

WILD SCENES IN CAMORRA TRIAL IN ITALY

Prisoners in Great Steel Cage Hiss and Curse Their Accusers and Applaud Declarations of Their Lawyer.

HEARING ADJOURNED BECAUSE OF TUMULT Personal Dispute Between Witness and Attorney Cause Wild Outbreak, One Man is Seized by Epileptic Fit.

Leased Wire) Viterbo, Italy, July 21.—The most violent scene of the Camorra trial to date was provoked today by a personal dispute between Captain Fabroni, one of the chief instruments in ferreting the crime of the Camorra, of lawyer Lioy. In the tumult all the other lawyers fled from the room.

Fabroni, captain of the Neapolitan carabinieri, was assigned by the ministry of justice to uproot the Camorra. During the last few days he has told on the stand the result of his detective work and the operations of his associates.

When court opened today Captain Fabroni was asked by Cavalier Santoro, the crown prosecutor, whether the assertion of Scannell that Marshal Capozzi had tried to influence him to swear falsely against his fellow prisoners were true.

Scannell is the scum of criminality. Indeed, it was Lioy who, through Scannell, attempted to buy witnesses for the defense.

This reflection on the lawyer raised the first storm. Lioy screamed like a madman. Albertoni, joined in the row in support of the captain. Enrico Alfano, the alleged head of the Camorra, led in a chorus of invectives directed against Fabroni and Albertoni.

SANTA FE TRAFFIC DEMORALIZED BY HIGH WATER ON ALL SIDES

Twelve Feet of Water Near Houcks Tank Last Night; Trains From West for Today Are All Annulled.

PASSENGER TRAINS IN BUNCHES FROM EAST Washouts North, East and West; Long Stretch of Track South of Rincon Latest to Go Out.

The Santa Fe railroad is now experiencing the most serious washout trouble of its history. The lines between Albuquerque and California, which should have reached here between 7 o'clock tonight have been annulled, and no trains will reach here today from the west.

North of Albuquerque, between Las Alamos and Domingo, the situation is almost as bad. Water two feet deep was flowing over the tracks this morning at Domingo, 49 miles north of Albuquerque.

A washout south of Rincon and another near Victor, on the Rio Grande division, south of Albuquerque, has tied up traffic between this city and El Paso.

The Santa Fe is making heroic efforts to get traffic through and, in some places, is running on a schedule time tomorrow.

Engineering Feet Completed. Needles' staff, July 21.—A small army of men culminated yesterday the work of cutting in two the span of the Santa Fe railroad's great cantilever bridge across the Colorado river near this point.

For years this span has been the lowest cantilever bridge in the world, but the great weight of the new type of engines now in use made the bridge unsafe.

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BIG COMBINATIONS WILL BE SPLIT UP IN NUMBER OF SECTIONS

Attorney General Wickersham Outlines Workings of People's "Law Office" the Department of Justice.

TRUSTS WILL FIND A WAY TO EVADE LAW Not Enough Lawyers in the Government Service to Draw Indictments Against Violators of Anti-Trust Statutes.

(By Evening Herald A. P. Leased Wire) Washington, July 21.—Big combinations like the standard oil company and the tobacco trust are going to be split up into a number of separate and distinct parts, without connection or monopoly power.

Incidentally Mr. Wickersham took occasion to trace the guiding hand of President Taft in the policy of the department of justice, concluding his speech with the remark that "no matter who should be at the head of that department, so long as William H. Taft is president no other policy could obtain."

Mr. Wickersham then gave an account of the activities of "the people's law office," the department of justice. "First of all," he said, "there are the great trust cases, in which you, in common with the whole country, have been so much interested. The government scored great victories there. Do not let anybody deceive you as to that. If the court had held that every contract that put an restraint of any kind upon commerce among the states, however slight, was a violation of the Sherman law, the department of justice would have had to illustrate the truth of what Edward Burke said: 'You can't draw an indictment against a nation.'"

"For there are not lawyers enough in the government, nor for that matter in the country, to draw indictments against everybody who makes any contract that in any respect operates in some measure to restrain interstate commerce," he said.

"But when the supreme court said we must read this statute as reasonable men and give it an interpretation that will not prevent all trade, that which will prevent any undue restraint, prohibit all contracts and combinations that are intended to interfere with the natural course of trade, or which will have the necessary effect of preventing those who are engaged in the production of commodities, and by its decrees has ordered the breaking up of the two largest and most successful monopolies which ever have appeared in this country."

FORMER ARMY OFFICER GETS IN BAD; ARRESTED (By Evening Herald A. P. Leased Wire) Denver, Colo., July 21.—James P. E. Nettles, also a former army officer, charging him with obtaining \$350 under false pretenses.

CHAMPION FINALLY SIGNS UP ARTICLES Wolcott and McFarland Agree to Terms and Conditions; Big Fight on Coast Before First of Year.

PROBE INTO THE SMELTER TRUST IS DROPPED

American Smelting and Refining Company Not Guilty of Violating Sherman Anti-Trust Law.

CHARGES ARE FOUND WITHOUT FOUNDATION

Anonymous Letter Brought About Investigation, Which Was Done at Instance of the Corporation Itself.

(By Evening Herald A. P. Leased Wire) New York, July 21.—The investigation into the affairs of the American Smelting and Refining company to determine whether the so-called "Smelter trust" is in violation of the Sherman anti-trust law has been dropped.

United States District Attorney Wise said today that he had investigated the complaints against the "Smelter trust" and found them without foundation.

It was learned that the federal prosecutor received from Attorney General Wickersham instructions to make an investigation of the American Smelting and Refining company and several officers of the company and books and documents pertaining to its business were before the district attorney.

"Some time ago a complaint came to me by 225 anonymous letter that the American Smelting and Refining company was violating the Sherman anti-trust law. After investigating the evidence presented, I concluded that the complaint was without foundation and suspended the investigation."

MANY CONTRIBUTED TO CAMPAIGN FUND

List of Contributors to Taft Organization in 1908 Covered 128 Printed Pages; Kern Sees How it Was Done Now.

(By Evening Herald A. P. Leased Wire) Washington, July 21.—The office of the secretary of state of New York was brought into the Lorimer investigation today when C. F. Wiley, one of the central figures in the present hearing, before the senate Lorimer committee, testified that \$1,000 had been asked of him as the price of a copy of the list of contributors to the Taft campaign fund in 1908 on file in Albany.

He testified that he had been informed by telegram from either the secretary of state or his office that the list containing 128 pages had been destroyed, but later an offer to furnish it for \$1,000 was made. Wiley explained that he wanted to know if Cyrus H. McCormack had contributed to the fund, but said he did not consider the information worth \$1,000.

"Do you mean to say there are 125 pages of contributions to the Taft campaign fund?" asked Senator Kern, who vice presidential candidate on the ticket opposed to Taft.
