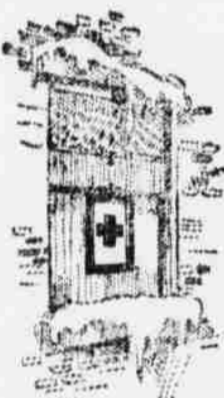


# JOIN

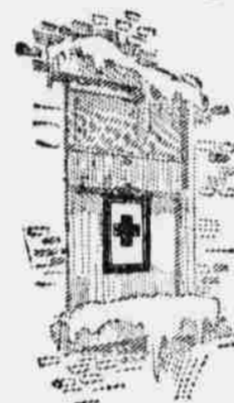
