

Remembering the Yankees.

The seventy fifth anniversary celebration of the New England society of New York city was held on the evening of Forefathers Day, the 22nd inst. There were fully 550 guests present, including many distinguished gentlemen as invited guests. The New England club of this city on that day sent a despatch to President Carter of the New York society apprising him of the fact that in their observance of the 260th anniversary of the landing of the pilgrims, they were fulfilling the prophecy of Daniel Webster made in 1850—that in thirty years New Englanders would observe the day in New Mexico.

Rev Dr. Pritchard S. Storrs, the distinguished clergyman, responded to the toast "The Day we celebrate" in an able speech of considerable length. In the course of his remarks he made the following allusion to the Las Vegas club, after speaking of the civil war:

"We go through our four years debate, and it seems as if the country was in peril and as if the government itself was insecure. The debate is ended, the clouds disperse, and the government is there, only refreshed and purified and exalted by the stress and strain of the debate through which the people, whose it has been passing. That is the result of this composite American life to which our fathers gave one element, and one important element, and it is joyful—should be—to all of us to know that it will be celebrated all over the continent. Your president has a telegram which he will read to you, no doubt, soon, showing its celebration in New Mexico to-night. It should be joy to us—to all of us to know that it will be celebrated as long as the Nation continues, as long as the hills of New England stand, as long as the waters count me to beat in volleying thunder or in musical light on the strand and the rock which, 260 years ago, took upon them immortal renown."

Gen. Grant made a short, humorous speech, after his health had been drunk, indulging in much pleasantry at the expense of the city of Brooklyn, where the event had been celebrated the evening previous and he likewise gave Las Vegas the benefit of a bit of free advertising, saying: "It was my fortune last night to attend a banquet of this sort in the principal city on New York Harbor. * * * As I say it was my good fortune to attend a banquet of a society of the same name—the parent society I suppose, (roars of laughter), even including the one which is now celebrating its first anniversary in Las Vegas, New Mexico.

Pent-up Pickett.

Tom Picket, who was captured with "the Kid's" party has been trying ever since he was left alone in the Vegas jail to secure his release. He made a brave effort on Wednesday to raise bail but was unsuccessful. The authorities here stated that they could not hold him any longer as there were no charges against him in San Miguel county. Pickett made another effort yesterday to secure his release on bail and would undoubtedly have succeeded had it not been for the timely appearance of a Lincoln county man. Yesterday it was about decided to release him on \$300 bail, but Deputy U. S. Marshal Bell appeared before Justice Morrison and made a protest. The fact is that Pickett was turned over to the authorities here by Pat Garrett for safe keeping. No receipt was taken from the officers at the jail and they are obliged to keep him until Garrett asks to have him delivered up again. As soon as Garrett can arrange his affairs in Santa Fe, he will return for him and Tom will be taken to Lincoln county. There are numerous charges against Pickett in Lincoln county for stealing horses and other stock and quite a number of warrants are out against him nearly all of which it is stated, will hold, insuring him a long term of imprisonment. In conversation with a gentleman from the country in which Pickett has been depreading, he said: "Pickett is as bad as any of the gang; the only difference between him and the rest is that he hasn't the brains of the others. He is as mean as he knows how to be."

Brakeman Shout.

There was a little scare on the north bound train on Wednesday. The locomotive got stalled coming over Giora hill and the Pullman car was left beaming, while the rest of the train climbed the steep grade. There were quite a number of passengers aboard and not a little alarm was excited when the car commenced slipping and finally got up a good rate of speed. The passengers tugged and tugged at the brake, but couldn't wind them up when Dr. Shou hung on his overboard, and with the assistance of another passenger and a brakeman brought the car to a standstill. The Road From Guaymas.

A special despatch to the St. Louis Globe Democrat from San Francisco, dated the 29th says: Private advices from Guaymas, Mexico, show that railroad work on the branch of the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe is being pushed with much vigor. During December six vessels with railway material have arrived at Guaymas, each vessel bringing 1,000 tons of railroad iron from Wales. Forty-five miles of road-bed are graded, and the rest, to within fifteen miles of Hermosillo, is being rapidly prepared. The amount of material in hand will build the road half way to Hermosillo. The superintendent thinks the road will be opened to Hermosillo by the end of March. This and Sonora town is centered on a rich mining region which only needs railway communication to develop it. Superintendent Gardner has been much hampered by the attacks of Mexican newspapers, as they were angered by the establishment of a depot at Bantam. The authorities of Guaymas have caused great delay to the company by compelling them to land all material at the Custom House before taking it to Punta Arenas.

The names of the men who were lynched at Bernadillo on Tuesday night were Panaloeon Mier, of Algodones, and Santos B-navides, of the north end of Bernadillo.

A. G. Robbins will soon ship a large amount of furniture to El Paso, where he intends to establish another branch store. Mr. Robbins is truly doing a wholesale business.

There is no longer any doubt but what the Santa Fe road will be the first to reach El Paso and will secure the right of way through the cañon and then the Southern Pacific can whistle.

It is reported that a party of men is now on the track of the two Baca boys, who escaped from Sonora on Tuesday morning. These two murderers had but little start of their pursuers and there is a strong probability that they may yet be brought to justice.

Yesterday was a field day in the ice business and large quantities of excellent ice were sawed off for summer use. It measures about eight inches in thickness and is soft. A. G. Green is going to cut out of his ponds for fifty cents per ton.

F. Romero & Son have received the glass for their elegant new building.
