NATIONAL GUARDS GO TO LAS VEGAS IN A SPECIAL

Soldiers From Eastern and Southern New Mexico Join Forces Here and Leave for Encampment.

A splendid aggregation of New Mexico National guards from eastern and southern New Mexico left here at 8:25 this morning in a special train bound for Las Vegas, where they will attend the territorial encampment. The Pecos valley contributed 125 men, from Carlisle, Artesia and Clovis. Company B of Carlisle is in command of Captain Church and Lieutenant Dean; Company C of Artesia is in command of Captain Behns and Lieutenant Newkirk; Company K of Clovis is in command of Captain Hamblein and Lieutenants Dearden and Hoerning. The eastern New Mexico boys arrived from over the cut-off at midnight last night and their cars were spotted in the yards until this morning, when the Las Cruces company arrived from the south. The four companies were loaded on one train and sent east. The guardsmen made a splendid appearance. The men are splendid specimens of physical manhood, bright and intelligent, and have a wide knowledge of military tactics. The officers in charge of the various companies executed their duties like regulars. In fact, a number of the guardsmen are practically veterans in the guard service, some of them having attended two and three encampments. The soldiers will arrive in Las Vegas shortly after noon today and will immediately go into camp.

COMPLAINT AGAINST DR. WILSON IS DISMISSED

On Motion of District Attorney Embezzlement Case Is Withdrawn; Was Charged With Mis-Appropriating \$2,000.

The charge of embezzlement preferred against Dr. E. N. Wilson, former secretary of the Realty Syndicate company, a corporation, was dismissed when the case was called for a preliminary hearing before Justice of the Peace George R. Craig at 10 o'clock this morning. The case was dismissed on motion of District Attorney G. S. Klock. Mr. Klock said that he had made some errors in drawing the papers and also that he wanted to investigate the matter more carefully before allowing any criminal prosecution, as he had not thoroughly understood the case when the first warrant was issued. Mr. Klock would not say whether any further proceeding would be taken, or if so, when.

Dr. Wilson, who was arrested last Saturday afternoon on a complaint charging the embezzlement of some \$2,000, on a warrant sworn to by Adolph Diller, was presented in court this morning by Attorney Francis E. Wood, of Marron and Wood. Dr. Wilson, through his attorney, demanded an examination of the charges of embezzlement, with the above result.

Mr. Wood, attorney for Dr. Wilson, today denied the statement recently published in the morning paper that negotiations were proceeding for the purpose of compromising the case out of court, saying that there was no foundation in fact for such a statement.

"My client is charged with the crime of embezzlement," said Mr. Wood, "and will not negotiate or compromise such a charge in any way, shape or manner. He was ready for a hearing this morning and if any other charges are filed he will meet on a hearing of them. We do not propose to allow the criminal law to be used to correct the doctor's mis-understanding his civil rights; we do believe that the district attorney will permit such a prosecution when he looks further into the matter."

It is understood that the New Mexico Realty Syndicate company is no longer in existence, having been dissolved some time ago. The corporation, it is said, is now known under the name of the Home Bond and Loan company, of which Adolph Diller is an officer.
