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### A NEW AMENDMENT

#### Proposed to Prohibit the Practice of Polygamy.

#### A Collision on the Atchison Road at Springer.

#### An Interesting Grist From the National Capital.

#### Sudden Death of Mr. Ex-Senator Pendleton in New York.

#### A Constitutional Amendment To Prohibit Polygamy.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 21.—The following is the full text of the proposed constitutional amendment to prohibit polygamy which has been favorably reported from the house committee:

Resolved, that it is deemed necessary by the two houses of congress to propose an amendment to the constitution, when ratified as hereby proposed by the legislatures of three-fourths of the sovereign states. The proposed amendment to be numbered and to read as follows:

Article XVI. First—Marriage relation by contract or in fact by one person of either sex and more than one person of either sex, shall be deemed polygamy. Neither polygamy nor any polygamous association, or cohabitation between the sexes, shall exist or be lawful in any place within the jurisdiction of the United States or of any of the states.

Second—The United States shall not, nor shall any state, make or enforce any law which shall allow polygamy or any polygamous association or cohabitation between the sexes; but the United States and every state shall prohibit the same by law within their respective jurisdictions.

Third—The judicial power of the United States shall extend to the prosecution of the crime of polygamy and of polygamous association or cohabitation between the sexes under this article, and congress shall have the power to declare by law the punishment therefor.

Fourth—Nothing in this constitution, nor in this article, shall be construed to deny to any state the effective power, subject to the provisions of this article, to make and enforce all laws.

A Collision at Springer.

SPRINGER, Mo., May 21.—The Atlantic & Pacific special passenger train, as it crossed the bridge over the Cimarron river, at Springer, on the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe road, at 8 o'clock this evening, tried to pass a stock train on the same track, which had not been switched out of its way, and as is usual in such cases, a general smashup was wrecked. None of the trainmen were seriously hurt, but several passengers were badly shaken up. One man on the passenger train was thrown from the train and three men on the stock train are seriously injured, namely: Ira Jameson, B. Jameson, and T. J. Foster. The passenger engine is badly smashed and two stock cars with cattle are totally wrecked. The cattle are owned by Upcher & Stevens, of Socorro county, and are enroute for Kansas City.

The Governor of Maine Talking for Blaine.

PORTLAND, Me., May 21.—Gov. Robie said today: "To my mind the seizure of the David J. Adams and the Dougherty was a blotter on the part of the Canadian government, an outrage on our flag, and a gross injustice to our fishermen. I am very confident that there is in Maine but one sentiment. We desire peace, and we regret that the shadow of war should be, even for one moment, cast upon us, but at the same time we desire to have the rights of our fishermen respected, and we ask of the national government to extend the same protection to our property when in Canadian waters as when at home. Statesmanship will be demanded to carry us through the present trouble without the loss of dignity or sacrifice of our rights. We look to Washington for that statesmanship. The administration has yet to declare its policy, and I have no criticism to make in advance of that declaration."

Lightning Strikes.

NEW YORK, May 21.—Three hundred and fifty men, employed in the shops of the Edison Electric company in this city are on a strike. The company had already conceded them an advance in wages and a reduction in hours from ten to nine. Now they demand that only union men be employed and that no employee be required to attend more than one planer instead of three as heretofore. The company threatens to close down and have all their work done by contract.

Good Country to Live In.

SICILY, May 21.—The eruption of Mount Aetna hourly increases in violence. Molten lava was only two hours distant from Nicolosi, eight miles from here, on the slope of the volcano, when the inhabitants fled. Many dwellings were destroyed, but no lives were lost. Earthquake shocks are constantly occurring.

The Telephone Investigation.

WASHINGTON, May 21.—In the telephone investigation today evidence was adduced showing that Professor Gray had secured his caveat before Bell had made application for a patent, and that Bell secured his patent first by improper influences being brought to bear on the patent examiners.

### CONGRESSIONAL.

#### PROTECTING OUR FISHERIES.

WASHINGTON, May 21.—After a long debate the house passed the bill prohibiting the importation of mackerel during the spring season by a vote of 190 to 90. As passed the bill prohibits, for a period of five years from the first of March, 1887, the importation into the United States or landing upon its shores, of all mackerel, except Spanish mackerel, caught between the first of March and the first of June of each year. The penalty prescribed for a violation of this act is a forfeiture of the mackerel imported or landed, and if the vessel violating the act be a United States vessel, the bill provides for a forfeiture of its license. Nothing however, in the act is to be held to apply to mackerel caught off shore with a hook and line from open row boats of less than twenty feet keel and landed in said boats.

CONSIDERING PRIVATE BILLS.

Several private bills reported today and on previous Fridays from the committee of the whole were passed today. Among them was one removing the charge of desertion from the record of Franklin Thompson alias Leeceyals. This is the case of a woman who for two years served in a Michigan regiment as a soldier, without disclosing her identity.

THE OVERDRAFTS PROVIDED FOR.

The urgent deficiency bill, being reported by Mr. Allison, from the committee on appropriations, it was passed without debate.

THE STIFF BACKED SENATE.

Mr. Plumb moved that the senate insist on its amendments to the postoffice appropriation bill. The senate agreed to the motion and a conference committee was appointed.

