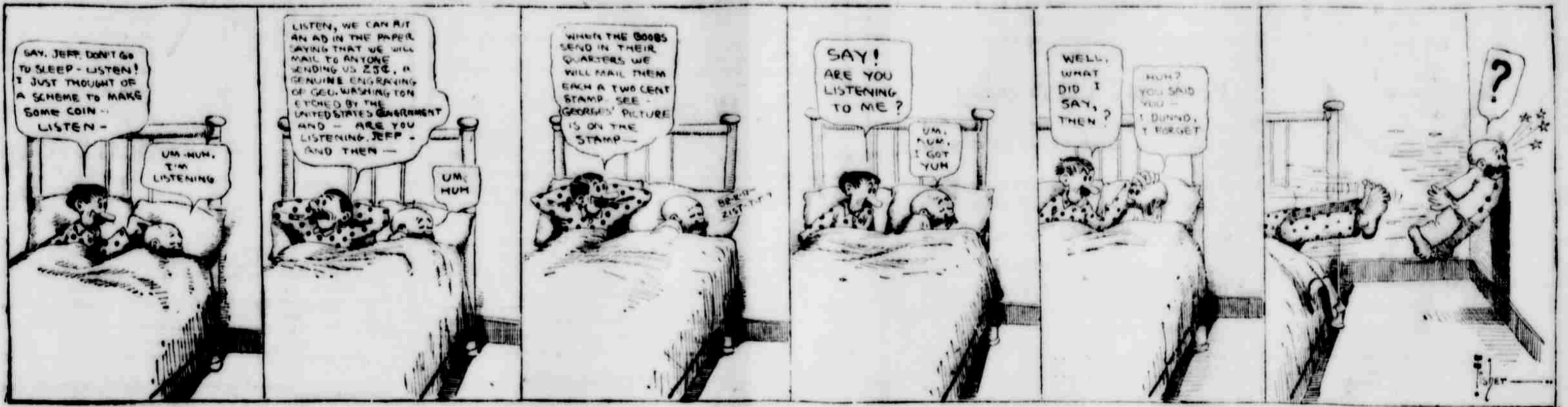

KANSAS CITY LIVESTOCK
Kansas City Stockyards, April 12.—The cattle market acted a good deal better last week, closing 10 to 25 cents higher, after commendable activity all week. Light steers and 4-year-olds, heavy hogs, the full grade, heavy stock, etc., small end of it, stockers and feeders not much changed for the week, good weather, which is holding grass back against the trade in country grades, buyers the past week showing a disposition to pick and choose. Feeders carrying flesh are not much wanted, buyers preferring to put on the gains themselves. The run today is 16,000 head here, and fairly liberal elsewhere, resulting in a decline of 5 to 10 cents on steers, though the stuff and stockers and feeders are steady to strong today. Killers still claim there is no improvement in the beef trade, but this is taken with a grain of salt. The newspapers are getting after retail butchers, who have fraudulently kept prices up for months after wholesale prices have been reduced. This will broaden the outlet should retail prices be reduced. Lent is about over, and some Jewish holidays this week, having been observed will permit of a better Koshier demand after the last of the week, which trade requires heavy steers. These are popular features, but if there are too many cattle ready to come, which is believed in some quarters, they will count for nothing in advancing prices. Top steers are worth around \$6.00, bulk \$5.50 to \$6.25, medium to common \$5.50 to \$5.85, cows \$4.50 to \$5.25, heifers, \$5.00 to \$5.25, bulls \$4.25 to \$5.25, veals \$5.50 to \$7.00, quarantine steers \$5.00 to \$6.10, stockers \$5.00 to \$5.90, feeders, \$5.40 to \$5.00.

Although hog receipts at the leading markets fell off 10,000 head last week, packers were able to push prices still further down, and the close was 20 to 25 cents lower for the week. The run today is 12,000 head here, market 10 to 15 lower, the packers retaining their control of the situation. Light weights sold good, in relation to heavies, till Saturday, when they, too, have come under the spell and are 30 cents lower today than Friday. Heavy hogs sold at 6.05-6.15 here today, medium weights \$6.10 to \$6.30, lights \$6.25 to \$6.35. Locally the supply has been running nearly twice as heavy as this time last year, and big receipts are predicted from now on indefinitely till the pendulum swings the other way.

Sheep and lamb prices have softened steadily since the middle of last week, prices off about 10 cents today. Ten dollars was paid for spring lambs last week, but it will not occur again this year, traders say, top springs today \$5.00. Woolled lambs sold today at \$5.00 to \$6.10, some clipped lambs at \$5.50, wethers worth \$5.15, ewes today at \$4.50, goats selling around \$2.50. There will be a good run of Colorado fed stuff here this week, but supply from this source will soon fall off. Unless Texas comes to the front soon there will be a period of short supplies this month with a chance for a rise in prices.
