MRS. LOCKHART IS LAID TO REST IN FAIRVIEW

Funeral of Well Known Old Resident of Albuquerque, Held Yesterday Afternoon, is Well Attended.

The casket containing her body banked with flowers, hundreds of friends assembling at the family home to pay a last tribute, and many carriages following the hearse to the cemetery, the funeral of Mrs. Ellen Lockhart, held yesterday afternoon was a gathering of sincere mourners and a fitting final demonstration of love and esteem to one of Albuquerque's best known pioneer settlers.

Mrs. Lockhart, the wife of Henry Lockhart, died last Thursday, following an illness of long standing. Having been a resident of Albuquerque for many years and until recently prominently identified with the upbuilding of the city, Mrs. Lockhart naturally enjoyed a wide acquaintance. The room in which she was laid to rest in this city was indicated by the large attendance at the funeral yesterday. Society all the old time residents were in attendance and many other neighbors and friends.

Funeral services were held in the Lockhart home, north of town. Accredited W. R. Warren of St. John's Episcopal church officiated. The Episcopalian quartette consisting of Mrs. Roy McDonald, Mrs. Bradford, Mr. Ormsbee and Mr. Andrews, rendered appropriate music. Following the services at the home, the funeral procession wended its way to Fairview cemetery, the last resting place. The pall bearers were old friends of the Lockhart family: Messrs. Harvey B. Ferguson, John S. Bowen, J. C. Haldridge, Benton Perry, H. B. Kauffman, D. A. Marquand, George P. Albright, Frank Wilson.

FIREMAN GETS BAD FALL FROM TOP OF ENGINE

Frank Hinds, Son of Policeman E. Hinds, Topples From Running Board, While He is Fixing Headlight.

While attempting to repair the headlight on a switch engine in the local Santa Fe yards shortly before midnight Saturday, Frank Hinds, a well known locomotive fireman, was precipitated from the running board of the engine to the ground, receiving painful injuries, consisting chiefly in the fracture of one bone and the dislocation of two other bones in his left foot. The young man was taken to the Santa Fe hospital for treatment, being taken to his home at 210 South Walter street yesterday afternoon. It is believed that the injuries will not permanently disable the young man and that he will be able to resume his duties within ten days or two weeks. The fall might have resulted in much more serious injuries and limbs in congratulating himself that he escaped as luckily as he did.
