday night as it was leaving Madison by a party of masked men who relieved the prisoners and made the witnesses disembark.

Burned.
Chicago, November 10.—A Galena special says that Leonard Hiffners' restaurant in Alenbar, Wis., burned on last Saturday, and two of Hiffners children aged three and five years, perished in the flames, and their mother severely but not fatally burned.

The Canal.
New York, November 10.—The Bulletin says that the prophetic speculators here are discounting the business of DeLoseps canal by buying the Pacific.

Fire.
Deadwood D. T., Nov. 10.—A fire in the central part of the city this evening destroyed the American House and contents. Loss, \$60,000. Uninsured.

—Frank J. Weber has opened a grain and feed stable in the rear of the National hotel. Grain of all kinds and hay will be kept in abundance.

—Mr. Telesfor Jaramillo came up yesterday from Fort Sumner.

Bound to Vote.

The citizens of Red River, consider it a privilege to vote as is illustrated by the following sketch taken from the "Red River Chronicle." The voting place in this precinct had been moved some 40 miles distant from where a majority of the voters live and in order to exercise their right to vote, the people had to start the day previous to the election and make this long journey.

Our ride was down the valley of the Canadian until we reach Johnson's ranch, some twelve miles from here. There we took the right hand road and continued on it as far as the crossing of the Carrizo, where Mr. George Chaves and a large caravan of horsemen awaited us with a spread table for dinner. Repast soon over. In the meantime Mr. Simon Baca, of the Upper Town of Las Vegas, who was sent here to look out for the interests of the democratic party of San Miguel County, had overtaken and passed us, as well as Mr. Hilario Gonzalez, our neighbor, who took all the spare force of his burg in four wagons; which, together with what Mr. Lopez and his three sons-in-law brought along in their vehicles, made up a little company of sixty votes. Just as we passed the last point of Mesa Rica the sun went down on us, and the animals were hurried on to reach Clark's Ranch about dusk.

Commodore Nelson received us with open arms; some found quarters at Mr. Clark's; others at Mr. Giller-man's; some slept that night around the camp fire; Mr. Lopez and party went a mile further up the valley and our editor spread his blanket down in the wagon to watch the treasure in the blue keg.
