

LABOR'S TROUBLES.

Horrible Shooting in Chicago—An Anarchist's Tools.

Peaceable Strike at Detroit—New York Carmen Satisfied.

MORTAL FIGHT.

CHICAGO, May 5.—A horrible outcome resulting from last night's rioting occurred this evening shortly after 6 o'clock. Two officers had been stationed on the Desplaines street viaduct near the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul freight yards, to prevent the crowds gathering and idlers from gazing the men at work in place of the striking freight handlers. The officers noticed two particularly suspicious individuals slowly cross the viaduct and enter a saloon on Desplaines street near Carroll avenue. Officer Michael Madden, of the Desplaines street station, who was somewhat closer to the saloon than the other officer was given a signal to keep his eye on the ugly pair that had attracted attention. At this moment a revolver was thrust from the saloon door by one of the men and a shot fired into the street in the direction of the officers. Madden stepped quickly to the saloon door and at once

GRAPPLED WITH THE MAN who held the revolver, while two other officers hurried to his aid. In the scuffle the man with the revolver pressed the muzzle of his weapon to Madden's breast and fired. Madden recoiled, but steadying himself almost instantly brought his own revolver into proximity with his assailant's head and pulled the trigger. Madden and his prisoner locked in each other's arms, rolled to the floor just as officers Daley and Bennett running reached the saloon. The companion of Madden's assailant had vanished. Both Madden and his prisoner were taken to the county hospital. The doctor says the man was somewhat under the influence of liquor and the result of the injury cannot yet be told. Papers found on his person shows his name to be John Lefferts. Officer Madden's wound is mortal.

ANARCHISTS IN CLOSE QUARTERS.

CHICAGO, May 5.—Another outbreak at the corner of Eighteenth street and Center avenue occurred about 5 p. m. Crowds lined the sidewalks for several blocks, but were being kept in motion as much as possible. Suddenly a bottle was hurled from the vicinity of a drug store at several police who were situated on an opposite corner. The officers immediately drew their revolvers and fired. The mob scattered in every direction. Whether anyone was seriously injured or not it was impossible to ascertain.

GETTING AT THE FACTS.

The inquest over the remains of police officer Degan, who was murdered by the anarchist mob last night, was concluded at 8:40 this evening. Chris Spies and Michael Schwab, two of the prisoners, made statements in their own behalf which damaged rather than helped them. Schwab admitted that he did not believe in a personal God. Fielding made statements that were substantially the same. August Spies made no statement and the jury retired. They were out half an hour and then agreed on a verdict, recommending that all the prisoners be held for murder without bail, and that Parsons be apprehended and held. One of the policemen who raided the Arbeiter Zeitung office gave some sensational testimony. He said that on a shelf of Spies' private room he found a bundle containing sawdust and nitro-glycerine. It looked exactly the same as they found on Desplaines street after the explosion, only it was not so hard. Witness described the effect of the explosion on some rocks underneath which it was placed. Fragments of boulders were carried away an immense distance. "Most of the stuff," concluded the officer, "is stored in a vault, and one of our men who is an expert says there is enough in it to blow up this building."

WHAT THEY OPERATE WITH.

Late in the afternoon Officer Burns opened the private desk of Parsons at his place of business, and in doing so found that the drawers contained a large quantity of powder, fuses and other explosives. One of the kind that is used in heavy blasting, was six inches long and one and one-half inches in diameter. It was full of giant powder, with fuse attached, and ready for lighting. Parsons had not been caught up to the time of this writing. Search was made for him at his home, but he was not found. His wife told the police that her husband was so well hidden that there was no danger of his being found.

PLOT TO BURN THE LUMBER DISTRICT.

CHICAGO, May 5.—A secret plot among the Bohemian anarchists in the southwestern section of the city to start incendiary fires in the lumber district tonight was revealed to the police by a man in the employ of the detectives late this afternoon. The plot included preparations to cut the hose of the fire department and disable their machinery when they should respond to alarms. The preparations of the police are ample to cope with the incendiary. An extra fire tug will be sent up the river and the district will be carefully patrolled.

PEACEABLE STRIKERS IN DETROIT.

DETROIT, Mich., May 5.—The strikers in the western part of this city have continued orderly, but are very decided in their demands, and have by force of numbers overawed several hundred more men, so that they too are now out. At an early hour the strikers, over 500 in number, assembled near the Michigan car shops, and decided to visit the various establishments about town for the purpose of inducing men to strike. Calm counsels of the leaders, however, prevailed over the rashness of several men and the strikers formed in ranks and quietly marched to the Peninsular car shops, their numbers being increased till there were not less than 1,500 in line. Anticipating trouble, Superintendent Heck had notified his men that it was impossible to grant an increase and on the arrival of the strikers in front of the shops they were shut down. The strikers then visited a number of other establishments and succeeded in drawing out over 1,000 men.

CONDUCTORS AND DRIVERS SATISFIED.

NEW YORK, May 5.—An agreement was signed this evening by the strikers of the executive board and officers of the Third avenue road for the settlement of the car driver's and conductor's strike. It provides that 150 conductors

and 150 drivers are to be permitted by the company to resume work in the morning if they present themselves at the proper hours, and 135 conductors and 135 drivers are to be put on the "extra list" at the same time. This provides for 570 men of the 1,300 strikers, and the company to discriminate as to whom they are to employ. Old men are to be given preference as vacancies may occur and men are to be employed as needed on the cable and One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street lines.

MRS. PARSONS RELEASED.

CHICAGO, May 5.—Mrs. A. K. Parsons, whose missing husband is the anarchist most wanted by the police just now, and who was arrested this evening for complicity in inciting last night's riot, has been released. It was found that there were no grounds upon which she could properly be held, and as she would divulge absolutely nothing she was allowed to go.
