CONSOLIDATED BUYS BUILDING FROM JACOB KORBER

Deal Closed Today, Whereby Property on Southwest Corner of First Street and Copper Avenue, Changes Hands.

PRICE UNDERSTOOD TO APPROXIMATE \$25,000

The Consolidated Liquor company this morning purchased from Jacob Korber the three-story pressed brick building, situated on the southwest corner of First street and Copper avenue, the deal being closed through P. P. McCanna, at a price understood to be approximately \$25,000. The Consolidated company has occupied the building for several years, conducting one of the largest wholesale liquor businesses in the southwest. The property is one of the most valuable in the wholesale district, being only a few hundred feet from railroad tracks and adjacent to the retail district. The building which changed hands today is almost directly opposite the big new building which is now being constructed for the Charles Heald company and accrues additional value because of the proximity of that structure. The Consolidated Liquor company is composed of Charles McNeil, G. G. Gohl, James D. Eakin and O. Dachsen, the last two named being at present on an extended vacation. The sale of the Korber building is one of the most important real estate transfers to be recorded in some weeks.

SEWER FINISHED ON SECOND STREET

Street Car Traffic Will Be Resumed South of Central Avenue Within Next Two Days Is Believed.

South Second street, which has been torn up and blocked for traffic from Gold avenue to Coal avenue for more than two weeks as the result of sewer construction, will probably be reopened tomorrow or the next day. The last section of the thirty-six inch main was laid this morning and the pit was pulled up and earth thrown over the excavation. A gang of men will start work of relaying track and ties tomorrow and the street cars should be running south of Central avenue by Sunday morning, if not before. People living in Barcelona and the south end have been wearing out shoe-leather while the sewer work has blocked car traffic and will be glad when the cars are again in operation. It is twenty-one years ago since the old sewer was laid on Second street, which the new system is replacing.

M'CANNA LEAVES FOR EAST TODAY
Member of Statehood Committee Appointed by Commercial Club Goes to New York and Then to Washington.

P. F. McCanna, one of a committee of five, appointed by the Commercial club ten days ago to go to Washington and do everything possible to secure a statehood for New Mexico at the present session of congress, left for the east on the Santa Fe (leaving this evening). The other members of the committee are Simon Stern, H. Spitz, John Lee Clark and George Ainet. Mr. Stern left for the east Tuesday and Mr. Spitz and Mr. Clark are now in New York. The committee will meet in the New Willard hotel, Washington, at 9 a. m. on August 3. The senate will take up the statehood bill on August 7 and the Albuquerque committee will have four days in which to get in their good work. While in the east Mr. McCanna will visit relatives in New York City, in Oswego, Ben Rockaway, L. L. and other places in the east.

NOTED SOCIALIST GOES THROUGH TO COAST

Alexandrine Rivine, Former Churchman, Who L lectured in Albuquerque Month Ago, Here Few Moments Today.

On his way from New York to Los Angeles, where he will remain until after the election and under the "common people" to carry the political battle soon to be held in the City of Angels, Alexandrine Rivine, a noted socialist lecturer, passed through Albuquerque, on the limited today. Mr. Rivine lectured in Albuquerque a month ago and made many warm friends here. He was met at the train this morning by W. F. McCanna, dean of the Socialist organization in the southwest. Mr. Rivine, it will be recalled, is the man who was formerly pastor of the Church of the Ascension, in New York City, and who had as members of his church such men as the Belmonts, Astors, and other multi-millionaires. While pastor of the church Mr. Rivine would preach a commonplace sermon in the morning and would end his remarks by the suggestion that the millionaires refrain from attending afternoon and evening services, as he intended to preach to the "people." Mr. Rivine is much interested in the coming election in Los Angeles and spoke very hopefully of carrying it for the Socialists. The noted speaker is much interested in the southwest country and while here today asked Mr. Metcalf many questions regarding the oil situation and the Indian villages, saying that he hopes to return to this country some day and write a number of articles on pre-historic topics.

YOUNG ACROBAT IS PAINFULLY HURT

Oerin William Strong, the six year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Strong, hurt his right foot yesterday afternoon at about five o'clock while riding on the front bars of a wheel. The wheel struck something and in trying to retain his balance, the boy got his foot into the spokes. The wheel was upset, and three men who were passing by, released him from the tangle. He was carried a block to his home at 591 West Copper avenue, where his father accompanied by Dr. S. L. Burton soon arrived in an automobile. The bruises were found to be severe, but no bones were broken by the crushing action of the spokes turning against the bicycle fenders. The boy will be confined for several days on account of his injuries.
