ALLEGED PREACHER WAS BRIBED

Rev. B. J. Waugh, Prohibition Officer in Oklahoma, Indicted for Accepting Bribes for Non-Enforcement.

Muskogee, Okla., April 29.—Rev. B. J. Waugh, head of the department for the enforcement of the prohibition law in Oklahoma under Governor Foy Kohler, who was arrested recently in Oklahoma City on an indictment returned against him by a Muskegee county grand jury, will be brought here to answer the indictment.

It is said that he has arranged to give bond and that former Governor Haskell will go his surety. Waugh is charged with soliciting and accepting a bribe while a state official.

There are two counts in the indictment. One charges that Waugh, through Joe Lightle, who acted as his agent, agreed to turn back to W. E. Delehant, a local drug man, four bottles of beer and stop the case against Delehant if the latter would pay him \$50.

The other count charges that at the solicitation of Waugh, Tom Owens, a druggist and alleged joint keeper, paid Waugh \$50 in cash for protection from the state officials.

The indictment of Waugh created a sensation here as he was a leader of the prohibition forces in the state, and led many campaigns against bootleggers and joints during his tenure of office.

ANOTHER CERRILLOS MAN IS ARRESTED

FEDERALS VIOLATE ARMISTICE SAYS LOCAL MAN

Mexican Government Has Sent Six Hundred Soldiers, Disguised as Civilians, Into Juarez, Via Laredo.

That the Mexican government has violated the armistice between the federalists and insurgents by sending six hundred soldiers, disguised as civilians, into Juarez, via Laredo and El Paso, was declared by a well known Albuquerque man who returned to this city last evening after spending ten days along the frontier.

"The soldiers entered the United States at Laredo as civilians," said the local man, who does not wish his name mentioned, "and from there they traveled by train to El Paso, in groups of two and threes. They crossed over the river at El Paso, went into Juarez and again donned the uniform of the Mexican army. The instructors will doubtless strongly resent the flagrant violation of the armistice of which the Mexican government is apparently guilty in this case. I would not be surprised to see the instructors immediately resume hostilities."

M'FIE IS OPPOSED BY HANNA

Washington, April 29.—Judge John R. McFie of Santa Fe arrived here Thursday and called on the attorney general. It is said to secure a recommendation to the bench. One R. H. Hanna, claiming to represent various attorneys of Santa Fe, however, has sought to block the effort by again bringing forward the charges of "subservience to political influence" filed over a year ago, and which charges, he says, will be vigorously pressed if McFie's name is sent to the senate for confirmation. In view of the early prospects of statehood it is said Judge McFie will likely serve until the first state election is called.

GATES OF CANTON CLOSED AGAINST REBEL BANDS

Loyalty of Troops is in Doubt and Officials Are Slain; U. S. Gunboat and British Destroyers Go to Scene.

Hong Kong, April 29.—Li, the Tao-tai of Canton, has been assassinated by the rebels who again are strong. The gates of the city have been closed. The uprising in Canton appears to have been instituted by the anti-Machus. Hundreds of rebels have been killed and wounded in the fighting which began with an attack on the viceroys' palace last Thursday.
