Washington, July 8.—The senate today defeated by a vote of 14 to 32 the Cummins amendment to the Canadian reciprocity bill to add meats to the free list.

After some difficulty in securing a quorum the senate resumed consideration of the Canadian reciprocity bill today, and over the protest of Senator Cummins began voting on his proposed amendments.

The vote by which the Cummins free meat amendment was defeated showed Senators Bailey, Simmons and Thornton, Democrats, voting with the following Republicans in favor of the amendment: Senators Beach, Bourne, Belton, Clark (Wyoming), Cummins, Dixon, Gorman, Nelson and Sutherland.
