querque so delightful a city.

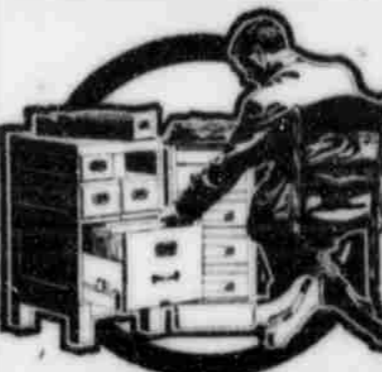
A. H. Renahan, a prominent attor-

Justice Craig Presides Over

half hour of freedom in this city was
taken up for carrying a gun. Quite a
dialogue between the official in-
terpreter and the prisoner occurred be-
fore he was willing to come to the
silence of his narrative, which was
that someone had slipped the gun into
his pocket. The court showed no hesi-
tancy in pronouncing an even longer
sentence—sixty days' incarceration.
His story was voted by the meeting to
be the hardest luck story of the
month.

CHASING DOWN LOGS
ESCAPED FROM BOOM
IS QUITE EXCITING

George Fred Murray, outside woods
man for the Santa Barbara Tie and
Pole company, left this morning for
the logging camps after several days
in the city looking after ties which
have drifted down the Rio Grande
from their boom across the river near
Domingo. A great number of the ties
annually escape under the boom and
have to be traced down the river for
various distances. People along the
river who fish the ties out and return
them to the company are entitled to
a salvage for their labor, and each
year a good many logs are recovered.
They are being turned in to the tie
picking plant south of the city at the
rate of 70 to 250 per day, and at every
aiding between here and Domingo
piles of ties and poles are accumulat-
ed for shipment to points on the right
of way.

Each piece that is cut is branded
with a brand which is recorded at the
office of the secretary of the territory
the same as for brands of cattle and
sheep. It is a felony to appropriate
the lumber and punishable exactly
like a similar act in the case of live-
stock under the territorial laws. In-
fringements of the law are very rare.
