

DISEASES CAUSED BY OCCUPATIONS DISCUSSED AT CONFERENCE

Society on Charities and Corrections Also Takes Up Subject of Wayward Child in Country and Other Matters.

(By Evening Herald A. P. Leased Wire) Boston, Mass., June 12.—Occupational diseases were the subject of an address by Dr. Alice Hamilton of Hull House, Chicago, at the national meeting of the national congress of charities and corrections in Worcester, Mass., today.

Delegates at a sectional meeting in Chicago had discussed the question of state supervision of charities.

Other important meetings considered the wayward child of rural communities, special types of church work in social reform, extended work among the family, rehabilitation of the training of social workers and the different phases of social reform.

Industrial Diseases Arise.

That very little is known in the United States about industrial diseases is partly due to the fact that many of the most important trades employ highly skilled immigrants who are unknown to the community in which they live, said Dr. Alice Hamilton of Philadelphia in an address before the conference this morning. Dr. Hamilton stated the extensive study of the social industry made last year as the only scientific inquiry of this kind to have been completed in this country. Contrasting she said, "There is a widespread but erroneous belief that our country suffers less from trade diseases than the other countries. The Illinois commission on occupational diseases which made an investigation last year into the poisonous trades found that there is much lead poisoning in Illinois, more than in the same trade in England and Germany; they found that the employers are usually not aware of sickness among their men, and that the workmen are often quite ignorant of the dangers to which they are exposed. The commission had great difficulty in obtaining information. Physicians, hospital officials, insurance companies and other persons were not the most part unable to give accurate detailed information."
