DEMOCRATIC CAUCUS PREVENTS A QUORUM IN SENATE COMMITTEE

Chairman Flood, Messrs. Becker and Houston, Democrats, and Tangham and Young, Republicans, make up the conference committee. This committee will meet this evening with Mr. Smith of the senate committee to go over the ground.

AVIATORS BLAMED BY MANAGEMENT FOR DEATHS IN CHICAGO

Pupils in Flying, it is Said, Did Not Know How to Properly Handle Their Machines and Fell to Terrible End.

OTHER BIRDMEN ARE ANGRY AT ACTION

They Declare the Meet Should Have Been Called Off for Day But They Got No Signals to Terminate Flights.

(By Evening Herald A. P. Leased Wire) Chicago, Aug. 16.—Various reasons are advanced for the accidents which late yesterday resulted in the death of Wm. H. Badger and St. Croix Johnson, amateur aviators, during flights in connection with the aviation meet here.

St. Croix Johnsons fell 500 feet under his engine and was carried down into the water of Lake Michigan, and drowned.

Horace Wiley, aviation expert and head captain of the aviation committee, gave out the following statement late today regarding the manner in which the two men came to their deaths.

Badger was killed as the result of trying to perform a stunt without shutting down his engine, he said. "Volting" is to turn the plane so that the machine descends by performing the engine should be shut down to save half power or even less.

The cause of Johnson and his craft was due to excessive air pressure in the gas tank. Pressure is needed within the tank to insure a flow of gasoline to the motor but there was too much in Johnson's tank and caused it to explode.

The causes were inclined to criticize the management for not calling off the program for the day when Badger was killed.

Henry N. Atwood, who is flying from St. Louis to New York next afternoon, emphasizing the necessity of the management in this regard as "precautions and unqualified."

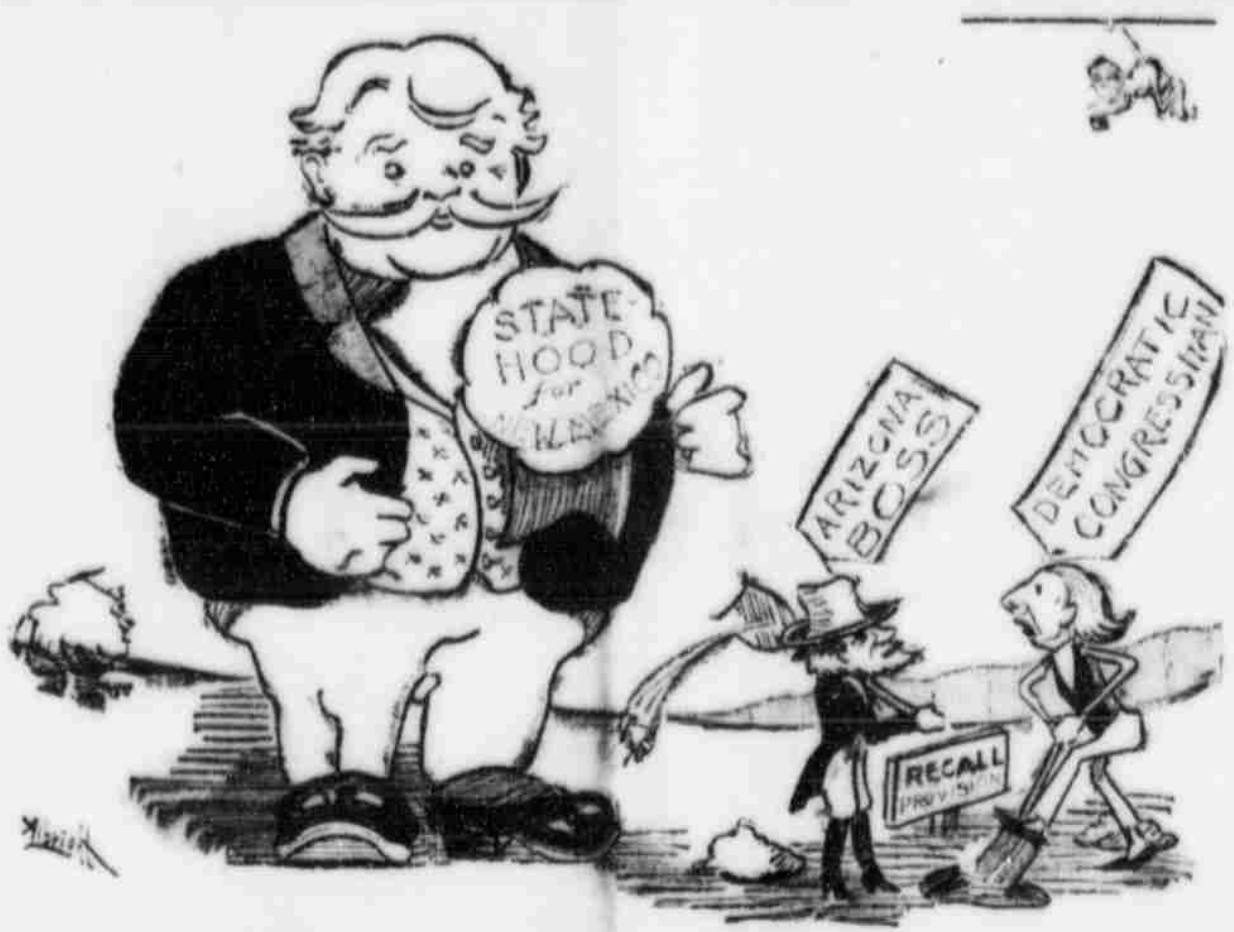
COMMITTEE WILL FIND HOW STEPHENSON GOT IN
