COMMITTEE TO REPORT FLOOD ACT AT ONCE

Judge Fall Declares That People of Territory Will Accept It at Any Cost.

(By Evening Herald A. P. Leased Wire) Washington, June 15.—As a result of the passage brought to bear for quick action on the flood act, the committee was held this morning. The committee will make an effort at the close of an all day session planned for tomorrow, to report the flood act to the senate.

Judge J. H. Fall, who has really led the fight of the New Mexico Republicans for statehood here, took a part in the debate before the committee today in support of the flood act. His arguments and known political views on this question impressed the committee, evidently.

"It was a Republican endorsing a Democratic proposition for the sake of New Mexico."

Summarizing the bill he believed the house Democratic majority are determined to stand hard by the flood act, the only speaker at this morning's session, advised the committee that he did not want to jeopardize statehood for New Mexico, which is a slight price to pay for the people of the territory and the business men in all political parties are clamoring for statehood at the earliest possible moment and he considered it useless to fight the flood act in the house saving the contract until the passage of the flood act.

RAILROAD FIGHT FOR CANAL AND GULF TRADE BEGINS

New York Central Lines Effect Traffic Agreement With Louisville and Nashville for Through Route.

ILLINOIS CENTRAL HAS ITS FIRST COMPETITION

(By Evening Herald A. P. Leased Wire) Chicago, Ill., June 15.—New York Central lines have entered into a traffic agreement with the Louisville and Nashville railroad which practically gives the former a lake to the gulf line, according to an article in the Inter-Ocean today.

As a result it is stated that the Vanderbilt and the Houston interests are engaged in a struggle to get control of the rail route which will result from the opening of the Panama canal. The article says: "With the opening of the old Walsh tunnel in the Ohio river by the Vanderbilt interests, which control it through their New York Central line, a traffic agreement has been entered into with the Louisville and Nashville railroad which practically gives the New York Central line a Chicago-to-gulf line and which brings the Louisville and Nashville line into competition with the New York Central line."