REVIVING A CHESTNUT.

In the senate today the reports of the majority and minority of the committee on the bill providing for the closing up of the business of the Court of Appeals claims were read. The majority report maintains that the difference between coin and currency at the time of the Geneva award and afterwards at the sale of the Geneva award bonds was and is the property of the United States treasury and should not form any part of the sum out of which judgments of the courts should be paid. The minority report contends, on the contrary, that the United States occupied the position of trustee for the claimants and could not sell the bonds named and credit itself with the difference between gold and currency value. The bill was passed as it came from the house.

TO SETTLE THE MORMON QUESTION.

The house committee on judiciary today instructed Chairman Tucker to report favorably on the proposed amendment to the constitution declaring polygamy unlawful. There was but one member of the committee who did not agree to this action of the committee, and he only desired further time to consider it.

CONFIRMATIONS.

Mrs. Virginia Thompson was today confirmed as postmistress at Louisville, Kentucky.

TO SUPPRESS THE TRAFFIC IN OPIUM.

The president today transmitted to congress a communication from the secretary of state recommending additional legislation for the suppression of the opium traffic, in accordance with the supplemental treaty with China which went into effect in 1858.

Hanging in Cheyenne.

CHEYENNE, Wyo., May 21.—A special to the Leader from Sidney says: James Reynolds was hanged here today for the murder of James and John Pinkston, father and son, thirty miles north of Sidney, September 16, 1885. In a letter to his mother, written last night, he acknowledged his crimes, but claims that the Pinkstons and himself had a dispute over the settlement of money matters between them and in the fight he killed them. Reynolds was very cool and collected when brought to the gallows.

The Day's Delings of the Apaches.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 21.—A Tombstone, Arizona, special says: The Apaches killed two Mexicans on the Mescal range, near the Mexican line, yesterday, and fatally wounded a boy between Mescal springs and San Pedro.

PRAYING FOR RELIEF.

The leading citizens of Fontstone have sent a petition to the United States government setting forth the condition of affairs in this section.

Tragic Death of a Noted Lady.

DENVER, May 21.—A Washington special to the Republican says: The tragic death in New York of Mrs. Pendleton, wife of ex-Senator Pendleton, minister to Berlin, creates a profound sensation at Washington, where she has been long and favorably known. Mrs. Pendleton was enroute to traveling abroad and deeply regretted leaving her handsome mansion in Washington, now occupied by Secretary Endicott. But a few days since General Dan Sickles was in the city and was noticed leaning on his crutches in conversation with a gentleman within a short distance from the spot where he shot and killed Phillip Barton, Mrs. Pendleton's brother, in 1837, and Mrs. Pendleton seeing him there and having the circumstance so forcibly recalled to her mind, it seems to have afflicted her and caused a nervous prostration which resulted in death.

THE NEWS SENT TO MR. PENDLETON.

BERLIN, May 21.—United States Minister Pendleton and his daughter Mary, witnessed a parade of the Imperial guard today and on returning to the American legation they were handed a telegram announcing the death of Mrs. Pendleton. Both were terribly shocked. It is not yet known whether Mr. Pendleton will return to America.

EUFAULA, I. T., May 20.—Deputy United States Marshal Andrews and his posse of three were all mortally wounded by Bill Pigeon while attempting the capture Saturday. Pigeon had killed twelve men, and Andrews and the posse were after the reward. The particulars of the affair have not been learned. A posse of armed men are scouring the country for the desperado.

SPRINGFIELD, Mass., May 21. This afternoon Andrew Wiggins, a bricklayer, and his wife were walking in Dwight street. Suddenly Wiggins drew a revolver, and stepping back fired three shots at his wife, all of which took effect. Wiggins then shot himself through the head and fell dead. He was well connected, being the son of the president of the New Hampshire legislature.

LONDON, May 20.—A special cablegram says: The rumors in regard to Mr. Gladstone's intentions in the present crisis are conflicting. Only one thing seems certain—he has given up all hope of getting the bill through the parliament. It is stated in some quarters that if left to his choice he would dissolve parliament at once, but in this desire he has not the sympathy of his cabinet. It is expected a division on the bill will be reached by the first of next week and it will be defeated by about twenty votes.

RICHMOND, Va., May 20.—The Methodist general conference today refused to admit the rules in reference to baptism, or to change of name from "M. E. Church South" to "M. E. Church." The committee on revision presented a lengthy report in which, among other things, they recommended non-concurrence in the memorial that any church member signing a petition for the sale of intoxicating liquors may be dealt with as in cases of improper and imprudent conduct. In this last matter the committee say that the law should remain as it now stands.

WHEELING, W. Va., May 20.—In Lincoln county last night Mrs. Margaret Donagan, a widow, became crazed from religious fanaticism and said she had been called upon by the Lord to sacrifice the lives of herself and three children to satisfy divine wrath. Early in the evening she prostrated herself upon her knees and after spending several hours in wild ravings arose and armed herself with a large sharp carving knife, made her way to the room occupied by her three daughters, aged 10, 13 and 15 years and cut the throat of each child and then plunged the carving knife deep into her own heart.
