To Water Consumers. The company are working under reduced head and expect that consumers will stop all unnecessary waste of water until the pipe is extended further up the river, and new dam and filter put in which they are arranging to do as soon as possible.

Rule 1. No person or family supplied with water by this Company will be permitted to use the water for any other purpose than that stated in the application or agreement, or that estimated for in fixing the rates, nor supply water in any way to other person or persons without a written permit from the office of said company.

When such concealment is ascertained, the water will be cut off until the application is renewed. Violation of any of the above rules shall be visited with a loss of water supply and forfeiture of all money paid.
