On the Fretful Stream of Life's Daily Affairs.
Connivance at crime—A Big Hatch Trade—Injured Innocence—And Other Items of Interest for The Gazette Readers Edification.

The Mighty Fallen.
The case of Halie Scott came up before Justice Ulibarri yesterday at 2 o'clock. While the laws of New Mexico are in many respects equal to those of any state in the union, on the subject of concubinage they are defective. It seems that nothing can be done until notice has been served upon the parties that they must desist from their evil practices or marry. So, in order that notice might be served upon Halie and her paramour, who skipped the town as soon as the trouble began, ten days were granted, and the case will come up again the 7th of June. One of the remarkable things in the case was that a prominent lawyer undertook the defence of this notorious woman. How any man who holds himself to be anything at all, who has female members of his family, can lend himself to prevent such a party from receiving the just rewards of her evil deeds, is certainly a matter hard to understand. The good of this city demands that this woman and her procurer shall receive the full measure of the law's demands, and every man who has the good of the city at heart, should aid to this end rather than by quibbles or legal technicalities attempt to shield the guilty or obstruct the processes of justice. Another matter to be condemned is the fact that the prosecuting attorney of this county, one who should be a terror to evil doers, went upon this woman's bond to keep her from going to jail. How can the laws be executed, now can they be extinguished, how can our city secure the good name she deserves and which is essential to our prosperity, if our officials and those who would be leading men lend themselves to the giving of aid and comfort to the violators of law and decency. Some things need to be changed and that at once.

Our Agricultural Resources.
Louis Eckel has been making some experiments in the raising of different crops. Last year he planted one-fourth of an acre to Mangel-Wurzel beets; and he harvested six tons, which he sold at \$15 per ton to Fetterman and other milkmen of our city. Ninety dollars for the produce of one-quarter of an acre, would be well for any country. Many of them weighed as much as eleven pounds each. Fetterman says that his cows would leave the best of slop to feed upon these beets. Mr. Eckel is of the opinion that from twenty-five to thirty tons of turpains can be yielded upon the average yield of the turpin crop. Furthermore, in 1935 he planted 10,000 cabbage plants. Many of these reached a weight of sixteen pounds each, while the average of the entire crop was about six pounds to the head. He found ready sale for them at from one to two cents per pound. If more profitable farming than this can be found any where, the place ought certainly to be made known.

Localities.
Action speak louder than words.
H. Scott, wife and child are in the city from Greenville, Miss. Mr. Scott is an uncle of the Lewis boys.
John W. Hill is still very sick, and not improving as rapidly as his many friends would be pleased to hear.
The preparations for the Decoration day services are progressing favorably and it promises to be a notable event.
Dr. Atkins started about 1 o'clock Wednesday night for Cherry Valley to see Mrs. Henderson, who is dangerously ill.
J. O. Philippi, assistant general freight agent of the Santa Fe road, passed south last night on his way to Albuquerque.
A number of vagrants are infesting the city. Let them next receive the attention of the authorities. While they have the job of purifying the city in hand, they had as well go through it in good style.
The claim is made that while the American women have been required to leave Main street, quite a number of Mexican women of the same stripe have been permitted to remain. While the work is in hand let it be completed.
Sergeant McKeon, from Fort Union, came in the latter part of last week, fell ill of pneumonia at the American House and died yesterday afternoon at about 5:30. His body will be taken this morning to the fort for interment.
Main street, on Zion's hill, last night was as quiet and serene as the rear street of a retired country village. No one would be afraid to pass along the highway or to live upon it, were it kept always in such a state. It can be done if the people so will it.
A young fellow named Gilbert has evidently become demented. He is under the impression that parties are seeking his life, and so keeps in hiding. He has been here about a year from Texas. He has no friends here to look after him, and the authorities should take him up.
R. M. Collins was yesterday making estimates on the plans for a house for D. Thomas, Lewis Lutz' son-in-law. It is to be a handsome edifice with six rooms, vestibule, closets, verandas, all finished in native pine with oil finish. Mr. Collins has built some of the finest residences in our city.

Superintendent Vail of the Telephone service, has, with the exception of about \$300 raised the money asked of Las Vegas to secure the telephone route to Santa Fe. Those \$300 will certainly be subscribed. This shows that Las Vegas is neither dead or dying. Now let Santa Fe do her part, and the much desired line will at once be built. Mr. Vail deserves much credit for the vigor with which he has pushed this project.
The Romero hose company met last night to arrange matters for the proposed trip to Trinidad on July 4. Would it not be a good idea for Las Vegas, as the leading city of the territory, to celebrate the Fourth in good style herself this year? In the good old days of four or five years ago Las Vegas always did Independence day up in style, and the money spent on individual celebration if combined would afford a big spread.

The east side hose company received the entire amount of \$250 appropriated by the railroad company as compensation for the work done at the burning of the Montezuma. To reward the Romero hose, free transportation has been granted them to Trinidad the Fourth of July. The hose boys of both sides go free of cost. Then the proceeds of all tickets which can be sold to outsiders will go into the coffers of the west side company. They will put tickets on the market at reduced rates.

The boundary lines of the several counties need to be definitely and officially determined. At present San Miguel county finds itself in a controversy with Mora county on one side and Santa Fe on the other, each claiming a slice of our domain. Of course our officials demur to the claim, and in the case of taxable property within the disputed limits, the question is, who shall receive this revenue? No little trouble is anticipated, unless the question is authoritatively settled.

The residence of Mr. Wm. M. Eads, on the east side, is rapidly approaching completion. It is a very attractive building and will add greatly to the appearance of that portion of the town, which is already graced by a number of handsome residences. Captain Eads is to be commended for his energetic and public spirited action in forwarding the improvement of the park on which his new residence faces. It will greatly improve the appearance of that section of the city and its value as a location for residences.

Mr. Edgar T. Ensign, of Colorado Springs, a member of the Forestry association of Colorado has been making a tour through New Mexico in the interests of forestry. He has met a cordial reception at all points visited here, and has been the means of exciting more than a passing interest in this most commendable work in which he has been so long engaged. The result of his trip to this territory will no doubt result in the organization of a similar body in this territory, which will result in great good in the encouragement given to the planting and the protection from destruction of our forests.

Today a trade was closed whereby J. W. Bradford & Son, of Needah, Wisconsin, become the owners of the M. E. Kelly ranch at Caber Springs, this county and all cattle in the M. E. brand now running on that range. By this purchase the Messrs. Bradfords have secured a very desirable property as the range is in the most desirable grazing section of San Miguel county and the cattle are of good grade, and well located. The property adjoins the Quincy & Las Vegas Cattle Co.'s range of which company Mr. Bradford's brother J. T. Bradford, of Quincy, Illinois, is president. J. W. Bradford & Son are extensive and wealthy lumber dealers of Needah, Wisconsin, and it is a source of gratification that such substantial eastern firms find it profitable to invest in New Mexico, and it is particularly pleasing to note that those who have already made investments and placed the management of the same in practical hands are so well satisfied with the returns as to induce their friends to look for similar investments, as in this case.

Quite a little excitement was created on the east side yesterday by a case, which is remarkable to say the least of it. Miss Clara Hyatt, the young lady who kept the little notions store on Sixth street, and whose death was announced in THE GAZETTE of yesterday, brought with her from Chicago a young lady clerk, Miss Louise Caldwell, aged about 15 years. They came last December, though they had been living together for two or three months prior to that time in Chicago. Miss Caldwell's services were engaged for a year, and up to the time of Miss Hyatt's death no employe could have been more faithful.
