STATE COMMITTEE ADJOURNS TODAY ENTIRE HARMONY PREVAILING

Chairman Bursum Predicts a Sweeping Victory at First Election; Apportionment of Delegates Completed.

RESOLUTION ADOPTED THANKING MR. TAFT

(Special Telegram to Evening Herald) Santa Fe, N. M., Sept. 4.—The first state convention of the Republican party in New Mexico will be held in Las Vegas, San Miguel county, on September 28. This was decided upon at the morning session of the Republican state committee today. The vote stood:

Las Vegas, 24; Santa Fe, 15. After voting, it looked like Santa Fe would have the convention, but as the convention is held in the county which has the largest vote, Santa Fe will not be held there.

The apportionment of delegates for the state convention from the various counties was fixed by the committee today and will be incorporated in the call. The basis adopted upon was one delegate to the state convention for each 100 votes cast for the Republican party in the last election.

Secretary of Navy Has Decided That Historic Battleship Will Give Away Honor Place to More Powerful One

NEW SHIP WILL BE FINISHED JULY, 1912

Leased Wire) Washington, Sept. 4.—Probably within a year the battleship Connecticut, America's most famous flagship, will surrender to the honor of her Admiral Hope Nicholson, commander in chief of the Atlantic fleet, to the dreadnaught Wyoming, now nearing completion, which has been selected for the annual destination of being the flagship of the navy's first fleet.

Because of this honor which is being conferred upon the Connecticut, and it is with reluctance that the navy officials have decided to displace her as the flagship of the battleship fleet. As the Wyoming will have a displacement of 25,000 tons, it is being built to be larger than that of the Connecticut.
